A PROCLAMATION, For a Public THANKSGIVING.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS it has pleased Almighty God, in
His great Goodness, to put an find to the late bloody, extended, and expensive War, in which We were engaged; We therefore, adoring the Di-vine Goodness, and duly considering that the great and publick Bleffings of Peace do call for publick and folemn Acknowledgements, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby appointing and com-manding, That a General Thanksgiving to Al-mighty God, for these His Mercies, be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom called Scotland, upon Tuefday the First Day of June next: And We do firstly charge and command,

That the faid Publick Thanksgiving be reverently and decently observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, on the faid First Day of June next, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may justy inslict on all fuch as contemn or neglect the Performance of fo religious a Duty: Our Will and Pleasure is therefore, and We charge, That this Our Proclamation feen, ye pals to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance; and Our Will and Pleafure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We order to see the same published. And Wassering ordain to fee the fame published: And We appoint them to fend Copies thereof to the several Parish Churches within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

UR Will and Pleasure is, that you give immediate Directions to the Heralds, Pursuivants, and other necessary Officers, to attend the Proclamation of Peace that is to be made on Thursday next, the Twenty ninth Day of April, in the usual Places, and with the Solemnities customary on the like Occasions; and for to doing this shall be your Warrant. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-fixth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and two, in the Forty-second Year of Our Reign. By His Majesty's Command, PELHAM.

To Our Right Trufty and Right Entirely beloved Coufin Charles Duke of Norfolk, Earl Marshal, and Our Hereditary Marshal of England; and, in his Absence, to the Principal Officers of Arms.

St. James's, April 29, 1802.
THE Officers of Arms; Serjeants at Arms, with their Maces and Collars; the Serjeant-Trumpeter, with his Mace and Collar; the Trumpets, Drum-Major, and Drums; and the Knight Marshal, and Kni ht Marshal's Men, assembled this Day, at Half past Ten o'Clock in the Forenoon, in the Stable-Yard, St. James's: and the Officers of Arms, being habited in their respective Tabards, and mounted, a Procession was made, at Twelve o'Clock, from thence to the Palace Gate, where George Harrison, Esq; Norroy King of Arms, read His Majesty's Proclamation of Peace; which being done, a Procession was made to Charing-Cross, in the following Order, viz.

> A Party of Life Guards, to clear the Way. Beadles of Westminster, Two and Two, with Staves. Constables of Westminster, in like Wanner. High Conflable, on Horseback, with his Staff. Officers of the High Bailiff of Westminster, on Horseback, with White Wands. High Bailiff and Deputy Steward, on Horfeback. Three Knight Maishal's Men, Bearers of the Verge, with Maces. Eight Knight Marshal's Men, Two and Two. Sir James Bland Burges, Bart. Knight Marshal, on Horseback, with his Baton. Drums. Drum Major.
