**WE**, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars, of your University of Cambridge, beg Leave to approach the Throne with the warmest Sentiments of Gratitude for the recent Instance of your Majesty's paternal Care in restoring to us the Blessings of Peace.

The Contest in which your Majesty has been compelled to engage in Support of the Independence of your Government, and the Freedom of your People, is unexampled in the History of civilized Nations. For while the Physical Strength of your Kingdom was opposed to numerous Armies, and to Resources never before brought together into Action, the moral and religious Principles of Society were attacked by specious and plausible Doctrines, too gratifying to the corrupt Passions of human Nature, wholly to fail of their destructive Effects. But your Majesty's Arms have triumphed both by Sea and Land over the Efforts of the most formidable Enemies; and the unprincipled Theories of Reform, with all their shallow Sophistries, have at length been exploded with Contempt and Indignation.

In Addition to the Calamities of War, your Majesty's Subjects have also been afflicted with those of Dearth; but the active Benevolence of the Rich, administering to the Wants of the Poor, did not cease to alleviate their Sufferings, and confirm their Resignation to Providence under this severe Visitation; and, what to your Majesty will ever be the Source of heartfelt Satisfaction, your loyal People have displayed during this eventful Conflict, the Fortitude of Heroes, the Zeal of Patriots, and the Patience of Christians.

By the Skill and Intrepidity of your Majesty's Forces, by the wise and vigorous Counsels of your Majesty's Ministers, and, above all, by the uniform Example of Religion and Virtue so eminently exhibited in your Royal Person, we have become triumphant Abroad; and united at Home. But your Majesty has not been so dazzled by the Splendour of Conquest, as to neglect the Means of re-establishing the Blessings of Peace. For no sooner did the Enemy relinquish their unfounded Pretensions, and seem disposed to return to the more sober and practicable Doctrines which they had too hastily abandoned, than your Majesty, no less anxious for the Comfort, than you had been for the Safety of your People, embraced the Offers of Reconciliation, and closed the Horrors of War. It is our fervent Prayer that the Treaty now concluded by your Majesty, may become to the Nations engaged in the

late War the Groundwork of a permanent and reciprocal Confidence.

As individual Members of an University distinguished by signal Marks of Royal Favor, we will endeavour, as we trust we hitherto have endeavoured, to impress on the Minds of Youth committed to our Care, a due Sense of the Excellence of our Constitution in Church and State, and a Love for it, not founded so much on the uninformed Prejudices of Birth, as the mature Convictions of Reason. So may we hope, that those who quit our Academical Studies for a public Life, may turn to practical Use the speculative Lessons which they have been taught; and that we, by a faithful Discharge of our important Trust, may secure to ourselves the Continuance of your Majesty's Protection.

We humbly take our Leave, after expressing in our own, the general Wish, that your Majesty may long reign over a free, a loyal, and an united People.
