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St. James's, May 27, 1802.

THIS Day his Grace the Duke of Portland, Chancellor of the University of Oxford; the Lord Eldon, Lord High Chancellor, High Steward of the University; the Reverend Dr. Marlow, the Vice-Chancellor; the Reverend Mr. Rodd, and the Reverend Mr. Wetherell, the Two Proctors; and the Delegates appointed by the University to attend on this Occasion, together with the Viscount Montjoy, Viscount Hinton, Viscount Dupplin, Viscount Lewisham, Viscount Duncannon, Viscount Newtown, Lord Rodney, the Honorable Mr. Ward, the Honorable Mr. Allen, the Honorable Mr. Nevill, and the Honorable Mr. Turnour, Members of the University at present, all in their proper Academical Habits, and accompanied by His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, His Grace the Archbishop of York, the Earls of Kinnoull, Dartmouth, Harcourt, the Viscounts Wentworth, Binning, Marsham, the Bishops of Winchester, Salisbury, and Oxford, the Lords Willoughby de Broke and Amberst, the Right Honorable Sir William Scott, and Sir William Dolben, Bart. the Representatives of the University; the Right Honorable William Windham, and several other Noblemen and Gentlemen who were educated at the University, waited upon the King to present to His Majesty the following Address upon the Peace:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford, humbly beg Leave to approach your Throne with our sincere and unanimous Congratulations on the Return of public Tranquillity.

We rejoice that a War, begun in Justice and Necessity, has at length, by the Favor of Divine Providence, been brought to an honorable Conclusion. But, while we thankfully acknowledge your Majesty's paternal Care in restoring to your People the Blessing of Peace, we cannot forget that your Majesty is equally entitled to our Gratitude as the illustrious Defender of Religion and social Order; and that, in the Wisdom and Energy of your Councils, seconded by the heroic Valor of your Fleets and

Armies, we found a Refuge from the Storm which threatened to overwhelm us in Confusion and Ruin.

With heartfelt Satisfaction we reflect that, under the Divine Protection, your Majesty and your Royal House have been preserved in Safety amidst all the Distresses and Calamities which have afflicted the greater Part of the civilized World.

We are anxious to assure your Majesty, that, together with the Principles of pure Religion and sound Morality, it shall always be our earnest Endeavour to impress on the Minds of the rising Generation entrusted to our Care a just Sense of the Advantages we derive from your mild and beneficent Government. And our Prayers shall never cease to be offered up to the Almighty that, under your gracious Auspices, we may continue securely to enjoy that free and happy Constitution in Church and State, for which, during the Whole of this arduous Conflict, it has been your Majesty's chief Glory to contend.

Given at our House of Convocation the Twentieth Day of May, in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and two.

To which His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

I Receive with peculiar Satisfaction this dutiful and loyal Address with your Congratulations on the Restoration of the public Peace.

Your cordial Expressions of Attachment to My Person and Family, and to our invaluable Constitution, and your unremitting Exertions to impress on the Minds of the rising Generation entrusted to your Care, the Principles of true Religion and sound Learning, are most grateful to Me; and My University of Oxford may rely on the Continuance of My Favour and Protection.

St. James's, May 27, 1802.
