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An Act for raising a certain Sum of Money by Way of Annuities on Debentures for the Service of Ireland. '

An Act to repeal an Act paffed in the Twentyfifth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majelty for granting Stamp Duties on certain Medicines, and for charging other Duties in lieu thereof, and for making effectual Provision for the better Collection of the faid Duties.

An Act for allowing until the Twentieth Day of May One thousand eight hundred and three, Additional Bounties on Refined Sugar exported, and discontinuing the Duty thereon, granted by an Act of this Seffion of Parliament.
