Glory, obtained by unparalleled Atchievements.

Long may your Majesty abide in continual Peace
and Tranquillity, the zealous Guardian of our distinguished Blessings; and may your devoted and affectionate People give Testimony of their peculiar Happiness by due Observance of their social Duties, by Redfast Fidelity and grateful Obedience.
