WHEREAS by an Act, paffed in the prefent **VV** Seffion of Parliament, intituled "An Act "to continue, until the First Day of January One " thousand eight hundred and three, and amend an "Act of the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of, " His prefent Majefty, for prohibiting the Expor-tation and permitting the Importation of Corn, " and for allowing the Importation of other Ar-" ticles of Provision without Payment of Duty, " and to continue, for the fame Period, an Act of " the laft Seffion of Parliament, for prohibiting the " Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, " or other Provisions, and for permitting the Im-" portation into Ireland of Corn, Fifh, and Provi-"fions, without Payment of Duty;" it is, amongh other Things, enacted, That it shall be lawful for His Majefty, his Heirs and Succeffors, and he and they is and are thereby authorifed, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, during the Continu-ance of the faid Act, from Time to Time, when, ance of the faid Act, from time to trime, when, and as often as the fame shall be judged expedient, to prohibit generally, or under and subject to such Restrictions, Regulations, and Provisions as shall be specified by His faid Majesty, in any Order in Council, the Exportation from any Part of Great Britain of any Articles of Provision; and in like Manner to recall fuch Prohibition, either in Part or in the Whole, or to make any new Regulations, Restrictions, and Provisions relating thereto, as Circumstances may require, any Thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary thereof notwith flauding; His Majefly, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in purfuance of the Powers given by the faid Act, is pleafed to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from the Twelfth Day of this inftant June, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three, no Perfon or Perfons whofoever inall export, or fhall load or lay on board any Ship or Veffel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain any of the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef,

T the Court at St. James's, the 2d of June 1 Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, or any Bacon, Butter, Onions, or Pulfe of any Sort, or any Baclar, Julied, or Pearl Barley: But it is His Majefty's Pleafure, that nothing herein contained fhall extend, or be conftrued to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of fuch and fo much of any of the faid Articles as fhall be neceffary to be carried in any Ship or Veffel on its Voyage out aud Home for the Suffenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Paffengers, and others on board fuch Ship or Veffel, or for the Ufe and Suttenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on board fuch Ship or Veffel; or for the neceffary victualling or providing any of His Majefty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Veffels in His Majefty's Service; or for the neceffary victualling or providing any of His Majefty's Forces, Forts, or Garrifons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of fuch and fo much of any of the faid Articles as may be necesfary for the Supply of the British Forts, Calles, or Factories in Africa, or of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the fame from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them. of any of the faid Articles for the neceffary Supply of their Garrifons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the neceffary Ufe of the Ships belonging to the faid Company ; nor to prohibit the Exportation to the Islands of Guernfey, Jerfey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, or to any of His Majefty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the Well Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the neceffary Ule of the Inhabitants of the fame respectively, in fuch Quantities as shall be judged to be necessary by the Lords of His Majelty's Molt Honorable Privy Council, upon Application to be made from Time to Time, and under Licences to be granted by their Lordships; or without such Licences, pro-vided Proof shall be made to the Satisfaction of the Commillioners of His Majefty's Cultoms that the Articles fo to be exported as aforefaid are not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture :

And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to Order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirmed to extend, to prohibit the Export. ation from any Port of Great Britain to any Port

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of Ireland, of any of the Articles above-mentioned, provided the Perfons fo exporting the fame shall enter into Bonds, with fufficient Sureties, to the Satisfaction of the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, for the due landing thereof in the Ports in Ireland for which the fame shall be respectively cleared out; and fhall alfo comply with all other Conditions which now are, or may hereafter be required by Law in respect to such Exportation :

And His Majelly is hereby further pleafed to order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirued to extend, to prohibit at any Time any Perfon or Perfons from thipping or putting on board any of the Articles above mentioned, to be carried from any Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of Great Britain, to any other Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, having fuch, or the like Coatt Sufferance, Coquet, or other Coaft Difpatch for that Purpofe, and on fuch and the like Security being given for the landing and difcharging the lame, as now is, or hereafter may be by any Law or Laws, Act or Acts, required in relation to the carrying Coaftwife any Corn or other Articles, or any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize: And the Right Honorable the Lords Committioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly. HEREAS in purfuance of the Powers vefted VV in His Majesty by an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " An Act for enabling His Majelty to prohibit the " Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, " and for allowing the Importation of other Ar-" ticles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, to continue in force until Six Weeks from the " Commencement of thenext Selfion of Parliament," (which Act, by fubsequent Acts, has been further continued until Forty Days after the Commence-ment of the present Session of Parliament,)- His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bear-ing Date the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, to order, (and it was thereby or-dered,) that the Prohibition contained in an Order made by His Majelty in Council, on the Sixteenth Day of October One thoufand feven hundred and ninety-nine, on the Exportation; or the loading or laying on board any Ship or Veffel with Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peafe, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Bifcuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof, fhould be, and continue in force until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the First Session of Parliament that should be begun and holden after the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one: excepting, neverthelefs, ont of fuch Prohibitions, any foreign Corn, or Meal, or Flour, that should have been imported and Ware-houled in the Manner, and under the Conditions mentioned in an Act paffed in the Thirty-lirft Year | eight hundred, should be continued in Force for and

of His prefent Majelty's Reign, intituled " An AQ " for regulating the Importation and Exportation " of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty of foreign " Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British " Corn exported," and should not have been taken out of fuch Warehoule for Home Confumption, and with Exception allo as to the carrying Coaffwife, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the feveral Sorts of Corn, and other Articles as aforefaid, from Great Britain, for any of the Purpoles mentioned in the faid Act.

And whereas His Majefty was also pleafed by his faid Order in Council of the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, to continue in like Manner, and for the like Term the Liberty to import into any Port or Place of Great Britain, any foreign Corn or other Articles as aforefaid, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majelty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatever; and also the Liberty to take out of Warehouse for Home Confumption any such foreign Corn, or other Articles as aforefaid, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; and likewife the Liberty to import into any Port or Place of Great Britain in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majcsly, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever, any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulfe, and alfo Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Potatoes, Rice, Sago, Sago-Powder, Ta-pioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout; provided a due Entry fhould be made of all fuch Articles as aforefaid, that foould be fo imported, with the proper Officer of the Cultoms at the Port where the fame should be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the faid Act mentioned :

And whereas, by an Act paffed in the prefent Seffion of Parliament, intituled " An Act to continue until the First Day of January One thou-" fand eight hundred and three, and amend an Act of the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, for prohibiting the Exportation " and permitting the Importation of other Articles " of Provision, without Payment of Duty;" and to continue for the fame Period, "An Act of the " laft Seffion of Parliament for prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn, or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and for permitting the Import-66 " ation into Ireland of Corn, Fifh, and Provisions, " without Payment of Duty ;" the faid Act paffed in the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, and the subsequent Acts continuing the fame, are further continued until the First Day of January One thousaud eight hundred and three :

And whereas, His Majefty was pleafed, by his Order in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, to order that his faid Order in Council, bearing Date the Tenth Day of December One thousand

during the Space of Six Months from the Date hereof; and whereas the faid last mentioned Order in Council will now fhortly expire, and whereas it is expedient further to continue the fame with fuch Alteration and Exception, as is hereinafter men-

sioned, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and pur-fuant to the Powers so vested in His Majesty, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the faid Prohibition to export Corn, or any of the Articles as aforefaid, and the faid Permillion to import and take out of Warehouse, foreign Corn, and other Articles as aforefaid, and likewife to import certain other Articles of Provision, excepting only the Article of Rice, as expressed in the faid Order, bearing Date the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, with every Exception, Proviso, Rule, Regulation, and Reflriction specified in the faid Order refpecting fuch Exportation, Importation, or taking out of Warehoufe; and all Matters and Things in the faid Orders contained, shall be and continue in force until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three; and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majefty's Treasury are to give the neceffary Di-W.
