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Warsaw, Aug. 28.

From the Frontiers we understand, that the Commissioners of this Crown, and those of the Grand Signior, are employed about settling the Limits. That this Summer is like to end without any remarkable Action; the Ottoman Forces remaining on the other side of the Danube, without any appearance of passing it; but to make some amends for their letting this Summer pass in this manner, they endeavour to persuade us, that they are making vast preparations against the Spring, and that then they will fill upon the Moscovites with a formidable Force, if they do not prevent it, by complying to those Terms which the Grand Signior is content to make a Peace with them upon, though after all, the Turks are according to all appearance, as desirous of a Peace, as the Moscovites can be.

Genova, Sept. 11. This morning anchored in this Road, two of the Great Duke of Tuscany's Gallies with 300 Bails of Silk from *Messina*, and the Gallies of this State are expected every day. This Senate has given Orders for the building another Fort at *Vado*.

Florence, Sept. 12. From *Sicily* they write, that the fears they had of the Turks are quite removed, though they have certain Advice, that the Rebels continue to use their utmost endeavours at the Port, to engage the Grand Signior to employ his Arms against that Kingdom, and that they still flatter themselves with the hopes of succeeding in their Designs to enslave their Countrey; thus adding new Crimes to those they are already guilty of.

Venice, Sept. 13. By an Express arrived from *Constantinople* we have Letters from thence, dated the 13th of the last Month, which give us an Account, That at the same time that the Grand Signior makes a great shew of prosecuting the War with the utmost vigor against the Moscovites; and that several Gallies and other Vessels are sent to the *Black Sea*, to secure the two Forts made by the Turks on the *Neister*, a Treaty is continued with the Moscovites, by the means of the Cham of *Tartary*, and great endeavours used to bring it to a speedy conclusion; which makes many people believe, that the Grand Signior has other Designs of employing his Arms; and even this State is not without some jealousy, that when the Turks have made a Peace with the Moscovites, they will look towards the Islands of *Zant*, *Cepphalonia*, and *Corfu*, and therefore they are preparing to have a considerable force at Sea the next Spring, sufficient to oppose any sudden attempt; though after all, its probable, that the inclination which the Turks have, to put an end to the War they are now engaged in with the

Moscovites, proceeds rather from the misunderstanding there is between the Great Masters at home, some of which are labouring to remove the Grand Vizier, and have made such progress towards it as very much to lessen his credit with the Grand Signior, who has lately advanced several persons, viz. *Bassà Mustafa*, Brother to the former Vizier, is made Vizier of the *Bank* a place of great Honor and Advantage; *Ismael Aga* made Master of the Horse, and *Oman Bassà*, made *Bassà of Grand Cairo*, all Declared Enemies of the Grand Viziers.

Lintz, Sept. 12. We are told, that the Commissioners appointed by the Emperor, for the Trial of the Count of *Zinzendorf*, late President of the Chamber of the Revenues, will now in a few days pronounce their Sentence against him; when that is done, we shall probably know the particulars of his Charge, which hitherto are kept secret, and what we are yet told, is only in general, That he is accused of having misemployed the publick Monies, and particularly, those designed for the Army during the late War. There is every day less and less appearance of accommodating the Affairs of *Hungary*; Mens Spirits being more and more exasperated by the frequent Rencontres that happen, and the endeavours that are used, to moderate things, as that a Foundation may be laid for those that really desire a Peace, to work upon, proving unsuccessful. The Duke of *Lorraine* is in great esteem in this Court, and, as we are informed, is consulted in the most important Affairs, and some are of opinion, that he will make a longer stay than was at first spoken of, and that he will go with the Court to *Vienna*, but this is not certain.

Berlin, Sept. 22. There are Letters from *Stockholme*, which say, That the Crown of *Sweden* was going to enter into a new Alliance with *France*, by which the French King obliged himself to be Guarantee to *Sweden* of the Treaties of *Munster* and *Nimeguen*, and to maintain them in all the Privileges and Possessions which they have now in the Empire; but from better hands we are informed that there is nothing of it, and that the King of *Sweden* is not at all disposed to enter into any new Engagements at this time, unless they be such as may be for the preserving the present Peace; and to that end we are assured his Majesty is sending an Ambassador to the Emperor, and Ministers to other Princes of the Empire, whose Negotiations its hoped, will have very good effects. We are expecting here an Envoye from the Bishop of *Munster*, on account of some differences between his Master and the King of *Denmark*, which are submitted to the Arbitrage of our Elector.

Hamburg, Sept. 24. The Prince of *Orange* is expected this day or to morrow at *Zell*, where great preparations have been made for his Entertainment. It was believed, that his Highness would from thence have made a Visit to the Elector of *Brandenburg*.

Brandenburg at Magdeburg or Hall, but it seems, the Plague being broke out in those parts, his Electoral Highness has for the present put off that journey.

Amsterdam, Sept. 27. Since the taking of the Spanish man of War in the Road of *Ostend*, it has been very warmly reported, that this State will permit the Spaniards to build 8 or 10 men of War here, which are to have their station near *Ostend*, to prevent the like Attempts for the future. Three days since two Ships arrived in the *Texel* from the *East Indies*; of which several Officers and others are now come ashore.

Hague, Sept. 27. The States of *Holland* not having been able to conclude the Affairs before them the last week, continued their Assembly till yesterday, when they Adjourned till the 15th of *November* next: they have Farmed out some of the Branches of their Revenue, and have resolved to raise a Million of Livres to pay off the Debts contracted the last year. The Elector of *Cologne* having laid a considerable Duty upon all Merchandises passing through the Countrey of *Liege*, the French King has signified to his Electoral Highness, that he cannot consent to it, as being of great prejudice to his Trading Subjects. That Elector continues to be very much dissatisfied with the City of *Liege*, those Inhabitants having been of late very refractory, which its said, has induced him to accept of the Emperors offer of assisting his Electoral Highness with some Troops, in order to the bringing them to their Duty. From *Metz* they write, that notwithstanding the present great poverty of the Dutchy of *Lorraine*, the French King had Farmed the Revenues of it for two Millions, besides the advantage the Undertakers propoed to themselves. The Princess of *Orange* departed this morning for *So. Byke*, where her Highness intends to remain till the beginning of *November*.

Brussels, Sept. 27. The Governors of the several Provinces are come hither to meet and make their Compliments to the Prince of *Parma*, who it was thought would have been here before this time, but the winds have been very contrary. The Nations here have not contented themselves with the assurance they had from our Archbishop the Duke of *Aerschot*, and the Prince of *Vaudemont*, that there should not for the future any Taxes be raised upon the Villages depending upon this City, without their consent but they have drawn upon an Instrument to that effect, which they have got the chief Cities of *Brabant* to Signe. The Nations have likewise demanded, that a great Brass Plate, containing the Priviledges of this City, which many years since stood above the Door of the *Stadthouse*, and was afterwards taken away from thence, may be put into their hands: They have been offered a Copy of it, which they will not be satisfied with, but insist to have the Original; they likewise desired that the priviledges enjoyed by those that live within the Virge of the Court, which are most Forreigners, may be taken away, for that it is very prejudicial to the Burgers, who pay all Duties, and therefore cannot sell so cheap; in which his Excellency has gratified them, having commanded all the Forreigners that live there, to remove from thence, and given them a competent time so to do. The Countess of *Soissons* is returned hither from *Holland*, and several Persons of quality are come from *France* to pass some time

here, The Marquis de *Bourgomano*, Ambassador to the Emperor from the Crown of *Spain*, is still here; and its not certainly known when he will begin his Journey.

Ostend, Sept. 29. The 22 Instant, the Master and Seamen of the Spanish man of War, taken by the Brandenburg Frigats, were set ashore here by a Pilot Boat; they have been examined by our Governor, and their Depositions have been sent to *Brussels* to be made use of, as there shall be occasion. Two days since arrived here an Express from thence, with Orders from the Duke de *Vilia Hermosa*, to fit out with all possible diligence three or four Men of War that lye here, in order to the clearing the Coast. The Merchant Ships which have his Excellencies Baggage on board, dare not stir out; and several Advice-Boats have been sent to the Westward to meet the Prince of *Parma*, and to give him notice of what has happened. A great many Persons of quality are come hither from *Brussels* to meet the said Prince, who is hourly expected.

Kinsale, Sept. 7. On Saturday and Sunday last arrived here the *Katherine*, and the *John and Robert* from the *West-Indies*.

Falmouth, Sept. 16. The 14th Instant came into this Port the *Phoenix* Frigate, Capt. *Blague* Commander from *Tangier*, which Place they tell us, they left in a good posture of Defence; That the Moors had hitherto very punctually observed the Truce; and that the Governor and the Alcayde, were Treating about the prolonging of it. That Vice-Admiral *Herbert* with several men of War under his Command, lay before *Tangier*.

Swansey, Sept. 16. A Vessel of this Town arrived here this week, in 5 or 6 days from *Brest*; the Master reports, that several men of War were fitting out there, and 500 Men were at work every day.

Portsmouth, Sept. 19. Yesterday the *Pearl* Frigate went out of this Harbor, being bound to the Westward.
