An Act to enabling the Lord High Treasurer of Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury of Ireland, for the Time being, to sell, lease, convey, or dispose of the Parliament House, in the City of Dublin, and all the Premises and Appurtenances thereunto belonging to the Governor and Company of the Bank of Ireland.

An Act to amend and render more effectual Two Acts passed in the Twenty fixth and Thirty-second Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for the

Reduction of the National Debt.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of Army and their Quarters.

An Act for amending so much of an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty as relates to the secreting, embezzling, or destroying any Letter or Packet sent, by the Post, and for the better Protection of such Letters and Packets, and for more effectually preventing Letters and Packets being sent otherwise than by the Post.

An Act to enable His Majelly to avail himself of the Offers of certain Yeomaury and Volunteer

Corps to continue their Services.

An Act to revive and further continue until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, and amend so much of an Act made in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, as grants certain Allowances to Adjutants and Serjeant-Majors of Millowances

An Act to enable His Majesty to accept and continue the Services of certain Troops or Companies of Yeomanny in Ireland.

An Act for making Allowances, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, in certain Cases, to Subaltera Officers of the Militia of Ireland during Peace.

An Act to authorife the fending and receiving of Letters and Packets, Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and Printed Newspapers by the Post free from the Duty of Postage by the Members of the Two Houses of Parliament of the United Kingdom, and by certain Public Offices therein named; and for reducing the Postage on such Votes, Proceedings, and Newspapers when sent by any other Persons.

An Act to enable fuch Officers, Mariners, and Soldiers as have been in the Land or Sea Service, or in the Marines, or in the Militia, or any Corps of Fencible Men, fince the Twenty-fourth Year of His prefent Majesty's Reign, to exercise Trades.

An Act for directing certain Public Accounts to be laid annually before Parliament, and for discontinuing certain other Forms of Account now in Use.

An Act to amend the Laws for the better Regulation of the Linen Manufacture in Ireland.

An Act for repealing feveral Acts made in the Thirty-fifth, Thirty-fixth, and Thirty-ninth, and Fortieth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, relating to the Admission of certain Articles of Merchandize in Neutral Ships, and to the issuing of Orders in Council for that Purpose, and for making other Provisions in lieu thereof, to continue until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four.

An Act to continue, until the Twenty-ninth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made in the Parliament of Ireland in the Thirty-seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for regulating the Import, Exported and Sale of Cossee, and securing the Duties payed able thereon; and also for securing the Duties payed able on Licences to Persons in Ireland, not being Malthers or Makers of Malt, selling Malt by Commission or otherwise.

An Act for repealing An Act made in the Thirty eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for raising a Body of Miners in the Counties of Cornwall and Devon for the Defence of the Kingdom during the prefent War, and for the more effectually raising and regulating a Body of Miners for the Defence of Great Britain.

An Act for the further Regulation of the Trials of controverted Elections or Returns of Members to serve in Parliament, and for expediting the Pro-

ceedings relating thereto.

An Act for the trying and punishing in Great Britain Persons holding Public Employments for Offences committed Abroad, and for extending the Provisions of an Act passed in the Twenty-first Year of King James, made for the Ease of Justices and others in pleading in Suits brought against them to all Persons either in or out of this Kingdom authorifed to commit to fafe Custody.

An Act to alter, amend, and render, more effectual an Act made in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for the more effectual Prevention of Smuggling in Great Britain.

An Act to revive and continue, until the Fifth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and four, and to amend feveral Acts passed in the Twenty feventh, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign for the more effectual Encouragement of the British Fisheries; and to continue, until the Fourteenth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and three, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, fo much of an Act of the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the prohibiting the Importation of Foreign wrought Silks and Velvets.

An Act to permit British built Ships to carry on the Fisheries in the Pacific Ocean without Licence from the East India Company or South Sea Com-

An Act to continue, until the Eighth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament for staying Proceedings in Actions under the Statute of King Henry the Eighth for abridging Spiri ual Perfons from having Pluralities of Livings, and of taking of Farms; and also to stay Proceedings in Actions under an Act of the Thirteenth Year of Queen Elizabeth touching Leafes of Benefices and other Ecclefiastical Livings with Cure.

An Act for vesting certain Lands and Hereditaments in Trustees for promoting the Service of His Majesty's Ordnance at Woolwich.

An Act for repealing Two Acts made in the Thirty fecond and Thirty-fix:h Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for the more effective Administration of the Office of a Justice of the Peace in fuch Parts of the Counties of Middlefex and Surrey, as lie in and near the Metropolis, and for the more effectual Prevention of Felonies, and for making other Provisions in lieu thereof, and for increasing the Salaries of the Justices at the Thames Police Office until the First Day of June One thousand eight hundred and feven, and from thence to the End of the then next Seffion of Parliament.

An Act for the Preservation of the Health and Morals of Apprentices and others employed in Cotton and other Mills, and Cotton and other Factories.

An Act to amend an Act made in the Twentyfecond Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty for the better Relief and Employment of the Poor, so far as relates to the Payment of the Debts incurred

for building any Poor-House.

An Act to extend the Provisions of an Act made in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesly, intituled An Act for repealing so much of an Act made in the Twenty-third Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, as relates to the preventing the stealing or destroying of Turnips, and for the more effectually preventing the stealing or destroying of Turnips, Potatoes, Cabbages, Parsnips, Pease, and Carrots," to certain other Field Crops, and to Orchards, and for amending the faid Act.

An Act for repealing so much of an Act made in the Second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better supplying the Cities of London and Westminster with Fish, and to reduce the present exorbitant Price thereof, and to protect and encourage Fishermen," as limits the Number of Fish to be fold by Wholesale within the faid City of London, and for the better Regulation of the Sale of Fish by Wholesale in the Market

of Billingsgate within the said City.

An Act to remove Doubts as to certain Acts relating to the Admeasurement of Coals in the City and Liberty of Westminster, and Parts adjacent, and to revive and continue an Act passed in the Twentyfixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty re-lating to the Admeasurement of Coals within the Limits aforesaid, and to indemnify all Persons who have acted in pursuance of any of the Provisions of the faid Act.

An Act for altering and amending an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled an A& for widening, improving, regulating, paving, cleanfing, and lighting the Streets, Lanes, and other public Passages and Places within the King's Town of Maidstone, in the County of Kent, for removing and preventing Encroachments, Obstructions, Nuisances, and Annoyances therein, for better supplying the said Town with Water, and for repairing the Highways within the Parish of Maidstone, and for railing a further Sum of Money for completing the Purpoles of the faid Act.

An Act for amending an Act passed in the Fourteenth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majetty, intituled An Act for making and eltablishing public Quays or Wharfs at Kingston-upon-Hull, for the better securing His Majesty's Revenues of Customs, and for the Benefit of Commerce in the Port of Kingston-upon-Hull, for making a Bason or Dock, with Refervoirs, Sluices, Roads, and other Works for the Accommodation of Veffels using the faid Port, and for appropriating certain Lands belonging to His Majesty, and for applying certain Sums of Money out of His Majesty's Customs at the said Port for those Purpoles, and for establishing other necessary Regulations within the Town and Port of Kingston upon Hull, and also for making additional Balons or Docks at Kingston-upon Hull, with an Entrance into the same from the River Humber, and for granting certain Lands belonging to His Majesty in Aid of the faid Works.

An Act for amending, altering, and extending the Powers of feveral Acts of Parliament now in

force for fupplying the City of Dublin with Water, and for making better Provision for that Purpose.

An Act for vefling divers Estates in the Parishes of Bradford and Calverley, in the West Riding of the County of York, purchased for the Benesit of the Proprietors of the Bradford Canal Navigation, in Trustees, upon certain Trusts discharged from all Claims of the Crown, in respect of any Forseiture incurred under or by virtue of the Laws or Statutes of Mortmain.

An Act for repealing an Act passed in the Thirty-second Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for improving the Navigation of the River Medway from the Town of Maidstone, through the several Parishes of Maidstone, Boxley, Allington, and Aylesford, in the County of Kent, and for the better and more effectually improving the Navigation of the said River.

An Act for feuing the Glebe of the Parish of the Barony of Glasgow, in the County of Lanark.

An Act for dividing, inclosing, draining, and preserving the Open Fields, Half Years Meadow Land, Common Pastures, Moors, and Waste Lands within the Parish of Saxelby, in the County of Lincoln, and Townships of Harby and Broadholn, in the County of Nottingham.

An Act to empower the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Councilmen of the Borough of Boston, in the County of Lincoln, to take down the Bridge over the River Witham, in the said Borough, and to erect a Bridge over some other Part of the said River within the said Borough, and to open and make proper Avenues, Ways, and Passages thereto; and to enlarge and improve the Gaol and House of Correction within the said Borough; and to purchase and take down several Houses for the Purposes aforesaid.

An Act for making and repairing the Road from Causeway Head, near Stirling, through the County of Clackmannan, by the Foot of the Ochil Hills, and by West Saline and Crossfoord, towards Queensferry, and certain Roads branching out of the same, and for converting the Statute Labour in the said County of Clackmannan.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of several Acts passed in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, and in the Third and Eighteenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing, widening, and amending the Roads from the Town of Uttoxeter to the Town of Newcastle-under Lyme, and from Cliste Bank to Snape Marsh, and also from Lower Lane to Hem Heath, all in the County of Stafford.

Hem Heath, all in the County of Stafford.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act, passed in the Thirty-third Year of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Third, intituled An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Moot Hall in Wirksworth, to the Turnpike-Road leading from Derby to Braslington, at or near to a Place called the Cross in the-Hand on Hulland-Ward, and also the Road from the said Moot-Hall to another Turnpike-Road leading from the Cross Pott on Wirksworth-Moor to Mathock-Bath, at or near to a Place called The Steeple House, in the Township of Wirksworth aforesaid, all in the County of Derby.

An Act to continue the Term, and alter and enlarge the Powers of feveral Acts heretofore passed for repairing the Road from Dunchurch to Stonebridge, in the County of Warwick.

An Act for making and maintaining, and for watching, lighting, and watering a Road from the West India Docks in the Isle of Dogs to communicate with a Street called Church Lane, or Church Street, Whitechapel, and for making and maintaining a Branch of Road therefrom to communicate with Queen Street, in the Parish of Saint Anne, all in the County of Middlefex, for opening, widening, and improving certain Streets and Passages therein mentioned, and for more effectually amending and keeping in Repair a Road from Ratclisse-Highway through Cannon Street, in the County of Eslex; and also from the West End of Brooks Street into Cable Street, and from Upper Shadwell-Street into the Back Lane, in the said County of Middlesex.

An Act for authorifing the Persons therein named to concur on the Part of Peter de Salis, Esquire, and the other Persons entitled under the Settlement executed by Jerome de Salis, Esquire, and Mary his Wife, and the Will of the said Mary de Salis in making a Partition of certain Estates, late of the Right Hono rable Susanna Viscountes Fane, situate in the Counties of Armagh, Limerick and Tipperary, in that Part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Ireland.

An Act for velting certain Trust Estates, Stocks, Funds, and Securities of which John Beardsworth, Esquire, and Thomas Williams, Esquire, were Trustees, in James Palmer Hobbs, Esquire, and

George Burley, Gentleman.

An Act to enable John Skynner, Esquire, and Bigoe Charles Williams, Gentleman, on Behalf of John Perry and James Perry, Infants, who are entitled to undivided Shares in certain Copyhold Messuages, Lands, and Hereditaments situate within the Manor of Tottenham, otherwise Tottenhall, in the Patish of Saint Paneras, in the County of Middlefex, late the Estate of Catherine Whitehead deceased, to concur with the Owners of the several other undivided Shares of the same Copyhold Hereditaments in making a Partition and Division thereof, and to enable the said John Skynner and Bigoe Charles Williams to sell or mortgage a competent Part of the Shares of the said Infants therein, and to apply the Money arising thereby under the Direction of the Court of Chancery for the Maintenance and Advancement of the said Infants, to make such Surrenders of their Shares as may be necessary.

An Act for exonerating and discharging Parcel of the Possessina of the Prebendary of the Prebend of Prees, otherwise Pipa Minor founded in the Cathedral Church of Lichsield, in the County of Stafford, of and from a certain Lease made thereof, and for authorising the Sale of the Mines and Minerals within the Premises comprised in such Lease;

and for other Purposes.

An Act for vefting Part of the Estates devised by the Will of John Paul, Esquire, situate in the County of Wilts, in John Paul Paul, Esquire, in Fee Simple, discharged from the Uses and Trusts of the said Will, in exchange for an Estate, in the County of Gloucester, and for vesting the Residue of the said devised Estates, in the County of Wilts, in Trustees to be sold, and for applying the Monies to arise by such Sale under the Direction of the Court of Chancery, in the Purchase of other Estates to be settled in lieu thereof, and to the same Uses.

An Act for dividing, allotting, and inclosing the Open and Common Fields, Common Pastures, and other Commonable Lands and Waste Grounds, within the several Townships or Hamlets of Sewerby and Marton, and within the Manor of Sewerby cum-Marton, in the Parish of Bridlington, in the East Riding of the County of York.

An Act for dividing, allotting, and inclosing the Open Arable Fields, Meadows, Pastures, Ing., Carr Common, and Waste Lands and Grounds within the Township of Flexton, otherwise Fleeceton, in the Parish of Folkton, in the East Riding of the

County of York.

An Act for altering, amending, and rendering more effectual an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled An Act for dividing and allotting a certain Fen, called Wildmore Fen, in the County of Lincoln, and for dividing, allotting in Severalty, and inclosing the Parochial or General Allotments set out, or to be set out, in pursuance of the said Act, for compensating for the Tithes of such Allotments, and for declaring and determining to what Parish or Parishes the several Allotments of the said Fen shall belong.

An Act for dividing, allotting, and inclosing the Common, and Open Fields, Common Meadows, and other commonable Lands, and Waste Grounds in the Parishes of Shitlington, and Holwell in the

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Seffion of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three, and amend an Act of the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, and to continue, for the same Period, an Act of the last Session of Parliament, for prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and for permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions, without Payment of Duty; it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall be lawful for

His Majelly, his Heirs and Successors, and he and they is and are thereby authorifed, with the Advice of his or their Privy Council, during the Continuance of the faid Act, from Time to Time, when, and as often as the same shall be judged expedient, to prohibit generally, or under and subject to such Restrictions, Regulations, and Provisions as shall be specified by His said Majesty, in any Order in Council, the Exportation from any Part of Great Britain of any Articles of Provision; and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition, either in Part or in the Whole, or to make any new Regulations, Restrictions, and Provisions relating thereto, as Circumstances may require, any Thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary thereof notwithstanding; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers given by the said Act, is pleased to order. and it is hereby ordered, that from the Twelfth Day of this instant June, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three, no Person or Persons whosoever shall export, or shall load or lay on board any Ship or Vellel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain any of the following Articles, viz. Bullso Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, or any Bacon, Butter, Onions, or Pulse of any Sort, or any Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of fuch and fo much of any of the faid Articles as shall be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vessel on its Voyage out and Home for the Suftenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Paffengers, and others on board such Ship or Vessel, or for the Use and Sustenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on board fuch Ship or Vessel; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Vessels in His Majesty's Service; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forces, Forts, or Garrisons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of fuch and To much of any of the faid Articles as may be necelfary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the faid Articles for the necessary Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the said Company; nor to prohibit the Exportation to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, or to any of His Majesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the necessary Use of the Inhabitants of the same respectively, in fuch Quantities as shall be judged to be necessary by the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, upon Application to be made from Time to Time, and under Licences to be granted by their Lordships; or without such Licences, provided Proof shall be made to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs that the

British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to Order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation from any Port of Great Britain to any Port of Ireland, of any of the Articles above-mentioned, provided the Persons so exporting the same shall enter into Bonds, with sufficient Sureties, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, for the due landing thereof in the Ports in Ireland for which the fame shall be respectively cleared out; and shall also comply with all other Conditions which now are, or may hereafter be required by Law in respect to such Exportation:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to

order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit at any Time any Person or Persons from shipping or putting on board any of the Articles above mentioned, to be carried from any Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of Great Britain, to any other Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, having such, or the like Coast Sufferance, Coquet, or other Coast Dispatch for that Purpose, and on such and the like Security being given for the landing and discharging the fame, as now is, or hereafter may be by any Law or Laws, Act or Acts, required in relation to the carrying Coastwise any Corn or other Articles, or any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majelty's Treasury are to give the necessary Di-W. Fawkener. rections herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " An Act for enabling His Majelly to prohibit the " Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, " and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, to continue in force until Six Weeks from the " Commencement of the next Session of Parliament," (which Act, by subsequent Acts, has been further continued until Forty Days after the Commencement of the present Session of Parliament,) His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Tenth Day of December One thousand eight hundred, to order, (and it was thereby ordered,) that the Prohibition contained in an Order made by His Majesty in Council, on the Sixteenth Day of October One thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine, on the Exportation, or the loading or laying on board any Ship or Vessel with Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain, any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peale, Beans, Oats, or any Meal, or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof, should be, and continue in force until the Expiration of Forty Days after the Commencement of the First Session of Parliament that should be begun and holden after | January One thousand eight hundred and three :

Articles fo to be exported as aforefaid are not of the First Day of September One thousand eight hundred and one: excepting, nevertheless, out of fuch Prohibitions, any foreign Corn, or Meal, or Flour, that should have been imported and Warehoused in the Manner, and under the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act " for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty of foreign "Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British "Corn exported," and should not have been taken out of fuch Wavehouse for Home Consumption, and with Exception also as to the carrying Coastwife, or carrying out, or the Exportation of the several Sorts of Corn, and other Articles as aforesaid, from Great Britain, for any of the Purpoles mentioned in the faid Act:
