THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was fent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorifed by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Ass agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immedia: Attendance of this Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An Act to authorise the licensing an Additional

Number of Hackney Coaches.

An Act to enabling the Lord High Treasurer of Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury of Ireland, for the Time being, to sell, lease, convey, or dispose of the Parliament House, in the City of Dublin, and all the Premises and Appurtenances thereunto belonging to the Governor and Company of the Bank of Ireland.

An Act to amend and render more effectual Two Acts passed in the Twenty sixth and Thirty-second Years of the Reign of His present Majelty, for the

Reduction of the National Debt.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of Army and their Quarters.

An Act for amending so much of an Act passed in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His present Majefty as relates to the fecreting, embezzling, or destroying any Letter or Packet sent by the Post, and for the better Protection of such Letters and Packets, and for more effectually preventing Letters and Packets being fent otherwise than by the Post.

An Act to enable His Majelly to avail himself of the Offers of certain Yeomanry and Volunteer

Corps to continue their Services.

An Act to revive and further continue until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, and amend so much of an Act made in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, as grants certain Allowances to Adjutants and Serjeant-Majors of Mi-

litia disembodied under an Act of the same Session of Parliament.

An Act to enable His Majesty to accept and continue the Services of certain Troops or Companies of Yeomanry in Ireland.

An Act for making Allowances, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, in certain Cases, to Subaltera

Officers of the Militia of Ireland during Peace.

An Act to authorife the fending and receiving of Letters and Packets, Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and Printed Newspapers by the Post free from the Duty of Postage by the Members of the Two Houses of Parliament of the United Kingdom, and by certain Public Offices therein named; and for reducing the Postage on such Votes, Proceedings, and Newspapers when sent by any other Persons.

An Act to enable such Officers, Mariners, and Soldiers as have been in the Land or Sea Service, or in the Marines, or in the Militia, or any Corps of Fencible Men, fince the Twenty-fourth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to exercise Trades.

An Act for directing certain Public Accounts to be laid annually before Parliament, and for discon-tinuing certain other Forms of Account now in

An Act to amend the Laws for the better Regulation of the Linen Manufacture in Ireland.

An Act for repealing feveral Acts made in the Thirty-fifth, Thirty-fixth, and Thirty-ninth, and Fortieth Years of the Reign of His prefent Majefty, relating to the Admission of certain Articles of Merchandize in Neutral Ships, and to the issuing of Orders in Council for that Purpose, and for making other Provisions in lieu thereof, to continue until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four.

An Act to continue, until the Twenty-ninth Day of September One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made in the Parliament of Ireland in the Thirty-seventh Year of the Reign of His prespire fent Majesty, for regulating the Import, Export and Sale of Coffee, and fecuring the Duties page able thereon; and also for securing the Duties pays able on Licences to Persons in Ireland, not being Maltsters or Makers of Malt, felling Malt by Com mission or otherwise.
