WE, the Mayor, Jurats, and Inhabitants of the ancient Town of Winchelsea, beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our most grateful Acknowledgments for restoring to your People the invaluable Blessing of Peace.

Though we greatly lament those calamitous Events which have taken place on the extensive Theatre of the present War, it is with the utmost Satisfaction we contemplate, that those wild and anarchical Designs have been frustrated, which every where threatened both the Throne and the Altar, and that a Contest which involved in it the dearest Interests of Society, has come to a happy, and we hope solid, Termination. It is to the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, under Providence, that we are indebted for carrying us through the unprecedented Difficulties in which we have been engaged, and calling into animated Exertion the Powers and Patriotism of the Nation. Great in Arts as well as Arms they will now turn their Attention to cultivating the Blessings of Peace, and enlarging the Wealth and Resources of your Majesty's United Kingdom;—united not only in territorial Arrangement, but in the most ardent and pious Wishes, that your Majesty may enjoy a long and happy Reign over a loyal and affectionate People.
