A PROCLAMATION,

For Dissolving this present Parliament, and declaring the Calling of another.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Seventeenth Day of August next: We do, for that End, publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Tuesday the said Seventeenth Day of August next. And We being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our People, and to have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving Subjects Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, that, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have given Order that Our Chancellor of that Part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, and Our Chancellor of Ireland do, respectively, upon Notice thereof, forthwith issue out Writs in due Form, and according to Law for calling a new Parliament: And We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require Writs forthwith to be issued accordingly by Our said Chancellors respectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, who are to serve in Our said Parliament, to be duly returned to and give their Attendance in Our said Parliament; which Writs are to be returnable on Tuesday the Thirty-first Day of August next.

A PROCLAMATION,

In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have, in Our Council, thought fit, to declare Our Pleasure for Summoning and Holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland on Tuesday the Thirty-first Day of August next ensuing the Date hereof: In Order therefore, to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the Advice of our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy-Rood House, in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Tenth Day of August next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers, to sit and vote in the House of Peers, in the said ensuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Witnesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law). And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and, immediately after such Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and sign and attest the same, in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors; and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said City, to take especial Care to Preserve the Peace thereof during the Time of the said Election; and to prevent all



Manner of Riots, Tumults, Disorders and Violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command, that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twenty-five Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Witness Ourselves at Windsor the Twenty-ninth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and two, in the Forty-second Year of Our Reign.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, early on Saturday Morning last, a large and valuable Rick of Hay, the Property of Messrs. Thomas and Mawbey Tugwell, of Bradford, in the County of Wilts, was maliciously set on Fire, and entirely consumed; and whereas also an anonymous threatening Letter was found under the Door of the Work-shops of the said Messrs. T. and M. Tugwell, of which the following is a Copy, viz.

Death or Glory to you T & M Tugwell We will Burn you and your Horfcis we will Cut your heart out and Eat him you ot to have your Dam heart Cut out of your Body you will Go to Hell for Starveing the poor thee Shot Shaw fly by night for some of you.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the above-Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the same,) who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas it has been represented to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that, on Sunday the 6th Day of June instant, as William Woodard and Five other Boatmen, in the Service of the Customs, belonging to the Six-Oared Boat under the Command of Mr. Simon Baspall, Sitter, were out upon Duty on the Cliff at Southwold, about Three o'Clock in the Morning, they discovered a Lug-Sail Vessel and a Lug-Sail Boat (marked on the Stern Fly of Rye) within her, Sailing to the Northward, close to the Shore, and pursuing the same along the Shore as far as Easton Cliff, they were there met by Nine stout Sailors, one of whom appeared to be the Master, all armed with Muskets and Cutlasses; that the Officers saw them load their Muskets as they approached, and, upon their coming up, they told the said Officers that they had Goods and did not mean to lose them, and desired the said Officers to turn back as far as the Hedge, otherwise they would fire upon them; that the said Officers were thereupon obliged to retreat, and, after being detained and guarded by the said Sailors for a considerable Time, they were then compelled to go to a Public-House at South Cove, where they were likewise confined and guarded by the said armed Sailors until Seven o'Clock in the Evening, during which Time the Whole of the Goods were, as it is supposed, carted off from the Shore and carried up the Country;

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Felony, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of the said Offenders who shall discover any One or more of his Accomplices, so that any One or more of the said Offenders may be apprehended for the said Offence.

 “ alarming to all Spectators but the next will be
 “ more dreadful and astonishing to your beholders—
 “ for my part i dont much admire doing such busi-
 “ nesses as that where no profit attends it—I think
 “ I shall take another Plea upon Alafons as i un-
 “ derstand he his not wanting of Money— but if you
 “ —will fulfill my desire I will rest where i am
 “ tho' I must have one turn upon Alafon—After
 “ your property destroying will be your persons
 “ depend upon it”

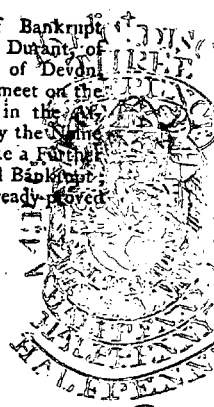
