Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that a Number of Persons unlawfully, riotously, and tumultuously assembled, did, about One o' Ciock on Thursday Morning the 22d Instant, seloniously break into and enter a Fuling and Machine Mill, called Littleton Mill, situate in the Tything of Littleton, in the Parish of Steeple Ashton, in the County of Wills, belonging to Mr. Francis Naish, of Tronbridge, in the said County, Clothier, in the Occupation of Mr. Ralph Heath, and after breaking open and entering the said Mill, did riotously, maliciously, and wilfully set Fire to the same, by which the whole Building, with the Fulling-Stocks, Water-Wheels, and Apparatus thereto belonging, and also the Machines and Stock in Trade therein, to a very considerable Amount, were totally destroyed.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Felony above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, to any One of them who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
