WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to His Majesty, that on Saturday the 19th Instant, about Half-past Two o'Clock in the Morning, Mr. Archibald Weatherston, Coast Waiter, in the Service of the Customs, at Budle, within the Port of Berwick, being out upon Duty, and attempting to examine a Cart which he met upon the Road leading from Sunderland to the Wigh,

was at a Place called Newham-How-Ways, most barbarously and inhumanly beaten by Three Men, one of whom was on Horseback, and the other Two in the Cart, who seized him and knocked him down with Bludgeons, and afterwards tied his Hands behind his Back, and his Legs together, and then left him bleeding, and almost senseless in consequence of the Wounds which he had received. From the Conversation which passed between them there is Reason to believe that the said Three Men were Smugglers belonging to Boomer, and one of them said, in Answer to the Complaints of the said Archibald Weatherston, that he had himself been worse used by an Excise Officer;

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Outrage, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of the said Offenders who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices, so that any One or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

*Description of the Smugglers.*

One of the said Men was stout made, about Five Feet Seven or Eight Inches high, had on a Drab Jacket, round Faced, and spoke the Scotch Language quick, and apparently about Thirty Years of Age; another of the said Men was rather slender made, about Five Feet Eight Inches high, had on a Brown Coat, thin faced, Black Complexion, and rather ruddy, and between Forty and Fifty Years of age; the Third cannot be accurately described.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that a Number of Persons unlawfully, riotously, and tumultuously assembled, did, about One o'Clock on Thursday Morning the 22d Instant, feloniously break into and enter a Fulling and Machine Mill, called Littleton-Mill, situate in the Tything of Littleton, in the Parish of Steeple Aston, in the County of Wills, belonging to Mr. Francis Naisb, of Trounbridge, in the said County, Clothier, in the Occupation of Mr. Ralph Heath, and after breaking open and entering the said Mill, did riotously, maliciously, and wilfully set Fire to the same, by which the whole Building, with the Fulling-Stocks, Water-Wheels, and Apparatus thereto belonging, and also the Machines and Stock in Trade therein, to a very considerable Amount, were totally destroyed.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Felony above mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon, to any One of them who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
