**H**IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order the Right Honorable the Lord High Chancellor to issue Writs for proroguing the Parliament, which was appointed to meet on Tuesday the Thirty-first Day of this instant August, to Tuesday the Fifth Day of October next; and also for proroguing the Convocations of Canterbury and York, which were appointed to meet on Wednesday the First Day of September next, to Wednesday the Sixth Day of October next.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to permit the Importation and Exportation of certain Goods and Commodities into and from the Port of Road Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, and from thence until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament:" It is declared to be expedient that certain Articles, Goods, and Commodities, enumerated in certain Acts passed in the Twenty-seventh, Thirty-second, and Thirty-third Years of His Majesty's Reign, should be permitted by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to be imported from Countries and Plantations in America, and the West Indies, belonging to, or under the Dominion of any foreign European Sovereign or State, into the Port of Road Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, one of the Virgin Islands, and to be exported from thence to this Kingdom, in the same Manner, and subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, and Restrictions, and to the same Penalties and Forfeitures for the Breach thereof, as are provided with Respect to the Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, one of the Bahama Islands, or in any other Act or

Acts of Parliament, for amending or continuing the same, and subject to such other Rules, Regulations, Conditions, and Restrictions, as shall be directed by His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid; and it is enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, and until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, and from thence until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the then next Session of Parliament, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit the Importation into the said Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, One of the Virgin Islands, and the Exportation from thence to this Kingdom of all such Articles, Goods, and Commodities, as are permitted by the said Acts to be imported into the said Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, One of the Bahama Islands, and to be exported from thence to this Kingdom; and that such Articles, Goods, and Commodities shall and may be imported and exported in the same Manner, and shall be subject to the same Duties, and entitled to the same Drawback, and shall be subject to the same Rules, Regulations, Conditions, and Restrictions, and to the same Penalties and Forfeitures for the Breach thereof as are provided in the said Acts, or any of them, respecting such Importation into the said Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, and the Exportation from thence to this Kingdom, and shall be subject to such other Rules, Regulations, Conditions, and Restrictions as shall from Time to Time be directed by His Majesty, by and with the Advice aforesaid; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to permit, and doth by this His Order in Council permit, during the Time limited by the said Act, the Importation into the said Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola, One of the Virgin Islands, from Countries and Plantations in America and the West Indies, belonging to or under the Dominion of any Foreign European Sovereign or State, of all such Articles, Goods, and Commodities enumerated in the said above-recited Acts, passed in the Twenty-seventh, Thirty-second, and Thirty-third Years of His Majesty's Reign, as are permitted by the said Acts to be imported into the said Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, One of the Bahama Islands, and also the

Exportation thereof from the said Port of Road-Harbour, in the Island of Tortola aforesaid, in the same Manner, and subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, and Restrictions, and to the same Penalties and Forfeitures for the Breach thereof, as are provided in the said Acts, or any of them, respecting such Importation into the said Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, and the Exportation from thence to this Kingdom, and subject also to the Conditions, Rules, and Regulations hereinafter-mentioned; that is to say, that before any Sugar or Coffee, the Produce of Tortola and its Dependencies, shall be permitted or suffered to be shipped or laden on board any Ship or Vessel, each and every Package shall be stamped or marked by the proper Officer of the Customs in Roman Letters, of not less than Two Inches in Length, with the Words *BRITISH PA.*; that all Sugar and Coffee, not being the Produce of any of the British Plantations, Islands, or Territories, shall, upon Importation into Road-Harbour, be laid on Land and examined, and shall be deposited in safe and secure Warehouses under the joint Locks of His Majesty and the Owner or Proprietor of such Sugar and Coffee, and the same shall not be afterwards shipped or laden on board any Ship or Vessel, unless directly from such Warehouses (upon due Entry thereof being first made), under the Care and Inspection of the proper Officer of the Customs; and before any such Sugar or Coffee shall be permitted or suffered to be shipped or laden on board any Ship or Vessel, each and every Package shall be stamped or marked by the proper Officer of the Customs, in Roman Letters of not less than Two Inches in Length, with the Word *FOREIGN*; and shall also be numbered progressively: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY,

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled An Act to alter and amend an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act for rendering more commodious, and for better regulating, the Port of London, so far as the same relates to the Concerns of the West India Dock Company thereby established, and for extending to other Objects the Compensations directed to be

made by the said Act, it is (amongst other Things) enacted as follows :

“ And be it further enacted, That when any one or more of the said Docks, by the said recited Act and this Act authorized to be made and built by the said Directors, with the Basen or Basons, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works belonging or to belong thereto, shall be so far completed that in the Judgment of the Lord High Treasurer, or any Three or more of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, the same shall be fit for the Reception of Ships and Goods respectively, it shall be lawful for the said Lord High Treasurer, or any Three or more of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, and he and they are hereby respectively authorized and empowered by Writing under his or their Hand or Hands, to certify and make known the same ; which Certificate shall be published Three Times at the least in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers then usually circulated in London ; and the said Certificate, so published as aforesaid, shall be deemed sufficient Notice to all Parties interested of the Completion of the Dock or Docks, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works, concerning which, such Certificate of Approbation shall be made ; and from and after the Expiration of Ten Days next ensuing the first Publication of the said Certificate, in Manner aforesaid, all the Rates and Duties by the said recited Act and this Act made payable to the said West India Dock Company, for Ships and Vessels entering into and using any of the said Docks, or any of the Basons and Cuts belonging, or which shall belong thereto, and also for any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize which shall be landed or discharged from any Ship or Vessel lying within any of the said Docks, or any of the Basons or Cuts belonging, or which shall belong thereto, shall commence, take Effect, and become payable ; and then and from thenceforth such of the Quays and Wharfs then made or built by the said Company ; as shall be described in such Certificate to be fit for the Reception of Goods, shall be deemed and taken to be legal Quays and Wharfs accordingly ; and all the Provisions in the said recited Act contained, relating to the Increase of Interest or Dividends from and after the Completion of the said Docks, Cuts, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works, and for compelling Ships and Vessels that shall arrive in the River Thames, with West India Produce on board, to unload and land the Whole of such Produce within some or one of the said Docks, or on the Quays or Wharfs belonging, or which shall belong thereto, and for causing the King's Duties in respect of the same to be ascertained at such Quays or Wharfs, and not elsewhere, and compelling such Ships and Vessels belonging to or frequenting the Port of London, as shall be used or employed in the West India Trade, to ship or take in their respective Cargoes, and be loaded either in some or one of the said Docks, or in such Part of the River Thames as shall be below the Entrance into the intended Canal at Blackwall aforesaid, shall take Effect and be in full Force and Operation ; and the said Term of Twenty-one Years, during which the aforesaid Provisions are to be in force,

shall commence at and be computed from the Expiration of Ten Days from the Time of the first Publication of the said Certificate as before-mentioned, any Thing in the said recited Act contained to the contrary notwithstanding.”

We the undersigned Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do, in pursuance of the said Act of the last Session of Parliament, certify, and make known, that the following Works made and erected by the said West India Dock Company under the Authority of the said Acts of Parliament, are so far completed, that in our Judgment the same are fit for the Reception of Ships and Goods respectively, viz. The Entrance Basen at the East End of the said Works, the Great Dock, Three Warehouses on the North Side of the said Dock numbered 2, 4. and 8 : and the Quays or Wharfs from the North Side of the Lock, at the East Entrance of the said Dock, along the North Side of the same Dock, and terminating at the North Side of the Lock at the West Entrance of the said Dock.

Whitehall, August 10, 1802.

*Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that many daring and alarming Outrages have been lately committed by Persons unlawfully assembling, armed and disguised. And that on or about the following Times, viz.*

April 22d last, A large Hay-Rick ; and a few Days afterwards, a Dog Kennel and Oat Rick belonging to Mr. Warren, of Warminster, Wilts, was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire.

May 20, the Cart of Mr. Bayley, of Calstone-Mills, near Devizes, returning from Warminster, was stopped on the Downs (by Five Men, Four of whom had their Faces disguised, and a Sixth Man holding their Coats at a Distance,) and the Driver compelled to leave the Cart whilst the Men cut and otherwise injured the Cloths therein.

June 23, A Gun was fired in the Night into the Window of a House occupied by a Workman of Messrs. Bleek and Strode at Warminster : About the same Time a Rick of Hay belonging to Mr. Dunn, of Trowbridge, was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire.

June 26, A large Rick of Hay belonging to Messrs. T. and M. Tugwell, of Bradford, was also wilfully and maliciously set on Fire ; and a threatening Letter was, about the same Time, put under the Door of the Workshops of, and addressed to the said Messrs. T. and M. Tugwell.

June 29, In the Night a Gun was fired into the Chamber of the Dwelling-House of Mr. Henry Wansey, of Warminster, in the County of Wilts.

July 6, In the Night, a Gun was fired into the House of John Jones, and another, immediately afterwards, into the House of — Baker, both

Workmen to Mr. Henry Wanley; and the same Night a Gun was fired into the House of Mr. Stancomb, Manufacturer, at Trowbridge.

July 13, In the Night, a Barn, Stable, &c. the Property of Mr. G. Warren, Manufacturer, at Warminster, was wilfully and maliciously set Fire to, and wholly consumed;—and an anonymous Letter was sent to another Manufacturer at Warminster about this Time, threatening, by Almighty God, to have his Life within a Month.

July 14, In the Night, the Factory of Messrs. Jones, Hart, Jones, and Co. at Staverton, near Bradford, was attacked by an Armed Body of Men, who fired many Rounds of Bullets, Slugs, &c. which demolished the Windows, and did other Damage.

July 16, This Night Clifford Mill and Premises, near Beckington, Somerset, the Property of Mr. Newton, was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire and wholly destroyed.

July 22, The Mills at Littleton, in the Parish of Steeple Ashton, Wilts, belonging to Mr. Naish, of Trowbridge, were attacked by an armed Body of Men, (many of whom had their Faces blacken'd,) and who wilfully and maliciously set Fire to, and wholly destroyed the same, with the Machinery and Stock in Trade therein to a very considerable Amount, after which they went away threatening Destruction to other Mills.

July 24, This Night Two Ricks of Hay, the Property of Mr. Newman, Manufacturer, of Melksham, were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire.

July 28, The Factory at Staverton, belonging to Messrs. Jones and Co., was again attacked by an armed Body of Men, who fired from Three different Parts at the Centinel on Duty.

July 29, In the Night, a Dwelling-House situate at Bearfield, near Bradford, the Property of John Jones, Esq. was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire and destroyed.

*His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the Felonies above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually set any of the several Premises and Matters aforesaid, on Fire, or who actually wrote the said Letters,) who shall discover his or their Accomplices or Accessories in any or either of the above Felonies, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.*

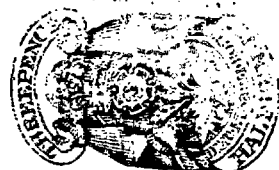

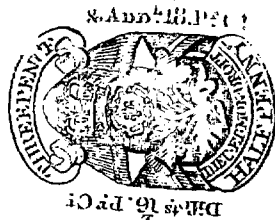
