

desired, he would not only order a strict search to be made for them, in which some of themselves might assist, and if found to be restored to them, but that the persons that had concealed them should be exemplarily punished; and because this search would require some time, his Excellency told them, that he required the Nations in the mean time to separate, and to return home. The Deputies desired his Excellency would please to find this answer to their Body by the Duke d' Arschot, a person very acceptable to them, which his Excellency accordingly did, and the Nations thereupon broke up their Assembly, and went quietly home. This morning the Prince of Osnabrug, who came hither two days since from Paris; parted from hence again on his way home, having with him a very handsome Train.

Brussels, Octob. 8. The Disorders that have of late happened here very much trouble all sober people, who fear they are incited by persons dissatisfied to the present Government, and consider, however it be, how dangerous these Consequences are. On Wednesday last the Nations assembled again, and continued together till this Evening, when they separated, upon the assurances the Duke de *Vila Hermosa* gave them, not only to preserve their Privileges, but to get them confirmed and augmented by the King: In the mean time the Rabble got together without sign to Plunder the Houses of the Magistrates, but in the Attempt some being killed and wounded, the rest dispersed, threatening to return with their Arms in their hands, but hitherto they have been prevented by the Guards that are kept, several Companies of the Trained Bands being now in Arms to secure the publick Peace. We are still impatiently expecting the Prince of Parma, who we hear brings with him 2000 Spanish Soldiers, and a considerable Sum of Money, besides which we are informed the Bankers of *Antwerp* have promised, upon the Orders they have from their Correspondents at *Madrid*, to pay the Prince of Parma, upon his arrival here 200000 Crowns, and an hundred thousand Crowns more monthly for the space of ten Months. The Marquis de *Bourgoanero* will part very suddenly for *Germany*, his Baggage being already gone.

Paris, Octob. 9. The Prince of *Conde* has his Argue again, and the Physicians have been sent for to *Chantilly*, where he is; The Dauphin has been likewise ill, but is now pretty well again.

Kinsale Sept. 24. Yesterday a Galliot Hoy of about 70 or 80 Tuns, Laden with white Oats and Wheate, having a green Griffin Carved in her Stern, with a blew Streak, and some white Flowers painted fore and aft, was brought in here by a Fishers Boat which met the said Vessel about a League to the Eastward of the Harbour, very near the Rock.

Falmouth, Sept. 27. On Friday and Saturday last were seen off this Harbour nine or ten great Ships, and much Shooting was heard from them; the occasion is thought to be the English Frigats meeting with the Prince of *Parma*.

Plymouth, Sept. 28. Yesterday morning Sailed from hence the *Kings-Fisher*, Captain *Kempthorne* Commander. This Evening came hither the Right Honourable the Earl of *Bath* and was received by the Militia in Arms, and other respects due to his Quality,

Deale, Octob. 2. Instructiions being given to several of His Majesties Ships to Cruise in order to meet the Prince of *Parma*, and to Convey him safe to *Ostend*, in pursuance of His Majesties Order in Council for that purpose; it happened that four of them, viz. the *Oxford*, *Phoenix*, *Pearle*, and *Guernsey*, fell in Company with him off of the *Lizard*, and brought him into the *Downs*, where having taken Pilots on Board, they stood on for *Ostend*. The *Newcastle*, *Woolwich*, and *Hunter*, three others of His Majesties Ships, were then Riding in the *Downs*, but there being no need of their assistance, they remain there.

London, Octob. 2. The 29th past being *Michaelmas* day, the Common Hall, according to custom, met, and Sir *Patience Ward* Knight was chosen Lord Mayor for the year ensuing, and the next day the new Sheriffs, Mr. *Beibel* and Mr. *Cornish*, were sworn at the Exchequer, and entred upon their Office.

Newmarket, Octob. 2. His Majesty, God be praised, enjoys a perfect health, and has declared his intention to return to *Whitehall* this day sevennight.
