A PROCLAMATION,

Requiring Puffes, formerly granted to Ships and Veffels trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, to be returned into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and other Paffes of different Forms to be iffued.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Thirty-first Day of December, in the Twenty-fourth Year of Our Reign, We did charge and command all Our loving Sub jects who then were, or should be, possessed of any Paffes for Ships and Veffels belonging to Our Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elsewhere, in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, (except such Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with New Passes,) that they should, before the Thirty-first Day of December One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, return the same, and furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for executing the Osfice of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, in such Manner as by the faid recited Proclamation was directed: And whereas it hath been humbly represented unto Us, that there is the greatest Reason to believe, that many of Our Passes may, either by Accident or undue Means, have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who by Colour of fuch Paffes may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premifes into Our Royal Confideration, and judging it necessary, to put a speedy Stop to all such indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of Our Trading Subjects, but may occasion a Misunder-

Coast of Barbary, for preventing thereof, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council. to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare, That the Passes of the present Form shall continue in Force for all Vessels failing from the Ports of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, during the present Year, in order to give sufficient Time to Our Trade to be furnished with Passes of the New Form; and that after the Expiration of that Time, no Passes but those of the New Form shall be considered as valid, except in the Cafe of Veffels returning from Forcign Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with New Passes: And we do hereby further declare, That in the Case of Vessels returning from Foreign Voyages, Passes of the present Form shall continue in Force during the Terms hereinafter mentioned; (that is to fay,) For Veffels returning from the Ports to the Northward of the Streights of Gibraltar, or from the Ports within the Mediterranean, in the West Indies, or in North America, to the Thirty-first of March next; For Vessels returning from the Western Coasts of Africa, to the Thirtieth of June next; For Vessels returning from the East Indies, and all other distant Parts, to the Thirtieth of June One thousand eight hundred and four; and for Vessels which may fail from the Ports of Our United Kingdom previous to the Thirty-first of December next, for a further Time of Two Months beyond the Periods above-mentioned, according to their respective Voyages: And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who are or shall be possessed of any such Passes, that they do, on or before the Expiration of the Periods hereinbefore mentioned respectively return the same into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of Our Customs at the Out-Ports of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of Our Foreign Plantations or Dominions, in order Aunding between Us and the Governments on the I to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish

themselves with Passes of the New Form, under the s Hands and Seals of Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, according to the Treaties subsisting between Us and the said Governments on the Coast of Barbary, and the Regulations made by Our Royal Predecessor King George the First, by Order in His Privy Council, on the Fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, so far as the same remain unaltered by the Regulations made by Us by Our Orders in Council, bearing Date respectively on the Twentyeighth Day of August One thousand seven hundred and seventy-fix, and on the Thirty-first Day of December One thousand seven hundred and eightythree, and according to the further Regulations then there made, and Our Instructions given to Our faid Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, touching the fame: And whereas many Ships and Vessels belonging to Our loving Subjects, continue several Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean, without returning Home, whereby they cannot so conveniently procure their Passes to be exchanged; We do hereby, for the Ease of Our Trading Subjects, publish and declare Our Pleasure, That upon the Application of any Owner of any Ship or Vessel, or other substantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and Oath made by him of the Property of fuch Ship or Vessel, and that Three-fourths of the Company are Our Subjects, according to an Act made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Our Royal Predecessor King Charles the Second, intituled, " An Act for encouraging " and increasing of Shipping and Navigation," or fuch other Proportion as may be authorized by Act of Parliament, and upon entering into a Bond for the Return of such Pass at the End of Three Years, or of the Voyage, if that shall sooner determine, it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively empowered to make out a New Pass for such Ship or Vessel, and fend the fame to such of Our Consuls in the Mediterranean as the faid Owner or Merchant shall defire, with Direction to fuch Conful, that, upon Application to him from the Master of the Ship, for which the Pass is made out, and surrendering up his Old Pass, and entering into Bond for the Return of fuch New Pass, he shall deliver out the faid New Pass to such Master, and transmit the Old one, with the Bond, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any Abuses that may be at-

tempted by Foreigners relating to the New Palles to be iffued as aforefaid; We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That all fuch New Paffes, to be hereafter iffued for any Ships and Veffels whatfoever, belonging to any of Our Subjects, inhabiting the Town and Corrifon of Gibraltar, shall be made out in a peculiar Form, different from the Form of the New Pastes, to be issued for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions; and that fuch New Passes shall be lodged with the Governor, Lieutenaut-Governor, or Commander in Chief for the Time being, of the faid Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, and issued out only by him, according to the Regulations made by Our faid Royal Predecessor King George the First, and Ourself in Council, as aforesaid: And the faid Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, and Commander in Chief, is hereby charged and required, not to iffue or deliver out any fuch Paffes to say Persons whatsoever, other than such as are really Our Subjects, inhabiting in the faid Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, and strictly to conform themfelves to the Regulations and Infiructions made and given as aforefaid: But in regard it fometimes happens, that Ships, belonging to Our Subjects of other Parts of Our Dominions, call in at Gibraltan without Passes, and have Occasion to be surnished therewith; We do, for the further Conveniency of Trade, hereby publish and declare Our Royal Will and Pleafure, That it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively hereby empowered, to lodge Mediterranean Palfes, of the same Form with the New Passes, for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions, in the Hands of Our Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief of the Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, with Directions to him to issue and deliver out such Passes to any of Our Subjects, not being Inhabitants of the faid Town and Garrison of Gibraltar; provided the Person or Perfons applying for the fame, do comply with and conform to the feveral Rules and Regulations now in Use, and required to be observed by such of Our other Subjects: And We do hereby order, That the Commissioners of Our Customs in Great Bris tain, and the Commissioners of Our Revenue in Ireland, do cause to be carried into Execution such Parts of the faid Order of Council of the Fourteenth Day of June One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, concerning Passes, as relate to themfelves, and the proper Officers under them, so far as the fame remains now in Force, and of Our Orders aforesaid, made in Council, on the Twentyeighth Day of August One thousand seven hundied and seventy-fix, and on the Thirty-first Day

of December One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three; and that they do direct their Officers in the several Ports of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to demand of the Masters of all Merchant Ships, so soon as they shall return into Port from a Foreign Voyage, all Passes granted as aforefaid, which shall be in their Possession, to be produced to the faid respective Officers of Our Cultoms; and if the same shall appear to be of an older Date than the Periods hereinbefore severally and respectively mentioned for the Return of the Passes of the present Form, then such Fasses shall be delivered up to the said respective Officers of Our Customs, and be by them returned to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in case the Master of any such Ship or Vessel shall refuse to produce or deliver up such Passes, according to the true Intent of Our faid Order, then the faid Officer shall certify the Name of every fuch Master, and of the Ship or Vessel, to Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or to Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, to the End that Directions may be given for putting the Bond, entered into on the granting any fuch Pass, in Suit: And all Our Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, and Commanders vin Chief of any of Our Islands, Colonies, or Plantations, Consuls residing in Foreign Parts, and all other Our Officers and Ministers whatsoever, and all other Our loving Subjects whom it may concern, are hereby respectively required and commanded to yield due Chedience unto, and strictly to observe all the Orders, Instructions, Regulations, and Directions before mentioned, on Pain of Our High Displeasure.

As feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercife their feveral Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Mujesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manusacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forseit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's

Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His

Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavour-ing to seduce any such Artiscer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majelty's Dominions, for the Purpoles aforefaid, fuch Juilice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before Some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffious: And if fuch Person shall refuse to give Securicy, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the

Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artisicer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or feduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impriforment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar-Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Of-

fence, forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Maiesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as fuch Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall feize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly suffer the fame to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office

under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His prefent Majesty: BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utenfil, or Implement whatfover, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of fuch Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers fuffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utenfils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
