This day was Published His Majesties Proclamation, Commanding all Papists, or reputed Papists, forthwith to depart from the Cities of London and Westminster, and from within Ten Miles of the same.

CHARLES R.

Hereas the Papifts, notwithstanding several Acts of Parliament to the contrary, do presume, upon the expiration of His Majesties Royal Proclamation bearing date the third day of December last, Commanding their Departure and Absence for Six Months, to Repair at this pre-· Sent to the Cities of London and Westminster in great Num'ers: The Kings most Excellent Majesty is therefore graciously pleased to Revive and Continue, His said former Proclamation, and deth by this His Royal Pro-clamation strictly Charge and Command all Papists, and Persons reputed Papists, and such as have been so within Six Months last past, That they and every of them do forthwith Depart from the said Cities of London and Westminster, and from all places within the distance of Ten Miles of the Jame, and that they or any of them do not presume to Return again upon any pretence whatsoever, within the space of Six Months from the Date of these Presents; And lest they or any of them should do the contrary, upon pretence of any License formerly granted by any of the Lords or others of His Majesties Privy Council, His Majesty doth bereby declare, That be bath caused all Licences of that nature formerly granted by any of the Lords or others of His Privy Council, to be revoked. And His Mijesty doth bereby further straitly Charge and Command all and every Fustice of the Peace, Constable, and others his Officers and Ministers of Fustice. within His said Cities, or either of them, and within Ten Miles of the same, That they do make strict search and Enquiry for, and with all rigour proceed against all and every Person and Persons who shall be found within the said Cities of London and Wellminster, and withinten Miles of the same, during the said space of Six Months, contrary to the effect of any of the Statutes, and the purport of this His Majesties Proclamation. Provided that nothing herein contained shall be construed to extend to any Person or Persons, who being formerly of the Popish Religion, have fully Conformed to the Protestant Religion in such manner as is by Law appointed, nor from the time of their respective Conformity, to such as shall bereafter in like manner Conform themselves.

Given at Our Court at Newmarket the Fourth day of Ollober 1680. In the Two and thirtieth year of Our Reign. Madrid. Sept. 19. The King, we are informed, has resolved to encrease his Navy, and in order thereunto to cause 32 n.w Men of War to be Built, and its said the Sieur Mells, a Hollander, who is here, is Treating with about the Building of 8 or 10 of them at Ansterdam; four of which are to be of 900, and the other four of 800 Tuns. Their Majesties intend to go and pasthe Autumn at Aranjuez, whither the Duke of Montalto will attend the King as Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber, and by that means his Journey for Flanders, where he is General of the Horse, will be deserted.

Dantzick, Sept. 25. The Letters we receive from Warfawtell us, That the Polish and Turkish Commissioners, after having had several Conscrences for the regularing the Limits, were seperated without coming to any agreement, the Turks being resolved not to part with any thing they are in possession of, and the Poles on the other side insisting upon their restoring several places which

they took in the late War.

Liniz, Sept. 25. The Emperor has frequent Confultations with the Duke of Lorrain and his chief Ministers concerning the Assairs of Germany and Hungary, which are at present in such a possure as that it is necessary a particular care should be had of them: For in Germany the Princes and States that are Neighbours to the French continue to complain of the hard usage they receive from them, and demand the Protection of the Emperor and the Empire; and in Hungary the Rebels are in a condition that makes them as little inclinable to Peace as ever, though some of the leading men, as Count Teckeley, and others, seem to be in a disposition to accept of the Terms which have been offered by the Emperor, or at least by his Commissioners.

Lipstadt, O.lob, 2. Two days fince passed through this place an Express, who was going to Berlin to give the Elector of Brandenburg an account, that the Frigats which Sail with his Commission had taken in the Road of Oflend a Spanish Man of War, called Charles the Second, and that they continued to Crui on the Coast of Flanders: It is said here that his Electoral Highness has given orders for the Building more Ships, intending to make himself considerable

Cologne, Octob. 4. The Prince of Nemburg is still with us, and as some think will continue here some time to make an Interest in favour of his Pretention to the Coadjutorship, in which he is countenanted by the Emperor; but our Elector cannot hither
