Lintz. Offob. 1. The 25th past parted from hence the Count de Thun, on his journey for England, whither he is sent by the Emperor, as his Envoye Extraordinary. The Duke of Lurrain is preparing for his departure for Inspruck. The Judges appointed for the Tryal of the Count of Zinzendorf, have concluded their Sei tence, but the fame is not yet made publick, which they exp & the Emperors Orders. to do. It is ag in very warmly discoursed at Court that the Emperor has resolved to raise eight new Regiments of Foot, fix of Hrfe, and fix of Dra goons, and that there will be a Fond established for the constant payment of them. We are told that there is very good news from Hurgary, viz. That the Imperial Troops have defeated several Parties of the Rebels, and that it was hoped they would be very fuddainly reduced to fuch a condition as would oblige them to make their Peace; though this docs not agree with the Account which some Persons that came lately hither from Hungary, gave of the posture and strength of the Malecontents.

Strasburg, Octob. 4. Several Persons in pursuance of the Edict, lately published by the Sovereign Chamber of Brifac, are gone thither to do Hommage to the French King, and to acknowledge him their Sovereign Lord, which its probable they would not do, could they promife themselves any Protection to support them in a refusal, which as things now fland, would expose them and their Estates to greater opptessions. At the! farce time the French Provost has given Orders for the putting up the Arms of France in all places, and the taking away those of the Emperor, where there are any. From Ratisbonne they write, that the Dyct has not hitherto been able to determine any thing in the matter of the Mint; and that the death of the Elector Palatine, and of the Elector of Saxon, has put a frop to all affairs in the Electoral Colledge, which will be removed, fo foon as the prefent Electors send their Deputies thither,

Cologne, O.Job. 8. The Bishop of Strasburg intends to part hence very suddainly; some say he purposes to return to France, to pass the Winter there; but others affure us, that he is going to his Diocess, to

adjust his Pretentions with the City of Strasburg, who on their tide, will without doubt, be very ready so agree to whatever can be thought reasonable, that is all pretence of disturbing them, may be taken away.

· Hamburg, Octob. 8. The fad condition of the City of Leipsick does very much affect all people here, as well in compassion to those afficted inhabitants, as belaufo of the Influence it has upon the Trade of these pairs: Our vagilirates on it no care for the preferring this City in Health, cauling thrich enquiry to be made concerning all Persons as well as Goods that come hither. Amsterdam, Octob. 11. There remaining so neediff ferences between this State and the Elector of Cot logne, concerning certain Jurisdictions which the later pretends to in Maeltricht, the States have offered to leave the same to the determination of a ommifsioners, to be appointed by both Parties. The King of Denmark having threatened to Grant Lett 1s.of Reprizals against the Subjects of this State, on ack count of a Danish Ship taken in the Indies; the States have ordered their Minister at Copenhagen to endeavour to prevent a thing that may have fo ill consequences. The Admirakies have been summoned to fend their Deputies to the Hague, to meet there on the 14th Instant, in order to the giving their Advice, e neerning an Equipage of 8 or 10 men of War, which it's faid is the figured, upon the pressing Instances of the Spanish Banoye, for the

securing the Coast of I landers.

Hague, Offob. 11. Upon the Inflances of the Spanish Envoye, concerning the putting some men of War to Sea, the States have Directed the respective Admiralties to send their Dopaties hithen, to consult with them in that Matter; The States have likewist offered a Placaet to be published, forbidding the Subjects of this State, to moself, by vintue of Commissions from any forreign Prince, the Ships or Goods of any of their Allies. The differences between this Province and that of Zealand, shift continuing, without any likely hoods of a composure; The States of Zealand are endeavouring to engage some of the other Provinces, to take part with

them

t hem, and for that purpose have sent their Deputies to Gron ngen, who have been very well received there; but the States of Holland feem very much to refent this manner of proceeding. The Stat s-General have sent Directions to the Sieur Dyckvelt, their Minister at Bruffels, to make their Compliments to the Duke de Villa Hermoft upon his leaving that Covernment; as likewise to congratulate with the Prince of Parms upon his arrival. The Heer Van Leeuwen purposes to part hence on Wednesday next for Rosserdam, to Embark there for England.

Bruffels, Octob. 9. There having happened a great quariel at Newport, between the Spanish and Ita-Iran Officers, concerning Precedence, and his Excellency having provisionally determined the same in favour of the former; the later thereupon would have quitted their Commands, but his Excellency would not permit them, and caused the Chief of them to be secured, for the preventing all further inconveniencies, till the Matter in question were fully examined and adjusted The Sieut Christin, one of the Commissioners of this Crown, for the Conferences at Courtray, has been there some time, but the Sieur Pelletier, the French Commissioner, is not yet arrived, so that the Conferences have

not as yet been renewed.

Marseilles, Ollob. 8. By a Bark lately arrived here from Tripoly we have Advice, that the Sieur du Quefue had been before that place, and had made an offer to enter into a Treaty of Peace with that Government, but that the Dey had answered, that he -could not of himself take any Resolution upon what had been proposed; That he would Consult with the Captains and other Officers, so soon as they returned from Sea, and according to their Advice, a Resolution should be taken; upon which, the · Sieur du Quesne, who look'd upon this Answer, to be little better than a Refusal, set sail with the Ships under his Command, in search of the Tripolins that were abroad, who arrived at Tripoli two days after his departure from thence, with a rich Prize, being a Ship belonging to this Place, and bound home from Smirna, valued at 100000 Pieces of Eight.
