

# The London Gazette.

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Stockholm, September 25.

**T**He Court continues at *Coninghor*, but its said it will now very quickly remove hither. On Sunday last dyed here Count *Brabe*: the *hycks* Drift (being the first of the five Great Officers of the Crown, the other four being the Chancellor, the General, the Admiral, and the Treasurer) in the 79th year of his age, having assisted at the Coronation of three Kings and one Queen, viz. Queen *Christina*. We are informed, that our King is going to send an Ambassador to the Emperor, and that Count *Oxenstern* is the Person designed for that Employment.

*Lintz*, Octob. 1. The 25th past parted from hence the Count *de Thun*, on his journey for *England*, whither he is sent by the Emperor, as his Envoy Extraordinary. The Duke of *Lorraine* is preparing for his departure for *Inspruck*. The Judges appointed for the Tryal of the Count of *Zinzendorf*, have concluded their Sentence, but the same is not yet made publick, which they expect the Emperors Orders to do. It is again very warmly discoursed at Court, that the Emperor has resolved to raise eight new Regiments of Foot, six of Horse, and six of Dragoons, and that there will be a Pond established for the constant payment of them. We are told that there is very good news from *Burgary*, viz. That the Imperial Troops have defeated several Parties of the Rebels, and that it was hoped they would be very suddenly reduced to such a condition as would oblige them to make their Peace; though this does not agree with the Account which some Persons that came lately hither from *Hungary*, gave of the posture and strength of the Malecontents.

*Strasburg*, Octob. 4. Several Persons in pursuance of the Edict, lately published by the Sovereign Chamber of *Brisac*, are gone thither to do Hommage to the French King, and to acknowledge him their Sovereign Lord, which ins probably they would not do, could they promise themselves any Protection to support them in a refusal, which as things now stand, would expose them and their Estates to greater oppressions. At the same time the French Provost has given Orders for the putting up the Arms of *France* in all places, and the taking away those of the Emperor, where there are any. From *Ratisbonne* they write, that the Dyet has not hitherto been able to determine any thing in the matter of the Mint; and that the death of the Elector Palatine, and of the Elector of *Saxony*, has put a stop to all affairs in the Electoral Colledge, which will be removed, so soon as the present Electors send their Deputies thither.

*Cologne*, Octob. 8. The Bishop of *Strasburg* intends to part hence very suddenly; some say he purposes to return to *France*, so pass the Winter there; but others assure us, that he is going to his Diocesis, to

adjust his Pretensions with the City of *Strasburg*, who on their side, will without doubt, be very ready to agree to whatever can be thought reasonable, that is all pretence of disturbing them, may be taken away.

*Hamburg*, Octob. 8. The sad condition of the City of *Leipsick* does very much affect all people here, as well in compassion to those afflicted Inhabitants, as because of the Influence it has upon the Trade of these parts. Our Magistrates on it no care for the preserving this City in Health, causing strict enquiry to be made concerning all Persons as well as Goods that come hither. From *Copenhagen* they write, that one of the *Brandenburg* Frigates was passed the *Sound* with the Spanish men of War, taken in the Road of *Ostend*, which she had Orders to carry to the *Pillow*; and that the Spanish Minister at the Danish Court, had endeavoured to stop the said Ship in the *Sounds*, in order to its being restored to the King's Master; and that to that purpose he had presented a Memorial to the King of *Denmark*, complaining of the Electors manner of Proceeding, and desiring that the said Ship might be secured; but that he had been answered, it was a Matter the King of *Denmark* could not think fit to meddle in. The Prince of *Orange* continues in *Lunenburg*, having been at several cat Huntings; there was a Report that his Highness had had a fall from his Horse, and that he had very much hurt himself, but it is false.

*Amsterdam*, Octob. 11. There remaining some differences between this State and the Elector of *Cologne*, concerning certain Jurisdictions which the latter pretends to in *Maestricht*, the States have offered to leave the same to the determination of Commissioners, to be appointed by both Parties. The King of *Denmark* having threatened to Grant Lett is of Reprizals against the Subjects of this State, on account of a Danish Ship taken in the *Indies*; the States have ordered their Minister at *Copenhagen* to endeavour to prevent a thing that may have ill consequences. The Admiralties have been summoned to send their Deputies to the *Hague*, to meet there on the 14th Instant, in order to the giving their Advice, concerning an Equipage of 8 or 10 men of War, which its said is designed, upon the pressing Instances of the Spanish Envoye, for the securing the Coast of *the Ilands*.

*Hague*, Octob. 11. Upon the Instances of the Spanish Envoye, concerning the putting some men of War to Sea, the States have Directed the respective Admiralties to send their Deputies hither, to consult with them in that Matter; The States have likewise offered a Placet to be published, forbidding the Subjects of this State, to molest, by virtue of Commissions from any foreign Prince, the Ships or Goods of any of their Allies. The differences between this Province and that of *Zealand*, still continuing, without any likelihood of a composition; The States of *Zealand* are endeavouring to engage some of the other Provinces, to take part with them

t hem, and for that purpose have sent their Deputies to *Gronngen*, who have been very well received there; but the States of *Holland* seem very much to resent this manner of proceeding. The Stat-General have sent Directions to the *Sieur Dyckvelt*, their Minister at *Brussels*, to make their Compliments to the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* upon his leaving that Government; as likewise to congratulate with the Prince of *Parma* upon his arrival. The Heer *Van Leeuwen* purposes to part hence on Wednesday next for *Rotterdam*, to Embark there for *England*.

*Brussels*, Octob. 9. There having happened a great quarrel at *Newport*, between the Spanish and Italian Officers, concerning Precedence, and his Excellency having provisionally determined the same in favour of the former; the later thereupon would have quitted their Commands, but his Excellency would not permit them, and caused the Chief of them to be secured, for the preventing all further inconveniencies, till the Matter in question were fully examined and adjusted. The *Sieur Christin*, one of the Commissioners of this Crown, for the Conferences at *Courtray*, has been there some time, but the *Sieur Pelletier*, the French Commissioner, is not yet arrived, so that the Conferences have not as yet been renewed.

*Marseilles*, Octob. 8. By a Bark lately arrived here from *Tripoly* we have Advice, that the *Sieur du Quesne* had been before that place, and had made an offer to enter into a Treaty of Peace with that Government, but that the *Dey* had answered, that he could not of himself take any Resolution upon what had been proposed; That he would Consult with the Captains and other Officers, so soon as they returned from Sea, and according to their Advice, a Resolution should be taken; upon which, the *Sieur du Quesne*, who look'd upon this Answer, to be little better than a Refusal, set sail with the Ships under his Command, in search of the *Tripolins* that were abroad, who arrived at *Tripoli* two days after his departure from thence, with a rich Prize, being a Ship belonging to this Place, and bound home from *Smirna*, valued at 100000 Pieces of Eight.

*Paris*, Octob. 14. The Prince of *Conde* cannot yet get rid of his Ague. The King is about sending another Minister to the Imperial Court, in the room of the *Marquis de Vitry*, who is recalled. The *Sieur du Quesne* is every day expected at *Toulon*, with the Ships under his Command.

*Falmouth*, Octob. 4. The 29th past came into this Port the *Deptford* Ketch, bound for the *West-Indies*, and the *Good Intent* of *Plymouth*, bound for the *Cannaries*, and the Saturday following they both failed again.

*Plymouth*, Octob. 5. On Saturday last arrived in this Port, the *Swart-Merchant*, with Soldiers for *Tangier*, which were put ashore here, and will be taken on board again, and others that are here will likewise embark, so soon as the *Streights* Convoys arrives from the *Downs*, where we hear it is detained by contrary winds. Yesterday came in here the *Dartmouth* Frigate, Capt. *Churchil* Commander, from Cruising.

*Deal*, Octob. 7. The Kings Ships that were ordered to accompany the Prince of *Parma*, the Governor of the *Spanish Netherlands*, to *Ostend*, having executed their Commission, are returned into the *Downs*.

*Deal*, Octob. 8. The *Streights* Convoys has been

long detained in the *Downs* by contrary Winds, on board of which is *Charles Fanshawe*, Esq; His Majesties Envoye Extraordinary to the Prince Regent of *Portugal*, Mr. *Perry*, His Majesties late Minister at that Court, having obtained leave to return home.

*Westminster* Octob. 9. An Indictment having been preferred at the Sessions for *Westminster*, against one *Shippon*, for Defaming Dr. *Oates*, Mr. *Bedloe*, and Mr. *Dugdale*, and being found guilty by the Jury, he was sentenced by the Court, to pay a Fine of 500 Marks, to suffer Imprisonment till the same be paid, and to find Securities for his good Behaviour for a year.

*Whitehall*, Octob. 9. This afternoon His Majesty and his Royal Highness, returned hither from *Newmarket*. The Queen who came to Town on Wednesday, very much indisposed, is (God be thanked) pretty well again.
