or be construed to entend, to prohibit the Exportation from any Port of Great Britain to any Port of Ireland, of any of the Articles above-mentioned, provided the Persons so exporting the same shall enter into Bond, with sufficient Sureties, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, for the due landing thereof in the Ports in Ireland for which the same shall be respectively cleared out; and shall also comply with all other Conditions which now are, or hereaster may be required by Law in respect to such Exportation:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit, at any Time, any Person or Persons from shipping or putting on board any of the Articles above mentioned, to be carried from any Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of Great Britain, to any other Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, having fuch, or the like Coast Sufferance, Coquet, or other Coast Dispatch for that Purpose, and on such and the like Security being given for the landing and discharging the fame, as now is, or hereafter may be by any Law or Laws, Act or Acts, required in relation to the carrying Coastwife any Corn or other Articles, or uny Goods, Wares, and Merchandize:

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

AT the Court at St. James's, the 22d of December 1802,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twentyeighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America, and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majcsty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland, for the Time being, to authorize, in Case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Mand of Newfoundland for the then enfuing Seafon only; provided always, That fuch Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in Conformity to such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or

Warrants respectively, and except by British Subjects, and in British built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants or Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the enfuing Seafon, with Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the enfuing Seafon only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock may be imported into the faid Island from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majety's Subjects, and navigated according to Law; and which, within the Space of Nine Months previous to the Time of fuch Importation, have cleared out from fome Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or other His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom re-fpectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no fuch Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Essect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Cultoms at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Matter or Person having the Charge or Command of fuch Ship or Vessel, of his having received the faid Licence fo indorfed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom fuch Licence was granted.
