The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty, by His Order in Council dated the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, issued in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act of Parliament passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His Majesty's Reign, and continued by several subsequent Acts, was pleased to prohibit the Exportation, and to permit the Importation, and the taking out of Warehouse, of Corn and other Articles of Provision, and likewise to allow the Importation of Foreign Corn, and other Articles of Provision therein enumerated, Duty free, in the Manner therein-mentioned, for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of the said Order, which Order was further continued by another Order, bearing Date the Second Day of June last, until the First Day of January next: And whereas an Act has been passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty; to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Island of Malta;" His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the said Prohibition to export from any Port or Place in Great Britain any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof; and the said Liberty to import and take out of Warehouse any Foreign Corn and other Articles, and likewise to import certain other Articles of Provision Duty free, be further continued until the Thirty-first Day of March next inclusive, save and except the Articles of Rice and Malt; and save and except, and it is hereby declared, that

nothing herein contained is intended to extend, or shall be construed to extend, to affect or apply to any Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, or any Importation of Malt from Ireland to Great Britain, in the Manner authorized by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for continuing, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for regulating, until the Fifteenth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and three, the Prices at which Grain, Meal, and Flour may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and for permitting, from and after the passing thereof, until the said First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, the Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, and the Importation of Malt into Great Britain from Ireland:"

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that all the Exceptions, Provisoos, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions specified and enforced in and by the said Orders, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, and the Second Day of June last, respecting such Exportation and Importation, (except as herein excepted,) and the taking the same out of Warehouse, and all Matters and Things in the said Orders of the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one and the Second Day of June last contained, shall be and continue in Force until the Thirty-first Day of March next inclusive, in the same Manner as the same are now in Force under the said last-mentioned Order of the Second of June last.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act

"to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty; to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta;" it is, among other Things, enacted, That an Act made in the Thirty-ninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for enabling His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation and permit the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, to continue in Force until Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament;" which was continued by an Act of the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, and further continued and amended by another Act passed in the same Session of Parliament, and also further continued and amended by Two Acts of the Forty-first and Forty-second Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and three, shall be, and the same is thereby, continued until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers given by the said Act, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, That, from the First Day of January next, until the Thirty-first Day of March next inclusive, no Person or Persons whatsoever shall export, or shall load or lay on board any Ship or Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain any of the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether salted or otherwise, or any Bacon, Butter, Onions, or Pulse of any Sort, or any Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley, unless Proof shall first be given to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs that the Articles so to be exported as aforesaid are not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture; But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of such and so much of any of the said Articles as shall be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vessel, on its Voyage out and Home, for the Sustenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Passengers, and others on board such Ship or Vessel, or for the Use and Sustenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on board such Ship or Vessel; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Vessels in His Majesty's Service; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forces, Forts, or Garrisons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of such and so much of any of the said Articles as may be necessary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the

East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the said Articles for the necessary Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the said Company; nor to prohibit the Exportation of any of the said Articles to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man; or to any of His Majesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the necessary Use of the Inhabitants of the same respectively: Provided that the Merchant Exporter, in each Case, do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they are entered Outwards before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, in treble the Value of the said Articles, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered out, and for the Purposes specified and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners as aforesaid, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were so entered Outwards:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation from any Port of Great Britain to any Port of Ireland; of any of the Articles above-mentioned, provided the Persons so exporting the same shall enter into Bond, with sufficient Sureties, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, for the due landing thereof in the Ports in Ireland for which the same shall be respectively cleared out; and shall also comply with all other Conditions which now are, or hereafter may be required by Law in respect to such Exportation:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit, at any Time, any Person or Persons from shipping or putting on board any of the Articles above-mentioned, to be carried from any Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of Great Britain, to any other Port, Creek, or Member, or Part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, having such, or the like Coast Sufferance, Coquet, or other Coast Dispatch for that Purpose, and on such and the like Security being given for the landing and discharging the same, as now is, or hereafter may be by any Law or Laws, Act or Acts, required in relation to the carrying Coastwise any Corn or other Articles, or any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize:

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
