HE 8th inftant arrived here a Spanish Ship that Sailed from *Cadiz* with the *New-Spain* Fleet: The Supercargo fays, That on the first of this Month, in the Latitude of 13 Degrees 40 Minutes, they lost all their Mass, except their Mizan, in a Hurricane, and were thrice in a manner overset, and that to fave themselves; they were forced to heave 13 great Guns, two Anchors, and all that was betwist Decks, over-board; and then with the help of Jury Mass and spare Sails, to their great Comfort, made this Island, where they intend to refit and then to proceed on their Voyage.

Tangier Sept. 6. Our Lievtenant Governor, Sir Palmes Fairborne, is putting every thing into a poflure in order to his going out, and taking in the ground he intends, fo foon as the Ceffation expires, which the Moors fay it does on the appearance of the New Moon. S veral Guns are removing from the Batteries on the Water-fide to the Caffle, the better to annoy the Enemy; a Battery of 17 Guns is raifing towards Catherine-Port, and our Governor intends to Intrench the Hill on the Eaff fide of the Town. We are expecting 200 Spanifh Horfe, and Vice-Admiral Herbert will put alhoar sco Seamen.

We are expecting 200 Spanish Horfe, and Vice-Admiral Herbert will put alhoar 5 co Seamen. Tangier, Sept. 10. The 13th Instant the Cellation, according to the reckoning of the Moors, expires; we shall then see what they will do, and we are in a condition not to fear them. In the meantime we have advice that the 200 Spanish Horfe, defigned for the fuccour of this place, are at Gibraltar, in order to their Embarkation. Vice-Admiral Herbert is gone thither with his Fleet to take them on Board, and with the first Easterly Wind we expect them here.

Berlin, O. 70b. 15. Hamburg, Offob. 15. [The Plague continues very violent at Drefden and Leipzick, which has made the Elector of Brandenburg and the Princes of Lunen-

burg forbid the holding of all Fairs and Markets' within their respective Territories, so that all Trade is very much interrupted; nor are the Magiffrates of this City less careful to do what in them lyes to preferve it in health. and therefore will not fuffer any Goods to be brought hither, but what comes through the Territories of the Princes abovemen# tioned, knowing how fevere they are in denying paffage to all perfons as well as goods that they are not well affured come from places free from all Conta-The Prince of Orange is going, if not gone gion. for Polldam the Elector of Brandenburg has appointed feveral of the Officers of his Houlhold to meet him on the Frontiers of his Territories, and to conduct him thither.

Amsterdam, Oftob. 22. The Deputies that were fent by the Admiralty here to the Hague, are come back; the thoughts of fitting out certain Men of war, for the fecurity of the Coafts of Flanders, having been wholly laid afide upon the advice they received of the Prince of Parma's arrival at Oftend. The East-India Company has refolved to make a dividend of 25 per Cent. to recall the Sieur Van Goens, their General in the Indies, and to fend the Sicur Speelmant in his place; and it's fuid they intend to change the whole manner of their Trade, to make it more advantageous than it is. The Prince of Orange is supposed to be now at Postdam, where he will make no ftay, intending to be back at Zell the 25th Inflant, and to return to the Hague, about the beginning of the next Month. The Elector of Brandenburg, according to the Advices we receive from Berlin, leems very much inclined to compole in an amicable manner the differences between the Crown of Spain and him, to which it's not doubted the prefence of the Prince of Orange will very much contribute. Yefterday Alderman Backwell, who has been here fome time, was with Mr. Carr, the English Con'ul, treated at Dinner by the Heer Van Beuzingen, and the other Burgemalters of this City, and a Committee of the Directors of the East-India Company, in return of the noble entertainment which the Alderman had before given them. To morrow he parts hence for England.

Hague, Oftob. 22. The Spanish Envoy has lately prefented a Memorial to the States General, complaining of the Proceedings of the French on the Frontiers of Catalonia and Biscaye, which he favs are contrary to the Peace of Nimeguen, and may have very ill Confequences; for the prevention whereof, he prays the States to make use of such mans as may be molt effectual and conducing to that end, freing the Crown of Spain and this State are now United in the fame Interefts : Upon which it's faid the States have refolved to direct their Ambaliadors in France to use their biff endeavours that these differences may be amicably compoled, to avoid all farther milunderstandings between the two Crowns. The two Placaets, formerly mentioned, have been Published, the - the one Prohibiting the Subjects of this State to ferve Forreign Princes; and the other to recall those that are already engaged in their Service. The East-India Company has agreed upon the number of Ships and Men they intend to fend to the Indies this next year, to wir, 4000 Men, and 18 Ships, whereof 10 are to be let out by the Chamber of Amsterdam. The report that was spread abroad of the Elector Palatinesi.lnefs proves a millake.

Oftend Oftob 13. O1 the 11th Inftant in the Afternoon appeared, about five Leagues off of this Town, eight Men of War, who having faluted us, were answered with five Guns from the Platforms; fer though the Prince of Parma, our new Governor, was hourly expected, and that we knew feveral English Brights were ordered to attend him, yet their keeping off to far at Sea, and the Weather being fo dark that we could not defice n them, made us believe they were the Brandenburg Frigats that have been Cruifing on these Coasts, so that the Pilot-boat was fest out to difcover them; but unexpectedly about eight a Clock at night the Prince of Parma came ashoar in the English Boats, and was at the Gates b fore any body knew of it; and the efore the preparations made for his Reception were put off till the next day and then he was waited upon to Church by the Magistrates and what Persons of quality were here; The Cannon round the Town were thrice d scharged, the Burghers were in Arms, and faluted him with feveral Volleys of finall fhot, The four Spanish Men of War that came with ES C. the Prince are now in the Ro d; they have on Board feven or eight hundred Spanish Soldiers, who will be brought alhoar in Bylan lers. This morning at eight a Clock the Prince parted hence for Bruges.

Bruffels, Oltob. 15. Yefterday the Duke de Villa Hermola, with a great number of Perfons of Quality, went from hence to Gaunt, to meet there the Prince of Parma, and to refign into his hands the Government of these Countreys. We are much furprized here with the News we receive by the way of Hollard, of the Pillaging of Panama and Porto Bello in the West-Indies, by the French, who it's faid have carryed away to the value of ten Millions of Money. The Prince of Vaudemint, and Count Salafar are gone this morning for Flanders, to draw together the Cavalry of that Province, that the Prince of Parma may fee them in his way hither.

Eruffels, Oliob 18. This Evening the Prince of Parma arriv d here, being received with the loud acclamations of the people, the Firing of the great Guns, & c. The Sovereign Courts and Magilitrates of this Town would have received him in their formalities, but he would not admit of it, defiring to enter *iccogn.to*.

Bruffels, O'tob 22. Our new Governor has not yet publickly appear din bufnefs, and will not till Thurfday next, which is the day appointed for the Solemnity of his entring upon the Government. Monfieur de Motte, who is now Marquis of Berlize, and Counfellor of State, arrived here three days fince: he will, it's faid, have the chicf management of Affairs un let the Prince of Parma, being a Perfon of great abilities and experience in the affairs of these Countreys.

Plymouth, O. 3 ob 12. His Majeflies Ship the Conflant Warwick. Captain Afbby Commander, and the Darimouth, Captain Aylmer, are now in this Port, to friake fome finall repairs, which done, they will return to Cruife.

Whiteball, Oltob. 14. Yefferday arrived the Heer Van Leeuwen, Envoy Ambassador from the States General of the United Provinces, who had this Evening his Audience of His Majesty, and afterwards of his Royal Highnes, being conducted by Sir Charles Cotterell, Master of the Ceremonics.

Whiteball, Oftob. 15. This day the Right Honourable Sir Robert Carr, Baronet, Chancellor of the Dutchy of Lancalter, was sworn of his Majellics Privy Council, and accordingly took his place at the Board.
