

# The London Gazette.

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*Barbadoes, Aug. 18.*

**T**HE 8th instant arrived here a Spanish Ship that Sailed from *Cadiz* with the *New-Spain* Fleet: The Supercargo says, That on the first of this Month, in the Latitude of 13 Degrees 40 Minutes, they lost all their Masts, except their Mizan, in a Hurricane, and were thrice in a manner overset, and that to save themselves, they were forced to heave 13 great Guns, two Anchors, and all that was betwixt Decks, over-board; and then with the help of Jury Masts and spare Sails, to their great Comfort, made this Island, where they intend to rest and then to proceed on their Voyage.

*Tangier Sept. 6.* Our Lievtenant Governor, Sir *Palmes Fairborne*, is putting every thing into a posture in order to his going out, and taking in the ground he intends, so soon as the Cessation expires, which the Moors say it does on the appearance of the New Moon. Several Guns are removing from the Batteries on the Water-side to the Castle, the better to annoy the Enemy; a Battery of 17 Guns is raising towards *Catherine-Port*, and our Governor intends to Intrench the Hill on the East side of the Town. We are expecting 200 Spanish Horse, and Vice-Admiral *Herbert* will put ashore 500 Seamen.

*Tangier, Sept. 10.* The 13th Instant the Cessation, according to the reckoning of the Moors, expires; we shall then see what they will do, and we are in a condition not to fear them. In the meantime we have advice that the 200 Spanish Horse, designed for the succour of this place, are at *Gibraltar*, in order to their Embarkation. Vice-Admiral *Herbert* is gone thither with his Fleet to take them on Board, and with the first Easterly Wind we expect them here.

*Berlin, Octob. 15.* The Spanish Prize is arrived at the *Pillaw*, where she is unloading, the Goods being ordered to be laid up in Magazines, and an Inventory to be made of them by a publick Notary, that they may not be imbezilled. The Elector has accepted the King of *England's* Mediation, and that of the States General, for the Composing the differences between him and *Spain*; his Pretensions are to two Millions of Crowns upon account of Subsidies during the late War, besides an old debt of 900000 Crowns. The Prince of *Orange* is expected in two or three days at *Posdam*; the Elector intends to meet him about two Leagues from thence, and to Entertain him at Dinner in the Field. There is a great Hunting appointed, and other Divertisements to Entertain his Highness with, during his stay, which will, it's said, not be for above four or five days.

*Hamburg, Octob. 15.* The Plague continues very violent at *Dresden* and *Leipzig*, which has made the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Princes of *Lunen-*

*burg* forbid the holding of all Fairs and Markets within their respective Territories, so that all Trade is very much interrupted; nor are the Magistrates of this City less careful to do what in them lyes to preserve it in health. and therefore will not suffer any Goods to be brought hither, but what comes through the Territories of the Princes abovementioned, knowing how severe they are in denying passage to all persons as well as goods that they are not well assured come from places free from all Contagion. The Prince of *Orange* is going, if not gone, for *Posdam* the Elector of *Brandenburg* has appointed several of the Officers of his Household to meet him on the Frontiers of his Territories, and to conduct him thither.

*Amsterdam, Octob. 22.* The Deputies that were sent by the Admiralty here to the *Hague*, are come back; the thoughts of sitting out certain Men of war, for the security of the Coasts of *Flanders*, having been wholly laid aside upon the advice they received of the Prince of *Parma's* arrival at *Ostend*. The *East-India* Company has resolved to make a dividend of 25 per Cent. to recall the *Sieur Van Goens*, their General in the *Indies*, and to send the *Sieur Speelman* in his place; and it's said they intend to change the whole manner of their Trade, to make it more advantageous than it is. The Prince of *Orange* is supposed to be now at *Posdam*, where he will make no stay, intending to be back at *Zell* the 25th Instant, and to return to the *Hague*, about the beginning of the next Month. The Elector of *Brandenburg*, according to the Advices we receive from *Berlin*, seems very much inclined to compose in an amicable manner the differences between the Crown of *Spain* and him, to which it's not doubted the presence of the Prince of *Orange* will very much contribute. Yesterday Alderman *Backwell*, who has been here some time, was with Mr. *Carr*, the English Consul, treated at Dinner by the *Heer Van Beuzingen*, and the other Burgemasters of this City, and a Committee of the Directors of the *East-India* Company, in return of the noble entertainment which the Alderman had before given them. Tomorrow he parts hence for *England*.

*Hague, Octob. 22.* The Spanish Envoy has lately presented a Memorial to the States General, complaining of the Proceedings of the French on the Frontiers of *Catalonia* and *Biscaye*, which he says are contrary to the Peace of *Nimeguen*, and may have very ill Consequences; for the prevention whereof, he prays the States to make use of such means as may be most effectual and conducing to that end, seeing the Crown of *Spain* and this State are now United in the same Interests: Upon which it's said the States have resolved to direct their Ambassadors in *France* to use their best endeavours that these differences may be amicably composed, to avoid all farther misunderstandings between the two Crowns. The two Plaquets, formerly mentioned, have been Published, the

the one Prohibiting the Subjects of this State to serve Foreign Princes; and the other to recall those that are already engaged in their Service. The *East-India Company* has agreed upon the number of Ships and Men they intend to send to the *Indies* this next year, to wit, 4000 Men, and 18 Ships, whereof 10 are to be set out by the Chamber of *Amsterdam*. The report that was spread abroad of the Elector Palatine's illness proves a mistake.

*Offend Octob. 13.* On the 11th Instant in the Afternoon appeared, about five Leagues off of this Town, eight Men of War, who having saluted us, were answered with five Guns from the Platforms; fir though the Prince of *Parma*, our new Governor, was hourly expected, and that we knew several English Frigats were ordered to attend him, yet their keeping off so far at Sea, and the Weather being so dark that we could not discern them, made us believe they were the *Brandenburg* Frigats that have been Cruising on these Coasts; so that the Pilot-boat was sent out to discover them; but unexpectedly about eight a Clock at night the Prince of *Parma* came ashore in the English Boats, and was at the Gates before any body knew of it; and therefore the preparations made for his Reception were put off till the next day and then he was waited upon to Church by the Magistrates and what Persons of quality were here; The Cannon round the Town were thrice discharged, the Burghers were in Arms, and saluted him with several Volleys of small shot, &c. The four Spanish Men of War that came with the Prince are now in the Road; they have on Board seven or eight hundred Spanish Soldiers, who will be brought ashore in Bylanders. This morning at eight a Clock the Prince parted hence for *Bruges*.

*Brussels, Octob. 15.* Yesterday the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, with a great number of Persons of Quality, went from hence to *Gaunt*, to meet there the Prince of *Parma*, and to resign into his hands the Government of these Countreys. We are much surprized here with the News we receive by the way of *Holland*, of the Pillaging of *Panama* and *Porto Bello* in the *West-Indies*, by the French, who it's said have carryed away to the value of ten Millions of Money. The Prince of *Vaudemont*, and Count *Salazar* are gone this morning for *Flanders*, to draw together the Cavalry of that Province, that the Prince of *Parma* may see them in his way thither.

*Brussels, Octob. 18.* This Evening the Prince of *Parma* arriv'd here, being received with the loud acclamations of the people, the Firing of the great Guns, &c. The Sovereign Courts and Magistrates of this Town would have received him in their formalities, but he would not admit of it, desiring to enter *cognito*.

*Brussels, Octob. 22.* Our new Governor has not yet publickly appear'd in business, and will not till Thursday next, which is the day appointed for the Solemnity of his entering upon the Government. Monsieur de *Motte*, who is now Marquis of *Berlize*, and Counsellor of State, arriv'd here three days since: he will, it's said, have the chief management of Affairs under the Prince of *Parma*, being a Person of great abilities and experience in the affairs of these Countreys.

*Plymouth, Octob. 12.* His Majesties Ship the *Constant Warwick*, Captain *Ashby* Commander, and the *Darimouth*, Captain *Aylmer*, are now in this Port,

to make some small repairs, which done, they will return to Cruize.

*Whitehall, Octob. 14.* Yesterday arriv'd the Heer *Van Leeuwen*, Envoy Ambassador from the States General of the *United Provinces*, who had this Evening his Audience of His Majesty, and afterwards of his Royal Highness, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cotterell*, Master of the Ceremonies.

*Whitehall, Octob. 15.* This day the Right Honourable Sir *Robert Carr*, Baronet, Chancellor of the Dutchy of *Lancaster*, was sworn of his Majesties Privy Council, and accordingly took his place at the Board.
