HIS Day the Reverend Doctor Landon, Vice-Chancellor of the University of Oxford; the Lord Eldon, Lord High Chancellor, High Steward of the University; the Reverend Mr. Rodd and the Reverend Mr. Wetherell, the Two Proctors; and the Delegates appointed by the University to attend on this Occasion, together with the Viscounts Mountjoy, Hinton, Dupplin, Lewisham, and El-rington; Lords Newton, Cranston, and Rodney; Mr. Ward, Mr. Nevill, Mr. Allen, and Mr. Tur-ner, Members of the University, all in their proper Academical Habits; and accompanied by the Archbishop of Dublin, the Marquis of Titchfield, the Bishops of Durham, Winchester, and Oxford, Sir William Dolben, Bart. one of the Members for the University, and several other Noblemen and Gentlemen who were educated at the University, waited upon the King, to present to His Majesty the following Address of Congratulation on the recent Detection and Defeat of a most atrocious Conspiracy against His Majesty's sacred Person and the civil and religious Establishments of this King-

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford, humbly beg Leave to approach your Throne with our sincere and cordial Congratulations on the recent Detection and Defeat of a most unnatural Conspiracy against your Majesty's facred Person, and the civil and religious Establishment of this Kingdom.

The figual Protection which, in this as well as former Instances, the good Frovidence of God hath vouchsafed to your Majesty, your Royal House, and to the People of this Realm, justly demands

our devoutest Praise and Thanksgiving.

Anxious as we are, and ever must be, in these
Seats of Learning, to inculcate the sound Principles of true Religion as the best and surest Basis of Fidelity, Loyalty, and every moral and political Duty, we cannot but reflect with peculiar Detesta-

tion and Abhorrence on that confummate Depravity of Heart, which, in Defiance of every divine and human Obligation, could have formed Defigns fo malignant and atrocious, even amidst all the Advantages of your Majesty's mild and paternal Government, and under the fullest Enjoyment of our

free and happy Constitution.

We are earnestly defirous of renewing to your Majetty our Assurances of faithful and unalterable Attachment: Nor shall we ever cease to offer up our Prayers to Almighty God that he would preferve and prolong a Life fo important, as that of your Majesty, to the dearest Interests of your People; and that, under your Majesty and your Royal House, he would be graciously pleased to continue to our latest Posterity the invaluable Bessings we now enjoy in the Exercise of our Liberties, our Laws, and our Religion. berties, our Laws, and our Religion.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

Receive with peculiar Satisfaction your affectionate Congratulations on this fresh Instance of the Divine Protestion, which I, in common with My People, have experienced in the Detection and Defeat of a most de. sperate and atrocious Design to involve our established Constitution, together with the great and manifold Bleffings we derive from it, in one general Destruction. It is upon your constant and faithful Exertions to instill into the rising Generation true Principles of Religion and Virtue, that the Permanency of these Blessings must greatly depend; and in these your laudable Endeavours, you may considerably rely on the Continuance of My Favour and Protection.
