"Malta;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That the Prohibition laid, by Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight Hundred and one, upon the Exportation from any Port or Place in Great Britain of any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or of any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof; and also the Liberty, granted by the said Order in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, to import and take out of Warehouse Foreign Corn and other Articles as aforesaid, and likewise to import sundry other Articles of Provision Duty free, should be further continued until the Thirty-first Day of this instant March inclusive, save and except the Importation, Duty free, of the Articles of Rice and Malt; and save and except, as it was declared by the said Order, that nothing therein contained was intended to extend, or should be construed to extend, to affect or apply to any Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, or any Importation of Malt from Ireland to Great Britain, in the Manner authorized by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for continuing, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for regulating, until the Fifteenth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and three, the Prices at which Grain, Meal, and Flour may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and for permitting, from and after the passing thereof, until the said First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, the Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, and the Importation of Malt into Great Britain from Ireland."

Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether salted or otherwise, or any Bacon, Butter, Onions, or Pulse of any Sort, or any Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley, unless Proof shall first be given to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs that the Articles so to be exported as aforesaid were not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture; But it was His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that nothing contained in the said Order should extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of such and so much of any of the said Articles as should be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vessel, on its Voyage out and Home, for the Sustenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Master, Mariners, Passengers, and others on board such Ship or Vessel, or for the Use and Sustenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on board such Ship or Vessel; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Vessels in His Majesty's Service; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forces, Forts, or Garrisons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of such and so much of any of the said Articles as might be necessary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or

of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the said Articles for the necessary Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the said Company; nor to prohibit the Exportation of any of the said Articles to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man; or to any of His Majesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the necessary Use of the Inhabitants of the same respectively: Provided that the Merchant Exporter, in each Case, should first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they were entered Outwards before the Entry of the same should be made, and should give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, in treble the Value of the said Articles, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they were so entered out, and for the Purposes specified and none other; such Bond not to be cancelled or delivered up until Proof should be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as should be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles had been all duly landed at the Places for which they were so entered Outwards:
