Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, or any Bacon, Butter, Onions, or Pulfe of any Sort, or any Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley, unless Proof shall first be given to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs that the Articles fo to be exported as aforefaid were not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture ; But it was His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheles, that nothing contained in the faid Order should extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of fuch and fo much of any of the faid Articles as fhould be neceffary to be carried in any Ship or Veffel, on its Voyage out and Home, for the Suftenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Mafter, Mariners, Paffengers, and others on board fuch Ship or Veffel, or for the Ufe and Suffenance of the Cattle, Live Stock, or other Animals on board fuch Ship or Veffel ; or for the neceffary victualling or providing any of His Majefly's Ships of War, or other Ships and Veffcls in His Majefty's Service ; or for the neceffary victualling or providing any of His Majefty's Forces, Forts, or Garrifons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of fuch and fo much of any of the faid Articles as might be necessary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or

of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have ufually been fupplied with the fame from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the faid Articles for the neceffary Supply of their Garrifons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the faid Company ; nor to prohibit the Exportation of any of the faid Articles to the Iflands of Guernfey, Jerfey, Alderney, Sark, and Man; or to any of His Majefty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the neceffary Use of the Inhabitants of the same refpectively : Provided that the Merchant Exporter, in each Cafe, should first make Oath of the true Destination of the fame to the Places for which they were entered Outwards before the Entry of the fame should be made, and should give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, in treble the Value of the faid Articles, to the Satisfaction of the Commiffioners of His Majefty's Cuftoms, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they were fo entered out, and for the Purpofes specified and none other ; fuch Bond not to be cancelled or delivered up until Proof should be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commiffioners, by the Froduction, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commiffioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as should be directed by the faid Commiffioners, fhewing that the faid Articles had been all duly landed at the Places for which they were fo entered Outwards :
