To the KING's More Excellent Majefty.

WE, your Majefty's molt dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentry, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Dublin, (convened by the High Sheriff,) beg Leave to approach your Majefty with molt heartfelt Congratulations on the providential Difcovery of the late traitorous Confpiracy againft your Majefty's Royal Perfon, and the happy Conflictation of the United Kingdom. Permit us to add our Affurances, that to your Majefty's Royal Perfon and Government our Attachment remains firm and invariable; and that it is our carneft Prayer, that the fame Providence that has hitherto fhielded your facred Perfon, and preferved our happy Conflictation and Laws, may continue thus to blefs and unite this Kingdom to the lateft Pofterity.
