under our excellent Conditution, and of the truly paternal Intereft evinced on all Occafions by your Majetty for the Welfare of your People, we have heard with Elerror and Indignation of the Attack which was medicated upon your faceed Perfon.

We could not indeed have believed that the Mind of Man was capable of conceiving fo atrocious a Delign, had not the Guilt of thofe Traitors, who have to juicly for leited their Lives, been fo fully and

clearly proved in the mildele Court of Judicature.
