The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Seventh Day of March last, to promile and declare, that the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majefly's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore for railing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty sive nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing equal Date, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations respectively, for Payment of said the Bonneties and Reward, will expire upon the Thirtieth Day of this instant April; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of this instant April to the Thirtieth Day of June next inclusive; whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly.

HERFAS, in purfuance of the Powers veited in His Majedy, by an Act passed in the present Sellion of Parliament, intituled "An Act" to continue, until the First Day of January " One thousand eight hundred and four, several " Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exporta-" tion and permitting the Importation of Corn, " and for allowing the Importation of other Ar-"ticles of Provision without Payment of Duty; to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect " to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods " in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the "Trade and Commerce to and from the lile of "Malta;" His Majelly was pleafed, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That the Prohibition laid, by Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thouland eight hundred and one, upon the Exportation from any Port or Place in Great Britain of any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peale, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or of any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof; and also the Liberty, granted by the said Order in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, to import and take out of Warehouse Foreign Corn and other Articles as aforefaid, and likewife to import fundry other Articles of Provision Duty free, should be further continued until the Thirty-first Day of March Irst, save and except the Importation, Duty free, of the Articles of Rice and Malt; and fave and except, as it was declared by the faid Order, that nothing therein contained was intended to extend, or should be construed to extend, to affect or apply to any Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, or any Importation of Malt from Ireland to Great Britain, in the Manner authorized by an A& passed in the prefent Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act " for continuing, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made " in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His " present Majesty, intituled An Act for regulating, until the Fifteenth Day of February One thou-" fand eight hundred and three, the Prices at which "Grain, Meal, and Flour may be exported from "Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to

66 Great Britain; and for permitting, from and confirm after the passing thereof, until the said First Day " of July One thousand eight hundred and three, " the Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Bries tain to Ireland, and the Importation of Malt " into Great Britain from Ireland:" And whereas His Majesty's said Order in Council of the Thirty-first Day of December last has been further con-

tinued until the Thirtisth Day of this instant April: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition to export, and the faid Permilion to import, should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers given by the First of the above-recited Acts, passed in the present Session of Parliament, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the said Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, and all the Exceptions, Provisoes, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, specified and enforced by the faid Order, respecting such Exportation and Importation, and taking out of Warehouse, shall be, and continue in Force until the Thirty-first Day of May next inclusive, in the same Manner as the same are now in Force by the said Order, bearing Date the Thirty-first Day of December last. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
