HEREAS Patrick Earl of Dumfries was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to fit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is fince deceased, in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to fit in his Room, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, iffue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to affemble and meet at Holy-Rood-House, in Edinburgh, on Thursday the Sixteenth Day of June next, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland to fit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the Room of the faid Patrick Earl of Dumfries, deceafed, by open Election and Plarality of Voices of the Peers that fault then be prefent, and of the Proxies of fuch as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing duly figned before Witneiles, and both Conflituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law;; and the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Sellion as thall be appointed by him to offi date in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after such Election soule, and duly examined, to certify the Name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the fame in the Presence of the said Leers the Electors, and return fuch Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: And we strictly charge and command, that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross,

Scotland, Twenty-five Days at leaft, before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the faid Peers to proceed on such Election.

"Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exporta-"tion and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Ar-" ticles of Provision without Payment of Duty; " to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect " to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods " in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the "Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of " Malta;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December lak, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That the Prohibition laid, by Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, upon the Exportation from any Port or Place in Great Britain of any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Peafe, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or of any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof; and also the Liberty, granted by the said Order in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day Freeholders of the County of Rutland, holding in of December One thousand eight hundred and just Abhorrence the late atrocious and diabolical one, to import and take out of Warehouse Fo-Conspiracy against your Majesty's sacred Person and

And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition to export, and the said Permission to import, should be continued for some Time longer, His Majelty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers given by the First of the above-recited Acts, passed in the present Session of Parliament, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the faid Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, and all the Exceptions, Provisoes. Rules. Regulations, and Restrictions, specified and enforced by the faid Order, respecting such Exportation and Importation, and taking out of Warehouse, shall be, and continue in Force until the Thirty-first Day of May next inclusive, in the same Manner as the same are now in Force by the said Order, bearing Date the Thirty-first Day of December last.
