WHEREAS, in Consequence of the repeated Insults and Provocations which His Majesty has experienced from the Government of France, His Majesty finds himself compelled to take such Measures as are necessary for vindicating the Honor of His Crown, and the just Rights of His Subjects; His Majesty, therefore, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprisals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the French Republic, so that as well His Majesty's Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned, by Letters of Marque, or General Reprisals, or otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the French Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the French Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the French Republic, and bring the same to Judgment in such Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, as shall be duly commissioned to take Cognizance thereof; and, to that End, His Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprisals to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing, and taking the Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the French Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the French Republic, or inhabiting within any of the

Territories of the French Republic; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission, as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, His Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions which shall be duly commissioned to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprisals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be made, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels, and Goods as shall belong to the French Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the French Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the French Republic; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewise to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board a Draft of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the said several Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Draft of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes above-mentioned.

A PROCLAMATION,

For encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall on or before the Thirtieth Day of June next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Five Pounds each Man: and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds Ten Shillings each Man; and all such Able bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty, in Lieu of the Bounties promised in Our Royal Proclamation dated the Seventh Day of March last; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the

Checque residing at the Ports where the Ships or Vessels on board which such Seamen and Landmen may be appointed to serve, shall be immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen or Landmen: And We do declare, that the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen so entering themselves, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel on board which they shall be appointed to serve: And for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money, We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen and Landmen belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on board any other of our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be punished according to their Demerits.

WHEREAS We are informed, That great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom: And whereas Attempts may be made to seduce some of Our Subjects, contrary to their Allegiance and Duty to Us, to enter on board Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels belonging to the French and Batavian Republics, with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or otherwise to adhere, or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea: Now We, in order that none of Our Subjects may ignorantly incur the Guilt and Penalties of such Breaches of their Allegiance and Duty, have thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby notifying and declaring, that all Persons, being Our Subjects, who shall enter or serve, or be found on board any Ships or Vessels of War, or other Ships or Vessels belonging to the French or Batavian Republics, with Intent to commit Hostilities against Us or Our Subjects, or who shall otherwise adhere, or give Aid or Comfort to Our Enemies upon the Sea, will thereby become liable to suffer the Pains of Death, and all other Pains and Penalties of High Treason and Piracy; and We do hereby

declare Our Royal Intention and firm Resolution to proceed against all such Offenders according to Law.

nance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Two Months from the Date of this Order in Council, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by the aforementioned Act: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *Stoph. WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council," it is enacted, amongst other Things, That His Majesty may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, when he shall see Cause, and for such Time as shall be therein expressed, prohibit the exporting, or the attempting to export, Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, and other Naval Stores: And His Majesty, judging it necessary to prohibit the Exportation of the said several Articles for a limited Time, doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Two Months from the Date of this Order in Council, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by the aforementioned Act: But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of

Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided, that upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles for the Purposes of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

IT is this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, That all Ships and Vessels clearing out for the Coast of Africa for the Purpose of carrying on the Trade there, be permitted to take on board, as an assorted Part of their Cargoes, as much Gunpowder, and as large a Quantity of Trading Guns, Pistols, Cutlasses, Flint, and Lead Balls, Bars, and Shot as the Exporters shall think necessary, notwithstanding any Thing contained in His Majesty's Order in Council of the Sixth Day of April last; provided that sufficient Security be given to the Principal Officers of His Majesty's Customs of the Port in which the Ships are fitted out, and before they proceed on their respective Voyages, in treble

the Value of the Articles exported, that the same shall be expended in Trade upon the Coast of Africa; which Security is not to be cancelled until Proof of such Expenditure has been made by the Oath of the Captain or Master of the Ship or Vessel in like Manner as is practised with regard to Spirits and East India Goods used in carrying on that Trade; and His Majesty is further pleased to order, That all Ships and Vessels trading to the said Coast, be allowed to take on board for their Defence whatever Quantity of Carriage Guns, Swivels, and small Arms, shall be judged proper by the respective Masters thereof; provided that no greater Quantity be taken on board any one Ship for her Defence than Twelve Carriage Guns and Twelve Swivels, together with one Musket or Blunderbuss, one Pair of Pistols and one Cutlass for every Person of which the Ship's Company shall consist, and Ammunition in Proportion; and provided also, that sufficient Security be in like Manner given to the said Principal Officers of the Customs at the Ports where the Ships shall be fitted out, in treble the Value of the Carriage Guns, Swivels, and small Arms so taken on board for the Defence of the said Ships to bring back the said Carriage Guns, Swivels, and small Arms when the Voyage is completed, and to account upon Oath for the Expenditure of the Ammunition: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary herein accordingly.
