

Elect in their Surcoats, Mantles, and Spurs, and the Proxies of the absent Knights Elect, in Surcoats, bearing the Mantles of their respective Principals on their Right Arms, met in the Prince's Chamber, Westminster, where the Officers of the Order, in their Surcoats, Mantles, Chains, and Badges; the Officers of Arms, in their Tabards; the Sub-Dean and Prebendaries of Westminster, in their Mantles of the Order; several Esquires of the Knights Companions, and the Esquires of the Knights Elect, also attended, and went in Procession to the South East Door of Westminster-Abbey, from thence passing down the South Side Aisle, and turning through the last Arch next the Great West Door, they crossed the Middle Aisle, and proceeded up the North Side Aisle to King Henry the Seventh's Chapel, in the following Order:

Six Men in Crimson Silk Scarves, with long Staves to clear the Way, uncovered.

Drums of His Majesty's Household.

Drum Major.

Kettle Drums and Trumpets.

Serjeant Trumpeter with his Mace.

Twelve Alms-Men of the Church of Westminster, Two and Two, in their Gowns, with the Badges of the Order.

The Messenger of the Order in his Surcoat, Chain, and Badge, his Cap in his Hand.

Esquires of the Knights Elect, Three and Three, in their Surcoats, their Caps in their Hands.

Esquires of the Knights Companions, in their Surcoats, with their Caps on their Heads.

Prebendaries of the Church of Westminster, Two and Two.

Sub-Dean of Westminster, carrying the Bible in his Right Hand.

Officers of Arms, in their Tabards, viz.

The Reverend Doctor William Vincent, Dean of Westminster, and Dean of the Order, carrying the Form of the Oath and Admonition.

His Royal Highness the Duke of York, First and Principal Knight Companion, as Great Master; in the full Habit of the Order, his Hat and Feathers on his Head.

Twelve Yeomen of the Guards closed the Procession.

The Staff-Men entered the Chapel, and passed Three on each Side of King Henry the Seventh's Tomb, to the Recesses under the East Windows.

The Drums, Kettle-Drums, and Trumpets, divided at the Gate of the Chapel, and formed a Passage on the Outside.

The Alms-Men entered the Chapel, and having, in the Middle of the Choir, made their Reverences together, first to the Altar, and then to the Sovereign's Stall, passed Six on each side of King Henry the Seventh's Tomb, to the Recesses of the Windows.

The Messenger, with like Reverences, placed himself between the Altar and the Stall of the Junior Knight.

The Esquires, Three and Three, made like Reverences, and stood before their respective Seats.
