

Liege, Oct. 25. The Differences between our Prince the Elector of *Cologne*, and this City grow high. The 23 Instant a Party of the Electors Troops marched to *Veruy*, and after some resistance made by the Inhabitants, in which several were killed, and the Baron de *Lindlen* very dangerously wounded; they entered the Town, and seized 12 Persons, whom they sent in Irons to *Franchemont*, in order to the making their Process. This News very much Allarmed us here, and the Magistrates and Common Council being assembled, they resolved to assist the Inhabitants of *Veruy*; and accordingly to send four Companies thither, to force the Electors Troops from thence: And because the Town of *Huy* takes part with our Prince in these differences, this City has forbid all Trade and Commerce with it, and will confiscate whatever Goods or Merchandizes they can meet with belonging to those Inhabitants.

Hamburg, Oct. 29. We continue, God be thanked, here in very good health. From *Saxony* we have an account that the young Elector had had a very dangerous fall from his Horse: The Prince of *Orange* is passed through *Maegdenburg* on his return home.

Amsterdam, Nov. 1. Several Inhabitants of this City being interested in the Lading of the Spanish Ship taken in *Ostend* Road, they have addressed themselves to the States for relief, which is promised them. The Merchants Trading into *Germany* have complained of a new Imposition laid upon their Goods passing through *Liege*, and the States have thereupon directed the Garrison of *Maastricht* to hinder the levying the said Imposition, by such means as shall be found necessary, and even to make use of Arms if there be occasion. It's supposed the Prince of *Orange* is at present on his return home. We are told that the *Danes* are willing to accommodate the matter about the Ship *Cornelia*, about which so much noise has been made.

Haague, Nov. 1. Some Merchants of *Amsterdam* having represented to the States General, That they are concerned in the Spanish Ship taken by the *Brandenburg* Frigats, and desiring their interposition with the Elector for the recovering their Goods, the States have directed their Minister at *Berlin* accordingly to make application to his Electoral Highness on their behalf. Complaints having been made to the States concerning an Imposition of the 60th Penny, laid by the Elector of *Cologne* upon all Merchandizes passing through his Country of *Liege*, the States have sent Orders to the Governor of *Maastricht*, not to permit their Subjects to be thus imposed upon, which is like to cause still greater misunderstandings between his Electoral Highness and this State. The Commissioners appointed by the States to examine the new Invention of Cannon Bullets, have not approved of it. Monsieur *Lente*, the Danish Minister here, is nominated by the King his Master to go for *England*, with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary. It is said that the Prince of *Orange* is expected at *Soestdike* the seventh of this Month, and that he will not be here till towards the 23th, which is the day the States of *Holland* are to meet.

Paris, Nov. 2. The Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, late Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, arrived here some days since. He was at *Versailles* incognito, and has continued his Journey for *Spain*. By a Vessel

arrived at *Brest* from the *West-Indies* we have advice that the Count d' *Esfree* has been at *St. Domingo*; that from thence he sailed to *Cartagena*, and parted again from thence on the 12th of *August* for *Gouava*, in the Isle of *Domingo*; that he had been everywhere very kindly received by the Spaniards, and that he had the liberty of their Ports, which they had never permitted to any Ships before; and that he had obtained the freedom of the *Sicur Champagne*, a famous Free-booter, who has been a Prisoner among the Spaniards for these 11 years.

Deale, Oct. 23. The Wind coming from the W. to S. E. the Merchant Ships bound for the *Streights* and the *West-Indies* are sailed with their Convoy, as are likewise the Spanish Ships that brought the Prince of *Parma* from *Spain*, who are gone back again.

Whitehall, Oct. 27. We have Letters from *Tangier* of the 23 past, confirming the account we gave you in our last of the success the Garrison had had against the Moors, they having regained the Ground where *Pole-Fort* stood, and several other Posts, which they were fortifying, of which a particular Relation is made publick, and to that you are referred.
