A PROCLAMATION,

For increasing the Militia.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the Number of Our Militia Forces should be increased without Delay: And whereas the Occasion thereof hath been communicated to Parliament: We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby, in pursuance of the Powers which are vested in Us by an Act passed in the Forty-second Year of Our Reign, intituled "An Act for amending the Laws relating to the Militia in England, and for augmenting the Militia," and of another Act passed in the same Year, intituled "An Act to raise and establish a Militia Force in Scotland," order and direct that, in Addition to the Number of Men already required to be raised under the said Acts by the several Counties, Ridings, Stewartries, Cities, and Places therein mentioned, there shall forthwith be raised and enrolled in the said several Counties, Ridings, Stewartries, Cities, and Places therein mentioned, respectively, such a Number of Men as may amount to, but not exceed the Proportion of One-Half of the whole Number of Men required to be raised by the said Acts in each County, Riding, Stewartry, City, and Place respectively: And We do hereby further order and direct Our Lieutenants and Deputy Lieutenants respectively, of the said several Counties, Ridings, Stewartries, Cities, and Places, immediately to assemble and forthwith proceed to apportion the Number of Men hereby required to be raised in their respective Counties, Ridings, Stewartries, Cities, and Places among the several Hundreds, Rapes, Lathes, Wapentakes, or other Divisions, and also among the several Parishes, Tythings, or Places therein respectively, and thereafter to proceed to raise and enrol such Men on or before the Sixteenth Day of July next ensuing.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-sixth Day of May, in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and three, in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty, by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty; to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, to order, and it was thereby ordered, That the Prohibition laid, by Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, upon the Exportation from any Port or Place in Great Britain of any Wheat, Rye, Barley, Beer or Bigg, Pease, Beans, Oats, or any Meal or Flour, or Bread, Biscuit, or Malt made thereof, or of any Indian Corn or Maize, or Meal or Flour made thereof; and also the Liberty, granted by the said Order in Council, bearing Date the Twelfth Day of December One thousand eight hundred and one, to import and take out of Warehouse Foreign Corn and other Articles as aforesaid, and likewise to import sundry other Articles of Provision Duty free, should be further continued until the Thirty-first Day of March last, save and except the Importation, Duty free, of the Articles of Rice and Malt; and save and except, as it was declared by the said Order, that nothing therein contained was intended to extend, or should be construed to extend, to affect or apply to any Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, or any Importation of Malt from Ireland to Great Britain, in the Manner authorized by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for continuing, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, an Act made

" in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled An Act for regulating, until the Fifteenth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and three, the Prices at which Grain, Meal, and Flour may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and for permitting, from and after the passing thereof, until the said First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, the Exportation of Seed Corn from Great Britain to Ireland, and the Importation of Malt into Great Britain from Ireland:"

And whereas His Majesty's said Order in Council of the Thirty-first Day of December last, has been further continued until the Thirty-first Day of this instant May:

And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition to export, and the said Permission to import, should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance of the Powers given by the First of the above-recited Acts, passed in the present Session of Parliament, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the said Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirty-first of December last, and all the Exceptions, Provisoes, Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, specified and enforced by the said Order, respecting such Exportation and Importation, and taking out of Warehouse, shall be, and continue in Force until the Thirtieth Day of June next inclusive, in the same Manner as the same are now in Force by the said Order, bearing Date the Thirty-first Day of December last. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
