AT the Court at St. James's, the 8th Day of June 1803,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the Forty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to regulate the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta until the signing a Definitive Treaty of Peace, and from thence until Six Weeks after the next Meeting of Parliament, and to declare the Isle of Malta to be Part of Europe:" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirtieth of July One thousand eight hundred and one, to order and declare, that the Port of La Valette, in the said Island of Malta, should be taken to be, and the same was thereby made, a free Port for the Importation into, and Exportation from the same, of all Sorts of Goods and Merchandizes in trading Ships or Vessels belonging to Subjects of States in Amity with His Majesty, of whatever Burthen, or in whatever Manner such Ships or Vessels should be navigated; and should continue to be such free Port until the signing of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, and from thence until Six Weeks after the next Meeting of Parliament, unless His Majesty should in the mean Time otherwise order, subject, nevertheless, to such Regulations for the Security of the Possession of the Island of Malta and its Dependencies, and the Protection of the Health of the Garrison, and Inhabitants thereof, as might be then in Force, or should from Time to Time be deemed necessary or expedient in that Behalf; and that the same Drawbacks and Bounties, and upon the same Terms and Conditions which then were, or thereafter might be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of any Goods and Merchandizes to the Islands of Minorca, or to Gibraltar, should and might be allowed upon the Exportation

of the like Goods and Merchandizes to the Port of La Valette, in the Island of Malta: And whereas by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue, until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and permitting the Importation of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty; to the Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta:" It is enacted, that the said Act, and all the Powers and Provisions therein contained, shall continue in full Force and Effect until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Order made by His Majesty in Council on the Thirtieth Day of July One thousand eight hundred and one, shall be, and be deemed, and taken to be, in Force until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four, unless His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, shall think fit otherwise to order and direct. And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Sixth Day of April last, for prohibiting the Exportation out

of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *W. SIR,

I AM to request you will be pleased to lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty for their Information, the enclosed Letter from Captain Wallis, of His Majesty's Ship the Naiad, dated the 2d Instant, acquainting me of his having, on the 29th of last Month, taken Possession of L'Impatient French National Corvette of Twenty Guns and Eighty Men, commanded by Citizen Hypolite Arnous, Lieutenant de Vaisseau, from Senegal to Rochfort; and on the 31st, at Noon, the French Merchant Ship La Chasseur, from St. Domingo to L'Orient, laden with Sugar, Cotton, Coffee, &c. about Three Hundred and Fifty-nine Tons Burthen.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to inform you, that on the 29th Ultimo, at Eleven P. M. being in Latitude 45 Deg. 50 Min. N. and Longitude 4 Deg. 40

Min. W. I captured the French National Corvette L'Impatient of Twenty Guns and Eighty Men, commanded by Citizen Hypolite Arnous, Lieutenant de Vaisseau, from Senegal bound to Rochfort; she is a very fine Vessel, and is esteemed one of the swiftest Sailers out of France; during the Chace they cut away her Anchors from her Bows, and threw Part of her Guns overboard.

I have likewise the Honor to inform you, that on the 31st, at Noon, I captured the French Merchant Ship La Chasseur, from St. Domingo bound to L'Orient, laden with Sugar, Cotton, Coffee, &c. &c.; she is a very handsome Ship Three Hundred and Fifty-nine Tons Burthen, newly coppered, commanded by Citizen Laner, Lieutenant de Vaisseau.

SIR,

I Enclose, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter I have received from Lieutenant Senhouse, of His Majesty's Ship Conqueror, (employed on the Impress Service on board the Hind Revenue Cutter,) stating his having captured La Felicité French Cutter Privateer, and carried her into Portland-Roads, with sundry other Prizes.

SIR,

I Beg Leave to acquaint you, that whilst cruising off Portland, in pursuance of your Orders, I have captured and detained the following Vessels:

La Felicité French Cutter Privateer, armed with Twenty-two Men.

Le Charles French Merchant Brig, laden with Oak Timber for constructing Ships, from Rouen to Rochfort.

A Dutch Galliot, laden with Salt, from the Coast of Portugal bound to Rotterdam.

A Dutch Indiaman, from Surinam, with a very valuable Cargo of Cotton and Coffee.

The fresh Westerly Wind, with the bad Sailing of my Prizes, jointly obliged me to anchor in this Roadstead; as soon, however, as the Wind and Weather will permit, I shall lose no Time in proceeding to Plymouth.

jects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Com-  
mons of the City of London, in Common-Council  
assembled; beg Leave to approach the Throne, at  
this important Crisis, with our renewed Sentiments  
of Fidelity and Allegiance to your Majesty's Per-  
son, Crown, and Government.

We are fully persuaded of the Necessity for the  
decisive and dignified Measures adopted by your  
Majesty, by the Recall of your Majesty's Ambassa-  
dor from France, and the vigorous Posture of De-  
fence of the United Kingdom to repel the Designs  
of that Government, whose inordinate and insatiable  
Views of restless Ambition are manifestly directed  
to overthrow the glorious Constitution of these

Realms, and give a mortal Stab to our Existence as a free and independent Nation. The Justice of your Majesty's Cause, and the Moderation of your Claims, must be felt and acknowledged by every surrounding Power; and we are convinced that the brave and happy People of this Land, conscious of the Purity of their Freedom, and the inestimable Privileges they enjoy under your Majesty's mild and paternal Rule, will, with one Hand and Heart, resolve to defend and maintain them. Your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London feel a grateful Pride in this Assurance of kindred Loyalty throughout your Majesty's Dominions, and are deeply sensible of the eminent Distinction they are invested with, by this Opportunity of testifying their Fidelity and Attachment to their beloved Sovereign. It is our earnest Prayer that every Blessing may attend and prosper your Majesty's Zeal and Exertions for the Welfare of your People; and should substantial Peace not be attainable but by the Decision of the Sword, may the Calamities of a War not to be averted, be lost in the Success and Glory of its Achievements.

Your Majesty's faithful Citizens cannot, however, refrain from expressing their Satisfaction at the Disposition manifested by your Majesty, of availing yourself of any favourable Circumstance of terminating the subsisting Differences, whenever it can be done consistently with the Honor and Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and the Security and Welfare of the British Empire.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Inhabitants of the Town of Sligo, of all religious Persuasions, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with renewed Assurances of unshaken Attachment to our beloved Monarch. THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to enable His Majesty more effectually to provide for the Defence and Security of the

Realm during the present War, and for indemnifying Persons who may suffer in their Property by such Measures as may be necessary for that Purpose.

An Act to render more effectual an Act passed in the Forty-second Year of His present Majesty's Reign for consolidating the Provisions of the several Acts passed for the Redemption and Sale of the Land-Tax.

An Act for more speedily completing the Militia of Great Britain, raised under Two Acts passed in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, and for amending the said Acts.

An Act to render the Process of His Majesty's Courts of King's Bench, Common Pleas, and Exchequer, in Personal Actions in Ireland more beneficial, and also to prevent frivolous and vexatious Arrests, and to repeal so much of an Act passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for enlarging the Time for Trials by Nisi Prius in the City and County of Dublin; and for making the Process of the Court of Exchequer more effectual," as relates to compelling the Appearance of Defendants in personal Actions.

An Act for repairing, improving, and preserving the Harbour of Dysart, in the County of Fife.

An Act to amend an Act made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for the Improvement of the Harbour of Alloa, for paving, cleansing, and lighting the Town of Alloa, and for other Purposes therein mentioned.
