AT the Court at Windsor, the 16th of June 1803,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty's most anxious Endeavours to preserve Neutrality and Peace between His Majesty and the Batavian Republic have failed, and the Batavian Republic has become engaged in Measures of Hostility against His Majesty and His Subjects; His Majesty, therefore, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprisals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the Batavian Republic, so that as well His Majesty's Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned, by Letters of Marque, or General Reprisals, or otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the Batavian Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the Batavian Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the Batavian Republic, and bring the same to Judgment in such Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, as shall be duly commissioned to take Cognizance thereof; and, to that End, His Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprisals to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing, and taking the Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the Batavian Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the Batavian Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the Batavian Republic; and that such

Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission, as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, His Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions which shall be duly commissioned to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprisals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be made, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels, and Goods as shall belong to the Batavian Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the Batavian Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the Batavian Republic; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewise to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board a Draft of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the said several Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Draft of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes above-mentioned.

PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DESERTERS FROM THE MILITIA.

War Office, June 14, 1803.

WHEREAS it has been represented to THE KING that there are at this Time many Men, who, having been sworn and enrolled in HIS MAJESTY'S MILITIA FORCES, have made Default; by not appearing and joining their respective Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies when ordered to be embodied, or by deserting or absenting themselves therefrom, and who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of HIS MAJESTY'S GRACIOUS PARDON, and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Influence upon their future Behaviour; HIS MAJESTY has accordingly been graciously pleased to grant HIS FREE PARDON to all MILITIA-MEN having so made Default by not appearing, or by Desertion, or Absence from Duty, who shall return to and join their respective Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies, *on or before the 14th Day of July next*, or who shall deliver themselves up at the Head-Quarters of any other Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Independent Company of Militia, or to any Detachment of HIS MAJESTY'S other Forces, or to any Military-Post, on or before the said 14th Day of July next, and be from thence marched to their proper Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies.

Any Soldier who may desert from the Militia after these HIS MAJESTY'S gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but shall be proceeded against with the utmost Severity; as shall also all the said Defaulters, Deserters, and Absentees who shall not have joined

their proper Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies of Militia, or delivered themselves up to some other Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Independent Company of Militia, or to some Detachment of His Majesty's other Forces, or to some Military Post, by the said 14th Day of July next.

And all Justices of the Peace, Magistrates, Constables, and Peace-Officers, and all other Persons whatsoever, are hereby enjoined and required, in pursuance of the Act just passed, "for more speedily completing the Militia of Great Britain;" to apprehend, seize, take, and detain such Defaulters, Deserters, and Absentees, for the Purpose of delivering them into safe Custody at any Military Head-Quarters, or into Gaol near to the Place where they shall be apprehended, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law: and all such of the said Defaulters, Deserters, or Absentees, as were enrolled as Substitutes or Volunteers in the Militia, shall, upon being identified before any General, Regimental, or Detachment Court Martial, be forthwith sent to serve in HIS MAJESTY'S Regular Forces stationed Abroad, until duly discharged therefrom; and the Person or Persons who shall apprehend and detain any such Defaulter, Deserter, or Absentee from the Militia, and deliver him into safe Custody as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of *Twenty Shillings over and above the Reward of Twenty Shillings* to which such Person or Persons will also be entitled under the Mutiny Act, and shall be paid the same in like Manner as is directed in Respect to the Reward last-mentioned.

Copy of a Letter from the Right Honorable Lord Keith, K. B. Admiral of the Blue, &c. to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated Sheerness, the 16th Instant.

SIR,

I ENCLOSE, for their Lordships' Information, a Letter which has been addressed to Rear-Admiral Montagu by Captain Owen, of His Majesty's Ship *Immortalité*, acquainting him with the Capture of Two of the Enemy's Gun-Vessels.

I have the Honor to be, &c. KEITH.

SIR, *Immortalité, off Calais, June 14, 1803.*

THIS Morning, in Company with the *Jalouse* and *Cruizer Sloops*, chased Two French Gun-Vessels on Shore on the East Part of Cape Blanc Nez, and, with the Flood-Tide, ordered the Two Sloops to anchor, and endeavour to destroy or bring them off, sending our Boats to assist in so doing. I am happy to inform you, that, after about an Hour's Firing from them and the Batteries, they were silenced, and taken Possession of by the Boats under a heavy Fire of Musketry from the Cliffs, by which Mr. Charles Adams, Mate of the *Jalouse*, has been badly wounded.

The Vessels prove to be L'Inabordable Schooner, and Le Commode Brig, carrying each Three Guns, Twenty-four-Pounders, and One Eight-Pounder, and appear very fine Vessels.

BEG Leave to acquaint you, that Yesterday Afternoon, Cape Frehel bearing S. S. E. Five or Six Leagues, I fell in with, and after an Hour's Chase captured, the French Lugger Privateer L'Espiegle, (an open Boat,) of St. Maloes, manned with Twelve Men, and armed with small Arms; out Eighteen Days, and had not taken any Thing.

Being Seventeen Men short of Complement, I judged it prudent to see her into Port, and am concerned to state, that in getting a Tow-Rope into her this Morning, through the Neglect of the Man at her Helm, she got under the Bows and was sunk.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common-Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, in Common-Council assembled, beg Leave to approach the Throne with renewed Assurances of our unshaken Loyalty to your Majesty, and of our unalterable Attachment to our glorious Constitution in Church and State.

At this awful Period, when the Injustice, the Insults, the unexampled Aggressions, and the inordinate Ambition of the French Government have roused the indignant Feelings of all true Englishmen, and compelled your Majesty to appeal to Arms in Vindication of the Honor of your Crown, and the Liberties of your People; we would consider ourselves unworthy of the Protection of the best of Kings if our Bosoms did not also glow with the same patriotic Ardour, and if we did not, with equal Unanimity and Firmness, declare our fixed Determination, to dedicate our Lives and Fortunes to the Support of the Honor and Security of our Country, and in Defence of our unrivalled Constitution.

When we contemplate the manifold Excellencies of the British Constitution, and the transcendent Virtues of our beloved Sovereign, we cannot withhold our most fervent and grateful Acknowledgments from that gracious Power who hath so long protected the one and preserved the other; but whilst we exult at the many Blessings we enjoy under our present rational System of Civil Liberty, we feel for the unhappy Situation of a People, who, panting after an imaginary Freedom, have lifted a Tyrant into Power, who, whilst he affects to vindicate their Liberty, only seeks to establish his own Aggrandisement; a man who has entailed Misery upon all who have been so deluded as to seek his Alliance, and again presumes to disturb the Repose of Europe in order to accomplish his Schemes of inordinate Ambition, and though we sincerely deprecate the Calamities of War, yet we must be dead to every patriotic Feeling if we did not consider ourselves most imperiously called on at this important Crisis, to protect, and defend with Energy and Intrepidity, our Property, our Homes, our glorious Constitution, and under those beloved Objects, all that is valuable to Man; in such a Cause, to doubt of Success, would be to question the Justice of Omnipotence.

We cannot but embrace with peculiar Satisfaction the Opportunity now presented to us, of acknowledging with the most lively Sentiments of Gratitude the paternal Regard of our most gracious Sovereign, in the Appointment of our present excellent Chief Governor, whose Virtues add Splendor to the Viceregal Court, diffuse Happiness amongst all your Majesty's Subjects, and reflect the most distinguished Honor on our beloved Sovereign whom he so faithfully represents; but the Voice of Panegyric must be silent in the Description of a Nobleman, whose great and amiable Qualities are superior to our humble Commendation, a Nobleman who will never be thought on by the Irish Nation without Reverence, nor remembered without Regard.

In testimony whereof, we have caused the Common Seal of our said City to be hereunto affixed, the Sixth Day of June, in the Forty-third Year of your Majesty's Reign.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Common-Council of the City of Cork, in Council assembled.

WE, the Mayor, Sheriffs, and Common-Council of the City of Cork, in Council assembled, humbly beg Leave, at this momentous Crisis, to reiterate our unshaken Loyalty to your Majesty, to renew our Professions of Attachment to the Constitution, and to declare the fullest Approbation of the Measure your Majesty has adopted to frustrate the avowed Intentions, and repel the unwarranted Aggressions of the Government of France.

In Support of all that is dear to the Monarch and to the Subject, we conceive that your Majesty and your People are now engaged; we feel the Magnitude of the Contest; we are equally sensible that by farther protracted Forbearance, national Honor no longer could be upheld, nor national Security preserved.



In recurring to the awful Alternative to which the arrogant Menaces of the Chief Consul of France forced your Majesty, much Consolation will be afforded by reflecting, that imperious Necessity impelled the Measure—that the Justice of the Cause is manifest to the World—that a magnanimous People, who feel and know the Value of what they are to contend for, with cordial and united Efforts will support your Majesty's Determination.

Deeply impressed with the Importance of Peace to this Country, and anxious as we were for its Continuance, yet we prefer the eventful Chances of open Hostilities to a fallacious Calm, portentous of some violent Convulsion.

The Feuds and Animosities which so long distracted and disgraced this Country we trust have happily subsided, and that the natural Strength which thereby wasted itself will be found concentrated in one common Cause, the Defence of all that is valuable to free Men.

In reflecting on the Moderation of your Majesty's past Conduct, contemplating the general Benignity of the Royal Mind, we feel the strongest Persuasion, that no favorable Opportunity will be lost to restore to us the Blessings of Peace, when it can be attained consistent with the Dignity and Security of the British Empire.

May your Majesty be the favored Instrument of Providence to check the devastating Progress of that Power, which hitherto, with Impunity, has trampled on the Rights of Humanity.

May your Majesty's Reign be commemorated not more for brilliant and successful Achievements in Arms, than for the solid Glory of vindicating Civil Liberty, accomplishing permanent Peace and internal Tranquillity.
