THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of May last, to promife and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Veffels, or Officers employed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His faid Proclamation, to declare, that all Ablebodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirtyfive nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man as His Majelly's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Seventh Day of March last, to promife and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the faid Reward was, by Order in Council, prolonged

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act " to continue, until the First Day of January One " thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws " relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and " permitting the Importation of Corn, and for " allowing the Importation of other Articles of " Provision without Payment of Duty; to the " Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the " bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this " Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and " Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta;" It is among other Things, enacted, That certain Acts therein mentioned relating to the Exportation and Importation of Corn, and other Articles of Provision should be, and the same were thereby continued until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in purfuance of the Powers given by the faid Acts, is hereby pleased to order, That, from the Thirtieth Day of this instant June, until the Thirtieth Day of and extended from the faid Thirtieth Day of April | September next, inclusive, no Person or Persons

whatfoever shall export, or shall lead or lay on [board any Veffel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain any of the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, or Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, or any Bacon, or Butter, unless Proof shall first be given to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs that the Articles so to be exported as aforefaid are not of British Growth, Produce, or Manufacture; But it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that nothing contained in this His Majetty's Order shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of such and so much of any of the said Articles as fhall be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vesicl, on its Voyage out and Home, for the Sultenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Matter, Mariners, Palfengers, and others on board fuch Ship or Veffel, or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majetty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Veffels in His Majelty's Service; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forces, Forts, or Garrisons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of fuch and fo much of any of the faid Articles as may be necessary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the faid Articles for the necessary Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helena, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the faid Company; nor to prohibit the Exportation of any of the faid Articles to the Islands of Gueinsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man; or to any of His Majesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the necessary Use of the Inhabitants of the same respectively; Provided that the Merchant Exporter, in each Case, shall first make Oath of the true Destination of the tame to the Places for which they were entered Outwards before the Entry of the same shall be made, and should give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, in treble the Value of the faid Articles, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they were fo entered out, and for the Purpoles specified and none other; fuch Bond not to be cancelled or delivered up until Proof shall be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commif fioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that

the faid Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were so entered Outwards:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, with the Advice aforefaid, That it shall be lawful for and during the said Term beforementioned, to import into any Port or Place of Great Britain any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether falted or otherwife; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majelly, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all fuch Articles as aforefaid, that shall be fo imported, with the proper Officer of the Cuftoms at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the faid A&s mentioned.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

HEREAS His Majesty's most anxious Endeavours to preserve Neutrality and Peace between His Majesty and the Batavian Republic have failed, and the Batavian Republic has become engaged in Measures of Hostility against His Majesty and His Subjects; His Majesty, therefore, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprisals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the Batavian Republic, fo that as well His Majesty's Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vellels that shall be commissionated, by Letters of Marque, or General Reprifals, or otherwife, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belong-ing to the Batavian Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the Batavian Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the Batavian Republic, and bring the same to Judgment in such Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, as shall be duly commissionated to take Cognizance thereof; and, to that End, His Majesty's Advocate General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorifing the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of

Marque and Reprifals to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing, and taking the Ships, Veffels, and Goods belonging to the Batavian Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the Batavian Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the Batavian Republic; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission, as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorifing the faid Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the faid Court, His Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions which shall be duly commissionated to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprifals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be made, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels, and Goods as shall belong to the Batavian Republic, or to any Persons being Subjects of the Batavian Republic, or inhabiting within any of the Territories of the Batavian Republic; and that fuch Powers and Clauses be inserted in the faid Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewife to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board a Draft of fuch Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the said several Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Drast of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissignated for the Purposes above-mentioned.

HAVE the Honor to enclose, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter which I received this Day from Captain Williams, of the Russel, informing me that the Vessel he chased on the 3d Instant proved to he the Betsey French National Brig, from Martinique to Brest.

SIR, Russel, at Sea, June 5, 1803.

BEG Leave to inform you, that the Vessel I chased the ad Information, that the Vessel I chased the 3d Instant proved to be the Betsey French National Brig, commanded by Citizen Avoyné, Enfeigne de Vaisseau: Sailed from Martinique the 14th of April, bound to Breil, was pierced for Six Guns, but had only Four on board, and Twenty Men, including Officers. I found her in fo bad a State, not having either Provisions or Stores on board, that I thought it most adviseable to destroy her.

I have also Two Dutch Galliots, and fent them

into Piymouth.

Albion, Portsmouto, June 24, 1809. HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, that cruifing, pursuant to your Directions, in His Majesty's Hired Armed Cutter Albion, of Six Guns, Twentyseven Men; at Three P. M. June 24, we saw a Cutter standing towards, made sail in Chace; at Five we brought her to Action, when, after a close Engagement (within Pillol Shot,) of an Hour and Twelve Minutes, the struck her Colours, and proved to be the Marengo French Cutter Privateer of Four Carriage Guns, Twenty-fix Men, John Sieur Granger, Captain, belonging to Cherbourg; she is a new Vessel, pierced for Eight Guns, had painted on her Stern "Fly of Cowes," Two Days from Cherbourg, and had not taken any Thing; there was not any Person wounded on board the Albion, we had a few Shot in our Hull, and one Gun difmounted; the Marengo had Three Men wounded, one badly, and his Sails and Rigging cut to Pieces.

PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DE-SERTERS FROM THE MILITIA.

War Office, June 4, 1803.

WHEREAS it has been represented to THE KING that there are at this Time many Men, who, having been sworn and enrolled in HIS MAJESTY'S MILITIA FORCES, have made Default, by not appearing and joining their respective Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies when ordered to be embodied, or by deserting or absenting themselves therefrom, and who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of HIS MAJESTY'S GRACIOUS PARDON, and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have a due Instance upon their future Behaviour; HIS MAJESTY has accordingly been graciously pleased to grant HIS

FREE PARDON to all MILITIA-MEN having so made Default by not appearing, or by Defertion, or Ablence from Duty, who shall return to and join their respective Regiments, Battalions, Corps, or Independent Companies, on or before the 14th Day of July next, or who shall deliver themselves up at the Head-Quarters of any other Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Independent Company of Militia, or to any Detachment of HIS MA-JESTY's other Forces, or to any Military-Post, on or before the faid 14th Day of July next, and be from thence marched to their proper Regiments, Battalions, Corps, of Independent Companies.

Any Soldier who may defert from the Militia after these HIS MAJESTY's gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but shall be proceeded against with the utmost Severity; as shall also all the said Defaulters, Deserters, and Absentees who shall not have joined their proper Regiments, Battalious, Corps, or Independent Companies of Militia, or delivered themselves up to some other Regiment, Battalion, Corps, or Independent Company of Militia, or to some Detachment of His Majedy's other Forces, or to some Military Post, by the said 14th Day of July

next.

And all Justices of the Peace, Magistrates, Constables, and Peace-Officers, and all other Persons whatsoever, are hereby enjoined and required, in pursuance of the Act just passed, "for more spee-"dily completing the Militia of Great Britain;" to apprehend, seize, take, and detain such Defaulters, Deferters, and Absentees, for the Purpose of delivering them into fafe Custody at any Military Head Quarters, or into Gaol near to the Place where they shall be apprehended, in order that they may be dealt with according to Law: and all such of the said Defaulters, Deserters, or Absentees, as were enrolled as Substitutes or Volunteers in the Militia, shall, upon being identified before any General, Regimental, or Detachment Court Martial, be forthwith fent to serve in HIS MAJESTY's Regular Forces flationed Abroad, until duly difcharged therefrom; and the Person or Persons who shall apprehend and detain any such Defaulter, Deserter, or Absentee from the Militia, and deliver him into fafe Custody as aforefaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings over and above the Reward of Twenty Stillings to which such Person or Persons will also be entitled under the Mutiny Act, and shall be paid the same in like Manner as is directed in Respect to the Reward last-mentioned.
