E out of our Princely Care for Securing the True Protestant Religion, and to satisfie the Minds of all Our Loving Subjects therein, bave thought fit, for the more ef-

bave thought fit, for the more effeltual Difcovery, and Suppression of the most Horrid and Execrable Popish Plot, and the Incouragement of all Persons who have any knowledge thereof, to make Difcowery of the fame, to set forth this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby Promising and Affuring Our Free and Gracions Pardon to all and every Person and Persons, who within Two Monits next ensuing the date of these Prefents, shall come in and give further Information and Ewidence concerning the faid Popis Plot.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall, the Thirtieth day of Odober, 1680. In the Two and thirtieth year of our Reign.

Moleow, Septemb. 10. The third Inflant arrived here an Ambalfador from the Crown of *Poland*; and the feventh had his firft Audience of the Czar; fince he has been in conference with the Commiffioners appointed to treat with him. The Armies that have been employed this Summer against the Turks and the Tartars, are now going into their Winter-quarters. Some are of opinion that this Winter will produce a Peace; to which, whatever countenance the Turks put on, we are affured they are very well enclined, and particularly the Grand Vizier, who has of late been very uncafie through the opposition he meets with from fome new Fayourites.

Berlin, Off. 26. The 24th Inftant very early in the Morning the Prince of Orange parted from Postdam, intending to reach Magdeburg that day, and to be the next at Zell, where his Highnels will flay one day, and three at Hanoner, and then return for Holland. The Elector prefented his Highnels, before his departure, with a fet of Coach-Horfes, and two Saddle Horfes, and gave him leave to Hunt, when he pleafes, in his Country of Cleves. What was done, during his Highnefics being at this Court, towards the composing the differences between the Crown of Spain and the Elector, we cannot fay; but we underfland that his Electoral Highness promiled the Prince that he would reftore Scinckscans to the States: This Fort fell, with other places, into the hands of the French, in the Year 1672, and was afterwards, by them, together with Wefel, given up to the Elector.

Strasburg, Off. 28. The French are buying up in these parts a great quantity of Corn, and are making other Preparations, which gives p ople a jealoufie that they have formed fome defign, and four are still apt to mistual that it is against this City. We have advice, That the Suiffers have refuled the French leave to raife any more Men within their Dominions, though at the fame time they have permitted the King of Spain to Levy fix Regiments; and that they have declared to the French Ambaffador; That in , cafe the King his Mafter make any Attempt against Rhinfeldt of which it seems they have a sufpition) they will concern themselves in the defence of it, and employ to that end all the Force they can make, and that they will recall those Swiffers now in the French Service. This News, If true, will be of great moment to the Affairs of Germany

Colugne, Nov. 1. The City of Liege have not only relifted the Edict of their Prince, concerning the laying an Impolition of the 60th Penny upon all Merchandizes, but have in a manner declared War againft the Inhabitants of Huy, becaufe of their having conformed themfelves thereunto, and things are gone fo far, that there hardly feems any room fo. an accommadation. From the Imperial Court they write that the Emperor had given the Lieutenanthip of all bis Forces, and feveral other eminent Employments, vacant by the Death of General Menticuculi, to the Duke of Lorrain, and that his Imperial Majefty had politively refolved to raile 20000 Men. We are likewife told. That the French King is going to raile 4000 Men for the reinforcing his Troops in Alface.

Liege, Nov. 1. Things are at prefenthere in great confusion, and according to all appearance are like to grow worfe and worfe: Three days fince it was refolved to raife men, and the 28th paft in the Evening 150 men marched from hence to. Huy, where they belet the Houle of the Commiffary who reteives the Imposition of the 60th Penny, Plundered it, and took him Priloner, and very evilly entreated feveral perfons that would have opposed them. It is likewife refolved to fend out Parties to fecure the Wagons that go from hence, and to feize the Commiffaries, that are appointed to receive the faid Impolition, whereever they meet them. In the mean time those periods that were taken by the Electors Troops at Ferry, and carryed thence to Franchimont, are like to fuffer.

Hanouer Off. 29. On Tuesday last the States and Nobility of this Country did Homage to our present Dake, which was performed with a great deal of Solemnity; after which his Highness entertained them at Dinner; there being twelve several Tables.

Hamburg, Novemb. 1. The Electore's Palatin' who has been at Copenbagen to visit the King her Brother, is arrived at Goverp, and from thence will continue her Journey home. The Prince of Orange he come back from Berlin; and is now at Hanovier, whete where he will make no long flay, but hasten his return to Holland. These parts, God be thanked, continue hitherto free from all infection.

Amfterdam Now. 5. On Thursday next the Prince of Orange is expected at Soeffdike, where he will flay fome days: His Highnefs has been received every where in his Journey with all Demonstrations of respect and kindnefs. From Berlin we have an account, That the Elector of Brandenburg is positively refolved in the refere the Spanish Ship taken by his Friguts, u lefs he receive statisfaction from the Crown of Spain for the Arrears of Sublidies that are due to him, and that with n the space of three Mouths, for sotherwise he will proceed to dipose to the faid Ship and her Lading, and at the same time we are informed that the Crown of Spain does highly refeat this Action, and demands reparation: The Issue time mult shew.

Hague, Nov. 5. Our last Letters from Germany tell us that the Prince of Orange arrived at Hanouer the second Instant, and that he purposed to part from then as yesterday on his return hith r. From Copenhagen they write, That 125000 Crowns had b en paid by command of the King of Sweden, in order to the Evacuation of Wilmar, being Moneys remitted thither from France. •

Bruffe's, Nov. 5. Last night arrived here an extra ordinary Courier from Madrid; and the Newsat Court is, That he brings Orders to the Prince of Parma to grant the Perfons concerned in the Bran denburg Frights, Reprizals both by Sea and Lind, and for that purpole not only to make use of the Spanish Men of War that are now at Oftend, but to fit out -asmany more as he can, the Court of Spain, it feens, • refenting very highly the Electors manner of procee ling, and being r folved to right it felf: But it's hoped this matter will be amicably accommodated, for the preventing the ill Confequences it may athe wife have. Don Bernardo de Salmas will be difpatched with allociligence to Denmarke, as, Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain. The diforders at Liege encrease, the Inhabitants absolutely refusing to fubmit to the new Imposition laid upon all Merchandizes by the Elector of Cologne, which it feems the Hollanders are likewife very much concerned at, as a thing that will be very prejudicial to the Trade of the Meuse, in which they are chiefly concerned.

Paris, Nov. 6. Off Sunday laft Monfieur Heugh, Anthaliador Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, made his publick Entry. The laft Week the Marquis de Prinas was kized for Counterfeiting moneys, which having been proved againft him, he was Sentenced to be Beheaded, which was y.fterday accordingly Executed. We are told that feveral Officers of Horle, who thought they had not had the Preferments they might have expected, have given up their Commiffions, and retired out of the Kingdom. The Dauphinel's continues very ill of her Ague, of which he has had feveral violent Fits; and it's faid the Dauphin has had fome Simptoms of the return of his.

Falmouth, Off. 25. The 28 Inflant came in here a Veffel from St. Maloes: The Mafter fays, Thrt it was reported that feveral Ships of the Count d'E-flree's Squadron had been loft in the West-Indies in a Hurricane.

Plimouth, Off. 26.' The Weather is at prefent very

Stormy, which keeps the Dartmouth from going out to Cruife. The contrary Winds keep here a confiderable Fleet of Ships, bound to the Streights.

Deale, Off. 27. Moft of the Merchant Ships which we told you in our laft were failed, lave been forced by contrary Winds to teturn again into the Dow'zs.

Chefter, Od. 27. Plunkett the Titular Primate of Ireland is arrived here from *Dublin*, in the Cuftody, ot a Purfuivant, who is haftening with him to London.

London, Oil. 29. This day Sir Patience Ward, Kt. Lord Mayor of this City, was according to cultom worn before the Barors of the Exchequer at Wefiminifer, whither he went by Water, accompanied by the late 1 ord Nayor, the Aldermen, and Sheriffs, and atlended by the feveral Companies in their refpective Barges. Being come b ck, they palled with the utual Solemnity to the Cald-Hall, where a ve y noble Din n was provided, at which were the Lords of His Majefties Privy Council, and others of the Nobility, the Judges, and other Perfons of Quality.
