REQUEST you will be pleafed to lay before fhe Lords Commillioners of the Admiralty the inclosed Copy of a Letter to Rear Admiral Collingwood, from Captain Wallis of His Majefty's Ship Naiad, giving an Account of his having, with the Boats of that Ship, under the Command of Lieutenant William Deane, taken out from an AuNational Schooner; which Service appears to have been performed very much to the Credit of those who were intrufted with the Execution of it.

# His Majesiy's Ship Naiad, in the Bay of Brest, 5th July 1803.

ROM the Information I received, that a French National Schooner was lying in the Saints, and which I had the Honor to communicate to you Yetterday, I made a Difpolition of the Boats of His Majefty's Ships under my Command to bring her out last Night, and placed them under the Direction of Mr. William Deane, First Lieutenant ; he was affifted by Mr. John Louis Third Lieutenant, Lieutenant Irwin of the Marines, Meffirs. Gordon, Glenny, and Stewart, Midshipmen, all Volunteers on the Occasion; and, notwithstanding all the Difficulties they had to encounter, by the Rapidity of the Tide, and the Number of Rocks and Shoals they had to pafs, they brought her off o me this Morning without the fmallelt Accident happening to either the Boats or Men.

She proves to be La Providence, of near 200 Tons Burthen, only Two Guns mounted, and had Twenty two Men, commanded by Citizen Martres Preville, Lieutenant de Vaisseau, who, on the Approach of our Boats, got on Shore with his Officers and Crew, except one Man and Two Boys. She was bound to Breft from the Foundery near Nantes, and is laden with Heavy Cannon of Thirty-fix, Twenty-four, and Eighteen French Pounders, and fome choice Timber for their Navy.

Lieutenant Deane's Conduct on this Occasion merits my warmeft Approbation, and he fpeaks greatly in Praife of the Officers and Men placed under his Command.

## To the KING's Moft Excellent Majefty,

The humble Address of the Lord Provoft, Magiftrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh, for themfelves, and in Behalf of the Community of the faid City.

WE heg Leave, at this important Crifis, to lay before your Majefly the Affurances of our continued Affection and Loyalty. We, in common with the Reft of your faithful People, have beheld with proper and indignant Feelings that Spirit of Encroachment against the Powers of the Continent. and that rancorous and determined Hatred against this Country, which have marked the Proceedings of the French Government in all its Relations, and in all its Acts, fince the Conclusion of the Peace.

We are fatisfied that, between Peace and War, at the prefent Moment, your Majelty had no Choice; and, as we are fenfible that your Majefty has drawn your Sword in Defence of the Liberty and Independence of your People, your Majetty may be
