Westminster, July 13, 1803.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for raising the Sum of Five Millions, by Loans or Exchequer-Bills, for the Service of Great Britain for the Year One thousand eight hundred and three.

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Duties on the Importation of Goods, Wares, and Merchandize into, and on Goods, Wares, and Merchandize exported from Ireland; and also certain Duties of Excise on Spirits and Malt distilled and made in Ireland.

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia in Great Britain for the Year One thousand eight hundred and three.

An Act to revive and further continue, until the Twenty-fifth of March One thousand eight hundred and Four, and amend so much of an Act made in the Thirty-ninth and Fortieth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty as grants certain Allowances to Adjutants and Serjeant-Majors of the Militia of England disembodied, under an Act of the same Session of Parliament.

An Act to authorise the Advancement of further Sums of Money out of the Consolidated Fund to be applied in the Improvement of the Port of London, by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled; and to empower the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to purchase the legal Quays between London-Bridge and the Tower of London.

An Act for regulating the Markets within the Town of Blackburn, in the County-Palatine of

Lancaster; and for improving the Streets and other Places within the said Town.

THE following Addresses having been presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

Unto the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, the Freeholders, Justices of Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of Perthshire, at this momentous Crisis present at your Majesty's Throne, our Assurances of zealous and determined Support in the arduous Contest in which the British Empire is engaged:—We well know, that the present is no common Warfare:—We know, that we are now contending for our Existence as a Nation, and for every Thing that is dear to Britons, or to Men:—We know, that a domineering and arrogant Enemy, after having reduced to Slavery, or subjected to his Controul many of the Nations of Europe, is exerting every Effort in order to subdue and destroy that People whose Spirit and Resources have hitherto, by the Blessing of Heaven, preserved their Independence and their Greatness, and saved them from gigantic and desolating Ambition. Recent Events have convinced us that every Effort to procure or preserve Amity with France, and the Ruler of France was unavailing; and that that Period which ought to have been the Period of Peace, has been characterized by a Spirit of Hostility, of Insult, and of Injury to this Country: Every further Concession or Relinquishment, it was therefore manifest could answer no other Purpose than to diminish the Power of Resistance and to facilitate the Means of Destruction. On the Issue of the War in which we have been involved (whilst we are neither appalled by the Danger, nor shrink from the Contest), we feel and we know depends the Enjoyment of our National Liberties, of our Freedom, of our political, domestic, and individual Happiness. If we fail, (and we can only fail from a Deficiency in Exertion,) abject Thralldom and Wretchedness must be our Portion; but if, under Providence, we are victorious, we shall attain more permanent and honorable Security and Prosperity, than even we, as a Nation, have hitherto enjoyed.

In this arduous Contest, which affects the Inhabitants of this Country of all Ranks and Descriptions, and in which all Classes of Men are interested, we can assure your Majesty that in this Part of your Dominions the same Spirit, and the same Zeal, to avenge the Insults of our menacing and vaunting Foe, animates every Individual. Embarked, as all now are, in one common Cause of Interest, of Danger, and we trust, of Glory, the Feelings by which all are influenced, are those by which, at this momentous Crisis, Britons ought to be animated, and the Conduct which all are anxious to adopt is such, as in the present Times Britons ought to pursue. We therefore beg to declare to your Majesty that the Sacrifices and Exertions which your Vigilance and the Wisdom of Parliament have called for, are deemed by us highly ne-

cessary in this Emergency, and shall be cheerfully made on our Part; and we also beg to assure your Majesty that we shall willingly make such additional Sacrifices and Exertions as may, in the Situation of the Country, be demanded, for our Conduct is not to be influenced by that short-sighted and infatuated Policy which looks only to the Pressure of the Sacrifice, and not to the Magnitude of the Evil it is calculated to avert.

The Resources of the British Empire are immense; the Spirit of that numerous, powerful, and loyal People over which your Majesty reigns, prompts them to Achievements worthy of the British Name, and of the Fame and the Renown of their Ancestors; and we have no Doubt your Majesty will employ those Resources and that Power with Vigour and Effect, and will call forth into active Exertion that Spirit in such a Manner as not only to afford complete Protection against hostile Invasion, but also to establish the permanent Security of the British Empire.

HIS MAJESTY doth hereby direct and require, THAT all the LETTER-MEN, SERJEANTS, TRUMPETERS, and DRUMMERS on the Out Pension of CHELSEA or KILMAINHAM HOSPITALS, residing in SOUTH BRITAIN, whether discharged from the REGULAR CAVALRY or INFANTRY, or from the MILITIA or FENCIBLES, (those

HIS MAJESTY IS GRACIOUSLY PLEASED TO DECLARE, That all the said LETTER-MEN, SERJEANTS, TRUMPETERS, and DRUMMERS shall be considered as entitled to the Pension for the Six Months, commencing from Midsummer last, notwithstanding those found fit for Service will commence Pay according to the respective Ranks which they held when discharged, from the respective Days of their Appearance, in pursuance of this Order.

HIS MAJESTY IS FURTHER PLEASED TO DECLARE, That every Man found fit for Duty shall also be entitled, on his joining the Corps to which he shall be appointed, to receive a Bounty of One Pound Five Shillings, or so much thereof as shall remain after supplying him with proper Necessaries; and those who, on Examination, are found unfit for any Duty, shall be dismissed, with proportionate Subsistence to carry them back to their Homes.

AND IT IS HEREBY NOTIFIED, That all OUT PENSIONERS in SOUTH BRITAIN, discharged in the Ranks aforesaid, (EXCEPT as above EXCEPTED,) who shall not appear at the Times and Places herein appointed, will be considered as otherwise provided for by Government, or as Dead; and they will accordingly be STRUCK OFF THE BOOKS OF THE OUT PENSION OF THE SAID RESPECTIVE HOSPITALS OF CHELSEA OR KILMAINHAM, WITHOUT ANY PROSPECT OF BEING RESTORED THERETO.

Whereas the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have represented to His Majesty, that, in the Evening of Saturday last, the 2d Instant, Lieutenant Fullarton and Lieutenant Palmer, of His Majesty's Ship *Squirrel*, having been sent on Shore from the said Ship, then lying in the River Thames, with the Boat-board, Gunner, several Petty Officers, and a Party of Twenty-five Men, in Quest of some Seamen, of whom Captain Brown, the Commander of the said Ship, had

received Information; and having landed at the Village of Barking, in the County of Essex, about Nine o'Clock in the Evening, and impressed Four Seamen for His Majesty's Service, several evil disposed Persons assembled near the said Village, attacked the said Lieutenant and their Party, and rescued the said Seamen; and that afterwards, on the Parties' Return to the River Side, in order to go on board their Ship, they were met and opposed by a very numerous Body of Haymakers and others, to the Number of Five Hundred and upwards, armed with Sabres, Pitchforks, and other offensive Weapons, by whom they were attacked and assaulted in a most violent and cruel Manner, and particularly Lieutenant Palmer received Two very severe Wounds in different Parts of his Body, and is now lying at Barking in imminent Danger of his Life;

His Majesty, for the better discovering the Offenders concerned in the abovementioned violent Outrages and Assaults, and bringing them to Justice, is hereby pleased to offer His most gracious Pardon to any One or more of them, (except such of them as actually wounded the said Lieutenant Palmer, or any of the Party with him,) who shall apprehend, or give such Information as shall be the Means of apprehending any of his Accomplices.
