A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

7 HEREAS divers Persons have been guilty of the illegal Practices of clandestinely importing and running of prohibited and uncustomed Goods, and thereby subjected themselves to great Penalties, for which some have been already convicted, some are in Execution for the same, and others are under Profecution, and many more liable to such Penalties, in consequence of which they abscond, or are gone into foreign Parts, which has, or may prove the Ruin of themselves and their Families: And whereas they may yet be of Use to Us and their Country in the present Conjuncture of Affairs, in case they are rendered capable thereof by Our gracious Pardon; We being desirous of giving them an Opportunity of rendering them-felves of Service to the Public, have thought sit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Proclamation; and We do hereby promife and declare, that in case any Person or Persons not standing charged with the Crime of wilful Murder, nor liable to be fo charged, who has or have incurred any Penalties, in, by, or for the clandestine importing, running, landing, relanding, unshipping, concealing, or receiving, or being assisting in such running, landing, relanding, or unshipping any prohibited Goods, Wares. or Merchandizes, or any Goods liable to the l'ayment of the Duties, under the Management of the Commissioners of Customs or Excise, or who have beat abused, obstructed, or hindered any Officer or Officers of the faid Revenues in the due Execution of their Duty, or by Reason or Means, or on Account of any such Offences as aforefaid, or who are under any Profecutions, Judgment, Outlawry, or under, or subject to any Execution, for any of the said Offences, and who are at this Time gone beyond Sea to avoid the same, shall, on or before the First Day of September next, return to Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall surrender himself or themselves unto the Collector or Comptroller of Our Customs, in any of the Ports of Great Britain, and shall enter into Bond to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, with One sufficient Surety, to be approved by such said Col-

lector or Comptroller as aforefaid, in the Amount of any Sum or Sums of Money with which he or they may stand charged for his or their good Behaviour; and that he or they will not in future be concerned. in any illegal Practice against Our Revenue; and further, that he or they will not depart from Our Kingdom of Great Britain during the Continuance of War, without Our Leave for that Purpole first had and obtained; all and every such Person or Persons fo returning and furrendering himself or themselves, and entering into Bond as aforefaid, upon Certifi-cate thereof from the faid Officers of Our Customs, which Certificate Our faid Officers respectively are hereby required to make out and grant, to be by fuch Person or Persons entering into such Bond produced or transmitted by such Officers to Our Office of Customs or Excise in London respectively, as the Case may be, to be there registered and kept, shall have Our gracious Pardon, of, and for all and every such Offence and Offences and Penalties, and all Indictments, Informations, Profecutions, Convictions, Judgments, Executions, and Outlawries fued, incurred, had or given, or that may arise or accrue, for, or by Reason or Means of any of the said Offences, or other Matters or Things aforesaid; and fuch Certificate fo registered as aforesaid, or a Copy thereof duly authenticated, shall be deemed and taken as Evidence in all Cases that such Person or Persons has or have complied in every Respect with the Conditions of this Our Proclamation.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twentieth Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign.

SIR, Thunderer, at Sea, July 26, 1803.

HAVE the Honor to report to you, that on the 26th Instant I captured the Venus French Privateer, pierced for Twenty-eight Guns, mounting Sixteen Six-Pounders, and Two Eight Pound Carronades, One Hundred and Fifty Men, commanded by Monsieur Lemperierre.

She is a fine Vessel, quite new, sails remarkably sast, well found, coppered, and measures Three Hundred and Fifty-eight Tons; from the Report I have received she is calculated for His Majesty's Service. She failed from Bourdeaux the 21st In-stant, in Company with Four other Privateers.

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, beg Leave to approach the Throne at this momentous Crisis with the most solemn Af-furances of our firm and faithful Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Crown, and Government.

We have contemplated with grateful Satisfaction your Majesty's Solicitude for the Interests of Humanity, evinced in your unwearied Efforts for the Maintenance of Peace: These Efforts we have seen frustrated by the faithless and infuriate Policy of the French Government, which has perverted to Purpofes of Rapine and Oppression the sacred Obligation of Treaties; and, assuming the Attitude of Peace, has treacherously meditated the Renewal of War.

We deeply lament the Necessity of again appealing to the Sword; and we pray the Almighty Difposer of Events that it may not be long unsheathed, but that the Justice of your Majesty's Cause, and the zealous Loyalty of a brave and united People, prepared to concur in the Support of every Measure which your Majesty's Councils shall deem expedient for the Preservation of their Property, their Laws, and their Religion, may speedily triumph, and permanently establish an effectual Barrier against the daring Projects of an infatiable Ambition, and

rescue from its baneful Grasp the Laws, the Liber-

ties, and the Religion of Europe.

May this glorious Work, not less inseparable from the true Interests of Europe than essential to the Security of this Realm; be the happy Atchievement of your Majesty's Reign! And, in the Father of his People, may the whole civilized World hail their Deliverer and Protector!

Whitehall, August 2, 1803.
As several Artificers and Manusacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercife their feveral Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the scilowing Abstracts of Ads of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Pradices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27. IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Informa-tion in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

· Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid, fuch Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before fome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions: And if fuch Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Aflizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer thall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as fuch Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the

Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ire-land; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or feduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprifonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Persons so again offending shall fusfer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly affed in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manusactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forseit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Deht, &c. in any Court

of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall sand on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Ossence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inslicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forseit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employ-

ment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the

iame.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsover, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manusactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manusactures.
