WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Argyle, consider it as our Duty, at this Season of public Danger and Alarm, to approach your Throne with the warmest Declarations of our continued and inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government; and we are happy to assure your Majesty, that the same Sentiments of Duty and Affection which we entertain prevail amongst the People committed to our Care. The avowed Intention of the Rulers of France to invade this Country, and the Preparations which they are carrying on for that Purpose, excite in us the strongest Feelings of Indignation. We have never ceased to cherish and diffuse Sentiments of Loyalty amongst the People with whom we are connected; and, at the present Crisis, we regard it as our indispensable Duty to exhort and animate them to employ all their Energies in resisting foreign Invasion, and in defending the invaluable Blessings, civil and sacred, which they have uniformly enjoyed under your Majesty's paternal Care and Protection. Roused by the Prospect of Danger, the Hearts of your People, most gracious Sovereign, are, if possible, more than ever your's; and, should Danger come, we are fully persuaded that all Ranks and Orders of Persons in this Part of the Kingdom will unite with Zeal and Ardour in the Defence of their Religion and Liberty, and of the Honor and Independence of the Empire.

That mutual Love and Confidence may ever subsist between your Majesty and your Subjects; that that Wisdom, which is from above, may direct all your Councils, and that Strength, which is Almighty, may go forth with your Arms; that the Lord of Hosts may bless all the Means that are employed for the National Defence and Security; that He may put a Period to the Calamities of Europe by a lasting Peace; that He may preserve our happy Constitution, and our Religion, and Liber-

ties, to the latest Posterity; that He may take your Majesty into His Holy Keeping, and pour down His Blessings on all the Branches of your illustrious House; and that, after a long and prosperous Reign, over a free, a brave, and a grateful People, He may bestow upon you the Crown of Immortality through Jesus Christ our Lord, are and shall be the constant Prayers of, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this Provincial Synod of Argyle.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N .

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign, intituled, An Act to repeal An Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for establishing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or residing therein, in certain Cases; It is enacted, That when and so often as We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall think it necessary for the Safety and Tranquillity of the Kingdom, by Our or their Proclamation or Order in Council, to direct that Aliens of any Description in the said Proclamation or Order mentioned, shall not be landed in this Kingdom, except at such Places and under such Regulations as shall be in such Proclamation or Order, expressed, then and in every such Case, the Master or Commander of every Ship or Vessel, or Boat having any such Alien or Aliens on board, shall not suffer any such Alien or Aliens to land within any Part of this Kingdom contrary to such Proclamation or Order in Council, unless by our express Permission, signified under the Hand of One of Our Principal Secretaries of State; and every such Master or Commander, wilfully neglecting to conform to any of the Directions or Regulations contained in such Proclamation or Order, shall forfeit Forty Pounds for every Alien so landed, to be recovered as therein mentioned; and such Ship or Vessel, from on board of which any such Alien or Aliens shall so land, and every other Vessel or Boat used in landing such Alien or Aliens, shall and may be seized by any Officer or Officers of the Customs of Excise; and the same respectively shall, on Proof that such Offence was wilfully committed contrary to the Provisions of this Act, be forfeited, together with all Tackle, Apparel, Ammunition, and Furniture thereunto respectively belonging: Now We, being desirous of carrying into Execution the Purposes of the said Act in Manner hereafter expressed, do by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Ad-

ance of our Privy Council, order and direct, That from and after the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, no Alien or Aliens on board of any Ship or Vessel, or Boat coming or arriving, directly or immediately from any Port or Place in France, or any or Port or Place under the Dominion of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, or from any Port or Place of, or in, or belonging to any Country or Territory at War with Great Britain, shall (until our Royal Pleasure concerning such Aliens shall be further expressed), be landed or be suffered by the Master or Commander of any such Ship, Vessel, or Boat to land at any Port or Place within Great Britain, except at the Ports of Yarmouth, Harwich, Dover, and Southampton, and at Gravesend, unless by our express Permission signified under the Hand of One of Our Principal Secretaries of State: And We do further order and direct, by and with the Advice aforesaid, That Notice of this Our Proclamation shall be printed in different Languages, and shall be affixed in public Places in the different Ports of this Kingdom, and shall also be delivered by the Custom-House Officers to the Master of every such Ship, Vessel, or Boat arriving at any Port or Place in this Kingdom, except as aforesaid, and to all Foreigners arriving in any such Ship, Vessel, or Boat: Provided always, that this Our Proclamation shall not extend to any Foreign Ambassador, or other Publick Minister duly authorized, or the Servants actually attendant upon any such Ambassador or Publick Minister, or any Domestick Servant of any of Our natural-born Subjects, or of any Subject to whom Letters of Denization have been or shall be hereafter granted, or any Domestick Servant of any of Our Subjects who now are or shall hereafter be naturalized by Act of Parliament, such Servants respectively being actually and *bonâ file* employed in the Service of their respective Masters, and actually at the Time attendant upon their respective Masters; nor to any Mariner actually engaged and employed in the Navigation of any Ship or Vessel, during the Time that such Mariner shall remain so actually engaged and employed, and certified in the Manner in the said Act mentioned to be such Mariner, by the Master or Commander of such Ship or Vessel upon his Arrival in any such Port or Place as aforesaid: And We do hereby require and command the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, and the Lord Warden of Our Cinque Ports, to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N .

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign, intituled, An Act to repeal an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for establishing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein, in certain Cases, We are authorized, by Our Royal Proclamation, to order and direct such Aliens as are therein mentioned to dwell and reside respectively in such Districts as We, Our Heirs and Successors, may think necessary for the public Security: now We being desirous of carrying into Execution the Purposes of the said Act, in Manner herein-after expressed, do, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, order and direct that all Aliens who shall have arrived within Great Britain since the First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, or who shall arrive therein during the Continuance of the present Hostilities, or until Our Royal Will and Pleasure respecting such Aliens shall be further expressed, (other than the Domestic Servants of any of Our natural born Subjects, or of Subjects to whom Our Letters Patent of Denization have been or shall be hereafter granted, or the Domestic Servants of any of our Subjects who now are or shall be hereafter naturalized by Act of Parliament, such Domestic Servants being actually and *bonâ file* employed in the Service of their respective Masters, and other than such Aliens as shall by virtue of a special Licence, under the Hand and Seal of One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, be authorized to dwell and reside, during the Time that such Licence shall be in force, in other Parts of Great Britain than those herein-after specified), shall, in Ten Days from the Date of this Our Royal Proclamation, if such Aliens shall then be resident in England, or if such Aliens shall be resident in Scotland, then in Sixteen Days from the Date of this Our Proclamation, dwell or reside only within the Limits of the Weekly Bills of Mortality, or within the Parishes of St. Mary le Bone, Paddington, Pancras, and St. Luke at Chelsea, in the County of Middlesex, or within such Parts of Great Britain as shall not be more than Fifty Miles from the Standard in Cornhill, and not less than Ten Miles from the Sea Coast, and also not less than Ten Miles from any of Our Dock Yards, and in no other Parts whatever; provided that this Our Proclamation shall not be construed to extend to such Aliens as shall land in any Part of Great Britain, in which Aliens are not or shall not be prohibited from landing, by Our Proclamation or Order in

Council, and who shall be actually proceeding to the Collector, Comptroller, or other Chief Officer of Our Customs, at such Port, for the Purpose of making the Declaration, and receiving the Certificate by the said Act required; or proceeding to the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate, at such Port, for the Purpose of obtaining his or her Passport, as by the said Act is also required; nor to any Alien who shall have made such Declaration, and shall have obtained such Certificate and Passport as before mentioned, and shall be actually and *bonâ fide* proceeding on his or her Journey to some Place of Residence, being within those Parts of Great Britain in which, pursuant to this Our Proclamation, such Alien may dwell or reside; nor to any Alien who shall be proceeding on his or her Journey to the Sea Coast of this Kingdom, with such Passports as are by the said Act required, in order to embark for foreign Parts; nor to any Mariner who shall be on Shore in the Port of his Arrival, and whom the Master or Commander of the Ship or Vessel in which such Mariner shall have arrived shall have certified to the Collector, Comptroller, or other Chief Officer of Our Customs, in Writing, subscribed by such Master, to be actually engaged and employed in the Navigation of such Ship or Vessel: We do hereby charge and command that all Aliens, to whom this relates, shall pay due Obedience to the same; and that all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, and other Magistrates do respectively use their utmost Diligence to enforce the same.

Given at Our Court at Saint James's, the Twelfth Day of August One thousand eight hundred and three, in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign.

The King has been pleased to cause it to be signified by the Right Honorable Lord Hawkesbury, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, to the Ministers of Neutral Powers residing at this Court, that the necessary Measures have been taken, by His Majesty's Command, for the Blockade of the Entrance of the Ports of Genoa and Spezia; and that from this Time all the Measures authorized by the Law of Nations and the respective Treaties between His Majesty and the different Neutral Powers, will be adopted and executed with respect to all Vessels which may attempt to violate the said Blockade.

Westminster, August 11, 1803.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the*

Honorable House in the House of Peers to bear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for granting to His Majesty, until the Sixth Day of May next after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, a Contribution on the Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to raise the Sum of Two Millions for the Uses and Purposes therein-mentioned.

An Act for raising the Sum of One Million Five Hundred Thousand Pounds by Loans or Exchequer Bills, for the Service of Great Britain for the Year One thousand eight hundred and three.

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Duties on Receipts.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to settle an Annuity of Sixteen Thousand Pounds on the House of Orange during His Majesty's Pleasure.

An Act for charging an additional Duty on Lignum Quassia imported into Great Britain.

An Act to enable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury of Great Britain to issue Exchequer-Bills on the Credit of such Aids or Supplies as have been or shall be granted by Parliament for the Service of Great Britain for the Year One thousand eight hundred and three.

An Act for extending the Jurisdiction of the Courts of Justice in the Provinces of Lower and Upper Canada, to the Trial and Punishment of Persons guilty of Crimes and Offences within certain Parts of North America, adjoining to the said Provinces.

An Act for the removing of Doubts respecting the Validity of Assignments made, or to be made pursuant to the Awards of the Commissioners acting under the Seventh Article of the Treaty with the United States of America, and for the better enabling of His Majesty to recover the Interests so assigned.

An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great Britain, to be secured in Warehouse, without Payment of Duty.

An Act to continue until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight, an Act made in the Forty-second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty for enabling His Majesty to permit the Importation and Exportation of certain Goods and Commodities into the Port of Tortola, and to continue until the Fourteenth Day of June One thousand eight hundred and eight, and from thence to the End of the then next Session of Parliament, and amend so much of an Act made in the Sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty as relates to the prohibiting the Importation of foreign Wrought Silks and Velvets into Great Britain.

An Act for preventing the forging and counterfeiting of foreign Bills of Exchange, and of foreign Promissory Notes, and Orders for the Payment of Money, and for preventing the counterfeiting of foreign Copper Money.

An Act to enable the Judges of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, to award Writs of Habeas Corpus for bringing Persons detained in Gaol before Courts Martial, and the several Commissioners therein mentioned.

An Act to render Justices of the Peace more safe in the Execution of their Duty.

An Act for procuring Returns relative to the Expence and Maintenance of the Poor in England.

An Act to make Provision in certain Cases for the Wives and Families of Ballotted Men, Substitutes, and Volunteers serving in the Militia of Ireland.

An Act to enable the Court of Directors of the East India Company to make reasonable Allowances to the Owners of certain Ships in the Service of the said Company, on Account of the extraordinary Expence attending the Outfit of the said Ships between certain Periods.

An Act to suspend, until the First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and four, Proceedings in Actions, Prosecutions, and Proceedings under certain Acts relating to the Woollen Manufacture, and also under an Act of the Reign of Queen Elizabeth, so far as the same relates to certain Persons employed or concerned in the said Manufacture.

An Act for preventing and settling Disputes which may arise between Masters and Weavers engaged in the Cotton Manufacture in Scotland, and Persons employed by such Weavers, and Persons engaged in ornamenting Cotton Goods by the Needle.

An Act to amend so much of an Act, made in the Seventh Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the First, intituled An Act for the further preventing His Majesty's Subjects from trading to the East Indies under foreign Commissions; and for encouraging and further securing the lawful Trade thereto; and for further regulating the Pilots of Dover, Deal, and the Isle of Thanet, as relates to the said Pilots.

An Act for enabling the Company of Proprietors of the Leominster Canal to raise Money to discharge their Debts, and to complete the Canal; and for explaining and amending the Acts for making and maintaining the said Canal, and for granting to the said Company further and other Powers.

An Act to enable His Majesty to grant Letters Patent for establishing a Theatre, under certain Restrictions, in the City of Glasgow.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain Sums of Money out of the respective Consolidated Funds of Great Britain and Ireland, for applying certain Monies therein mentioned for the Service of the Year One thousand eight hundred and three, and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act for repealing the several Duties under the Management of the Commissioners for the Affairs of Taxes, and granting new Duties in lieu thereof; for granting new Duties in certain Cases therein mentioned; for repealing the Duties of Excise on Licenses, and Carriages constructed by Coachmakers, and granting new Duties thereon, under the Management of the said Commissioners for the Affairs of Taxes, and also new Duties on Persons selling Carriages by Auction, or on Commission.

An Act for granting to His Majesty the Sum of Fifty Thousand Pounds for building Glebe Houses in Ireland.

An Act for settling and procuring a certain Annuity on William Lord Amherst, and the Representatives of the late Jeffery Lord Amherst, in Consideration of the eminent Services performed by him during his Command in America.

An Act for granting to His Majesty certain countervailing Duties on the Importation into Great Britain of refined Sugar of the Manufacture of Ireland, and for allowing additional Drawbacks or Bounties on the Exportation to Ireland of refined Sugar of the Manufacture of Great Britain during the Continuance of certain Acts, and for allowing until the first Day of May One thousand eight hundred and four, a Bounty on the Importation of Salmon and Cod Fish from the Island of Newfoundland and the Coast of Labrador into Great Britain and Ireland.

An Act to enable the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury of Great Britain to contract for the Purchase of the Duties of Prifage and Butlery of Wines.

An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen, and for the better and more effectually Manning His

Majesty's Navy, for regulating the Payment of Prize Money, and for making Provision for the Salaries of the Judges of the Vice-Admiralty Courts in the Island of Malta, and in the Bermuda, and Bahama Islands.

An Act to permit, during the Continuance of Hostilities, and until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, the Importation into Great Britain and Ireland in Neutral Vessels from States in Amity with His Majesty, of certain Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, and to empower His Majesty, by Order in Council, to prohibit the Exportation of Copper, and to permit the Importation in Neutral Vessels from States not in Amity with His Majesty, of certain Goods, Wares, and Merchandize.

An Act to make perpetual so much of an Act made in the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, as relates to the further Punishment of Persons going armed or disguised, and to the Relief of Officers of the Customs in Informations upon Seizures.

An Act to repeal an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for establishing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or residing therein, in certain Cases.

An Act for repealing so much of an Act passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, as relates to the Lighting the Streets and Places within the Borough and Soke of Doncaster in the County of York, and for more effectually lighting, watching, and otherwise improving the said Borough, and for preventing Nuisances therein.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I AM at length enabled, by the State of public Business, to release you from your long and laborious Attendance in Parliament.

In closing the Session, I have the utmost Satisfaction in expressing the strong Sense which I entertain of that zealous and unwearied Regard for the Welfare and Honour of your Country which has distinguished all your Proceedings.

During the Continuance of Peace, your Conduct manifested the just View which you had taken of our actual Situation, and of the Dangers against which you were peculiarly called upon to provide; and since the Recurrence of Hostilities, you have displayed an Energy and Promptitude which have never been surpassed, in the Means which you have supplied for the Defence of the Country, and for the vigorous Prosecution of the War.

Your Proceedings, in consequence of the late treasonable and atrocious Occurrences in Ireland, will, I trust, have the Effect of preventing any further Interruption in its internal Tranquillity, and of convincing My loyal Subjects in that Part of the United Kingdom, that they may confidently rely on that Protection to which they are so justly entitled.

In the Midst of the Deliberations, which were occasioned by the immediate Exigency of the Times, you have not been unmindful of other Objects, to which I had directed your Attention; and I have

great Satisfaction in observing that you have completed a System for consolidating the Duties, and regulating the Collection and Management of the several Branches of the Revenue; and that you have adopted Measures which are calculated to afford material Accommodation to the mercantile Part of the Community, and to encourage and extend the Navigation and Commerce of My Dominions.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I return you My particular Thanks for the Liberality and Readiness with which you have granted the Supplies for the public Service.

It is painful to me to reflect, that the Means of necessary Exertion cannot be provided without a heavy Pressure upon My faithful People: but I cannot sufficiently applaud that Wisdom and Fortitude which have led you to overlook Considerations of temporary Convenience, for the Purpose of preventing a large Accumulation of Debt during the Continuance of the War. You may be assured that there shall be as strict an Attention to Economy on My Part as may be consistent with those Preparations and Exertions which will be best calculated to frustrate the Designs and to weaken the Power of the Enemy, by whose arrogant Pretensions and restless Ambition alone these Sacrifices have been rendered unavoidable.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I am fully persuaded that, during the Cessation of your Parliamentary Duties, you will continue to be actuated by the same Spirit which has been uniformly displayed in your Councils. It will be your Duty to assist in carrying into Effect those important Measures which your Wisdom has matured for the Defence and Security of the Realm; and particularly to give the most beneficial Direction to that Ardour and Enthusiasm in the Cause of their Country which animate all Classes of My People.

Justly sensible of the State of Pre eminence, in which it has pleased the Almighty to support Us, for so many Ages, amongst the Nations of Europe, I rely with Confidence, that, under the Continuance of His Divine Protection, the Exertions of My brave and loyal Subjects will prove to the Enemy and to the World, that an Attempt to subvert the Independence, or impair the Power of this United Kingdom, will terminate in the Disgrace and Ruin of those by whom it may be made, and that My People will find an ample Reward for all their Sacrifices, in an undisturbed Enjoyment of that Freedom and Security, which, by their Patriotism and Valour, they will have preserved and ensured to themselves and their Posterity.
