And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury, and the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them may refpectively appertain.

Moft Gracious Sovereign,

A T a Seafon of peculiar Difficulty and Alarm, when the wild Ambition and inveterate Enmity of a foreign Power have placed the Britifh Realm in Circumflances of new and extraordinary Danger, we, your Majelty's molt dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Heritors, Frecholders, and Juftices of the Peace of the County of Linlithgow, humbly defire to approach the Throne with the dutiful Expression of our hearty Affection to your Majelty's Perfon and Government, and with the iolemn Affurance of our Refolution to maintain, by the utmost Efforts which fo interessing a Crifis may require, the Honor and Dignity of your Majelty's Crown, and the Liberties and Independence our Country.

Knowing, Sire, the Spirit of Moderation on the Part of your Majefty, in which the Terms of the Treaty of Amiens were arranged, we were willing to indulge the Hope that those large Conceffions towards the Tranquillity of Europe had not been made in vain; and that the Ruler of France might fincerely be disposed to indulge that enflaved and unhappy People in their earnest Wishes for a Period of Repose, after the long Series of Agonies and Miseries they had undergone.

But, convinced as we now are, by the uniform Train of Injury and Infult with which that relentlefs Perfon has fince met the numerous Teffimonies of your Majefly's friendly Difpofitions, that this Treaty was nothing more than a defutive Truce, devifed only in order to provide the Means of more effectually accomplifhing the Deftruction of a People whom he alike hates and envies, and that the great Struggles in which we are engaged could not have been prevented, nor even delayed, but by the Surrender of all that ennobles the British Name and Character, or enfures the Safety, Freedom, and Profperity, of these fortunate Kingdoms; we feel that every Thing which any of us poffeds, or hold dear, is at Hazard on the Ifine of this mighty Conteft; and taught by the Mifery and Dehafement of the many furrounding Nations who have trufted to the Mercy, the Faith, or the Gratitude of our falfe and cruel Foe, we will make with Cheerfulnels all Sacrifices and Exertions, how large and unufual foever, which are called for on fo high an Occalion, and will feek our Deliverance from this great Peril in the Energy and Courage only of a free, a loyal, and an united People; and in humble Reliance on the Favour and Protection of the Almighty Difpofer of Events, a Reliance grounded on the Confeionfnefs of the Juffice and Goodnefs of our Caufe.

SIR, August 1, 1803. HAVE the Honor of informing you, I this Day fucceeded in preventing the Entrance of a French Lugger into Havre, but being hauled close to the Beach, about Two Miles to the Weltward of Tongues, I found it neceffary to fend the Boats, under the Command of Mr. Tracey, the Second Lieutenant, with Meffrs. Barclay and French, Midfhipmen, to endeavour to bring her off; on the near Approach of our Boats, the Crew precipitately quitted her, and ranged themfelves (in Concert with a Party of Military) behind the Sand Bank a brealt of their Vellel, not Half Mulket Shot from her, and kept up a heavy and constant Fire upon our People, which the Marines returned with great Steadinefs and Soldierlike Conduct, and every Officer and Man doing his Duty, they fucceeded in bearing off their Prize.

The Lugger is called Le Favori, pierced for Four Guns, but none mounted, fuppofed to have been thrown overboard, and appears to be a Government Transport, commanded by a Licutenant de Vaisseau. I have to regret the Lois of Matthew Morfitt (Seaman), who was killed in the Barge.

BEG you will pleafe to inform my Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, that the Boats of His Majefty's Ship Cerberus made an Attack on the Enemy's Veifels in Concalle-Bay, under the Orders of Lientenant Manfel, of that Ship, but the Coaft being alarmed, they fucceeded in only carrying off One large Fifting Veffel, leaving a Sloop which they had boarded, but which, unfortunately touched the Ground. The fame Officer fucceeded better with Two Boats of the Cerberus, in cutting out Seven Fishing Veffels, from Sisteen to Eighteen Tons each, out of St. Cas Bay, which arrived here Yesterday, except one of the Boats, which unfortunately overfet, with the Lofs of Two Men belonging to the Cerberus.
