WHEREAS in the Countries styling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics, Measures of Hostility have been adopted against His Majesty's Subjects; and whereas the said Countries cannot but be considered as absolutely dependent on, and under the Controul of, the Government of France; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprisals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the said Countries styling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics, so that as well His Majesty's Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned, by Letters of Marque, or General Reprisals, or otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the Persons inhabiting the Countries styling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics, and bring the same to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions; and, to that End, His Majesty's Advocate-General, and the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprisals to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing, and taking the Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the Persons inhabiting the Countries styling themselves the Ligurian

and Italian Republics; and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, his Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions which shall be duly commissioned to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprisals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be made, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels, and Goods as shall belong to the Persons inhabiting the Countries styling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics; and that such Powers and Authorities be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewise to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board a Draft of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the said several Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Draft of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes afore-mentioned.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign, intituled, An Act to repeal An Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for establishing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or residing therein, in certain Cases; It is enacted, That when and so often as We, Our Heirs and Successors, shall think it necessary for the Safety and Tranquillity of the Kingdom, by Our or their Proclamation or Order in Council, to direct that Aliens of any Description in the said Proclamation or Order mentioned, shall not be landed in this Kingdom, except at such Places and under such Regulations as shall be in such Proclamation or Order, expressed, then and in every such Case, the Master or Commander of every Ship or Vessel, or Boat having any such Alien or Aliens on board, shall not suffer any such Alien or Aliens to land within any Part of this Kingdom contrary to such Proclamation or Order in Council, unless by our express Permission, signified under the Hand of One of Our Principal Secretaries of State; and every such Master or Commander, wilfully neglecting to conform to any of the Directions or Regulations contained in such Proclamation or Order, shall forfeit Forty Pounds for every Alien so landed, to be recovered as therein mentioned; and such Ship or Vessel, from on board of which any such Alien or Aliens shall so land, and every other Vessel or Boat used in landing such Alien or Aliens, shall and may be seized by any Officer or Officers of the Customs of Excise; and the same respectively shall, on Proof that such Offence was wilfully committed contrary to the Provisions of this Act, be forfeited, together with all Tackle, Apparel, Ammunition, and Furniture thereunto respectively belonging: Now We, being desirous of carrying into Execution the Purposes of the said Act in Manner hereafter expressed, do by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, order and direct, That from and after the Publication of this Our Proclamation in the London Gazette, no Alien or Aliens on board of any Ship or Vessel, or Boat coming or arriving, directly or immediately from any Port or Place in France, or any Port or Place under the Dominion of the Persons exercising the Powers of Government in France, or from any Port or Place of, or in, or belonging to any Country or Territory at War with Great Britain, shall (until our Royal Pleasure concerning such Aliens shall be further expressed), be landed or be suffered by the Master or Commander of any such Ship, Vessel, or Boat to land at any Port or Place within Great Britain, except at the Ports of Yarmouth, Harwich, Dover, and Southampton, and at Gravesend, unless by our express Permission signified under the Hand of One of Our Principal Secre-

aries of State: And We do further order and direct, by and with the Advice aforesaid, That Notice of this Our Proclamation shall be printed in different Languages, and shall be affixed in public Places in the different Ports of this Kingdom, and shall also be delivered by the Custom-House Officers to the Master of every such Ship, Vessel, or Boat arriving at any Port or Place in this Kingdom, except as aforesaid, and to all Foreigners arriving in any such Ship, Vessel, or Boat: Provided always, that this Our Proclamation shall not extend to any Foreign Ambassador, or other Publick Minister duly authorized, or the Servants actually attendant upon any such Ambassador or Publick Minister, or any Domestick Servant of any of Our natural-born Subjects, or of any Subject to whom Letters of Denization have been or shall be hereafter granted, or any Domestick Servant of any of Our Subjects who now are or shall hereafter be naturalized by Act of Parliament, such Servants respectively being actually and *bonâ fide* employed in the Service of their respective Masters, and actually at the Time attendant upon their respective Masters; nor to any Mariner actually engaged and employed in the Navigation of any Ship or Vessel, during the Time that such Mariner shall remain so actually engaged and employed, and certified in the Manner in the said Act mentioned to be such Mariner, by the Master or Commander of such Ship or Vessel upon his Arrival in any such Port or Place as aforesaid: And We do hereby require and command the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, and the Lord Warden of Our Cinque Ports, to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign, intituled, An Act to repeal an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, for establishing Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein; and for establishing, until Three Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, Regulations respecting Aliens arriving in this Kingdom, or resident therein, in certain Cases, We are authorized, by Our Royal Proclamation, to order and direct such Aliens as are therein mentioned to dwell and reside respectively in such Districts as We, Our Heirs and Successors, may think necessary for the public Security: now We being desirous of carrying into Execution the Purposes of the said Act in Manner herein-after expressed, do, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, order and direct that all Aliens who shall have arrived within Great Britain since the First Day of January One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, or who shall arrive therein during the Continuance of the present Hostilities, or until

Our Royal Will and Pleasure respecting such Aliens shall be further expressed, (other than the Domestic Servants of any of Our natural-born Subjects, or of Subjects to whom Our Letters Patent of Denization have been or shall be hereafter granted, or the Domestic Servants of any of our Subjects who now are or shall be hereafter naturalized by Act of Parliament, such Domestic Servants being actually and *bonâ fide* employed in the Service of their respective Masters, and other than such Aliens as shall by virtue of a special Licence, under the Hand and Seal of One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, be authorized to dwell and reside, during the Time that such Licence shall be in force, in other Parts of Great Britain than those herein-after specified), shall, in Ten Days from the Date of this Our Royal Proclamation, if such Aliens shall then be resident in England, or if such Aliens shall be resident in Scotland, then in Sixteen Days from the Date of this Our Proclamation, dwell or reside only within the Limits of the Weekly Bills of Mortality, or within the Parishes of St. Mary le Bone, Paddington, Pancras, and St. Luke at Chelsea, in the County of Middlesex, or within such Parts of Great Britain as shall not be more than Fifty Miles from the Standard in Cornhill, and not less than Ten Miles from the Sea Coast, and also not less than Ten Miles from any of Our Dock Yards, and in no other Parts whatever; provided that this Our Proclamation shall not be construed to extend to such Aliens as shall land in any Part of Great Britain, in which Aliens are not or shall not be prohibited from landing, by Our Proclamation or Order in Council, and who shall be actually proceeding to the Collector, Comptroller, or other Chief Officer of Our Customs, at such Port, for the Purpose of making the Declaration, and receiving the Certificate by the said Act required; or proceeding to the Mayor or other Chief Magistrate, at such Port, for the Purpose of obtaining his or her Passport, as by the said Act is also required; nor to any Alien who shall have made such Declaration, and shall have obtained such Certificate and Passport as before mentioned, and shall be actually and *bonâ fide* proceeding on his or her Journey to some Place of Residence, being within those Parts of Great Britain in which, pursuant to this Our Proclamation, such Alien may dwell or reside; nor to any Alien who shall be proceeding on his or her Journey to the Sea Coast of this Kingdom, with such Passports as are by the said Act required, in order to embark for foreign Parts; nor to any Mariner who shall be on Shore in the Port of his Arrival, and whom the Master or Commander of the Ship or Vessel in which such Mariner shall have arrived shall have certified to the Collector, Comptroller, or other Chief Officer of Our Customs, in Writing, subscribed by such Master, to be actually engaged and employed in the Navigation of such Ship or Vessel: We do hereby charge and command that all Aliens, to whom this relates, shall pay due Obedience to the same; and that all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, and other Magistrates do respectively use their utmost Diligence to enforce the same.

Engaged with a powerful and insidious Foe, who knows no Bounds to his Dominion, who tyrannizes over the Continent of Europe, and awaits the Sacrifice of this happy Island as the ultimate Project of his restless Ambition. We behold with extreme Satisfaction the wise and prudent Measures adopted by your Majesty's Government, of strengthening the Naval and Military Force, establishing Classes of the People, and calling forth the Energy of the Many to support the Happiness and Independence of the Whole.

Under such Regulations we cannot doubt but the associated Spirit of the Country, should the daring Invader attempt to effectuate what he has had the Boldness to assert, will teach him and the Confederates of his Ruin, that whatever Success may have hitherto attended his usurping Hand, it is reserved for Britain to chastise the Insolence of France, and we have only to look back to those Monuments of our ancient Glory, the invariable Defeats of an invading Foe to establish this important Faith.

We are at the same Time, Sir, conscious that to deserve Success is to insure it, and that we are

called upon to discharge the Duties of the most active Preparation with unabated Zeal, Fidelity, and Attention.

Impressed with these Sentiments, your Majesty may be assured that your faithful People of Yarmouth, ever distinguished for their Loyalty to their King, and Love for our excellent Constitution, will, with one Hand and Heart unite in every Measure to preserve inviolate the Security of the Country, the Safety and Happiness of your Majesty (whom God long preserve,) and your People.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to acquaint you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that a Lugger was seen within the Rocks at Ushant, which had the Appearance of an Armed Vessel. Boats from the Ville de Paris, under the Direction of Lieutenant Watt, went on the 16th at Night, and brought her out.

She is called the Messager, pierced for Eight Guns, has Six mounted, with the Owner and Forty Men on board, completely fitted for a Two Months' Cruise.

Lieutenant Watt boarded her with Eighteen Men in a Pinnace before the other Boats, which had separated to look out for her, could get up. Only a few Frenchmen were wounded upon making a feeble Resistance.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Forty-second Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled an Act to alter and amend an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for rendering more commodious and for better regulating the Port of London, so far as the same relates to the Concerns of the West India Dock Company thereby established, and for extending to other Objects the Compensations directed to be made by the said Act;" it is amongst other Things, enacted as follows:

Times at the least in the London Gazette, and in two or more Morning Newspapers then usually circulated in London; and the said Certificate so published as aforesaid, shall be deemed sufficient Notice to all Parties interested, of the Completion of the Dock or Docks, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works, concerning which such Certificate of Approbation shall be made; and from and after the Expiration of Ten Days next ensuing the first Publication of the said Certificate in Manner aforesaid, all the Rates and Duties by the said recited Act and this Act made payable to the said West-India Dock Company for Ships and Vessels entering into and using any of the said Docks, or any of the Balons and Cuts belonging, or which shall belong thereto, and also for any Goods, Wares, and Merchandize which shall be landed or discharged from any Ship or Vessel lying within any of the said Docks, or any of the Balons or Cuts belonging, or which shall belong thereto, shall commence, take effect, and become payable, and then and from thenceforth such of the Quays and Wharfs then made or built by the said Company as shall be described in such Certificate to be fit for the Reception of Goods, shall be deemed and taken to be legal Quays and Wharfs accordingly, and all the Provisions in the said recited Act contained relating to the Increase of Interest, or Dividends from and after the Completion of the said Docks, Cuts, Quays, Wharfs, Warehouses, and other Works, and for compelling Ships and Vessels that shall arrive in the River Thames with West India Produce on board, to unload and land the Whole of such Produce within some or one of the said Docks, or on the Quays or Wharfs belonging, or which shall belong thereto, and for causing the King's Duties in respect of the same to be ascertained at such Quays or Wharfs, and not elsewhere, and compelling such Ships and Vessels belonging to or frequenting the Port of London, as shall be used or employed in the West India Trade, to ship or take in their respective Cargoes, and be loaded either in some or one of the said Docks, or in such Part of the River Thames as shall be below the Entrance into the intended Canal at Blackwall aforesaid, shall take Effect and be in full Force and Operation, and the said Term of Twenty-one Years, during which, the aforesaid Provisions are to be in Force, shall commence at, and be computed from the Expiration of Ten Days from the Time of the first Publication of the said Certificate as before mentioned, any Thing in the said recited Act contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas by a Certificate under the Hands of the Right Honorable Henry Addington, Nathaniel Bond, and John Hiley Addington, Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury granted on the Twenty-first Day of August last, in pursuance of the said Act passed in the Forty-second Year of His present Majesty's Reign, the said Lords Commissioners did certify and make known that the following Works made and erected by the said West India Dock Company, under the Authority of the said Acts of Parliament were so far completed, that in their Judgment the same were fit for the Reception of Ships and Goods respectively, viz. 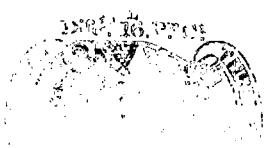
