PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS in the Countries styling them-felves the Ligurian and Italian Republics, Measures of Hostility have been adopted against His Majesty's Subjects; and whereas the said Countries cannot but be confidered as absolutely dependent on, and under the Controul of, the Government of France; His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprifals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the said Countries styling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics, fo that as well His Majesty's Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissionated, by Letters of Marque, or General Reprifals, or otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully feize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the Persons inhabiting the Countries styling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics, and bring the fame to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions; and, to that End, His Majesty's Advocate-General, and the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty this Board authoriting the Commissions for at this Board, authorifing the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed, to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprisals to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing, and taking the Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the Persons inhabiting the Countries slyling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics; and that such Powers and Countries has installed to the fold Countries are Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and His Majesty's said Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this

Board, authorifing the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, his Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions which shall be duly commissionated to take Cognizance of, and judicially proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprisals of all Ships and Goods that are or shall be made, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels, and Goods as shall belong to the Persons inhabiting the Countries styling themselves the Ligurian and Italian Republics; and that such Powers and Authorities be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewise to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board a Drast of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the said several Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Drast of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissionated for the Purposes afore-mentioned.

SIR,

BEG you will acquaint the Lords Commissioners to of the Admiralty, that His Majetty's Sloop Wasp, on the 19th, by Signal, chasted, and was fortunate in the Capture of a French Privateer, whose Intention it was to keep on the Skirts of the Convoy. I have enclosed Captain Aylmer's Letter to me, which I beg you to deliver to their Lordships.
