HE following Addreffes having been prefented 1 L to the King; which Addreffes His Majefty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Mod Excellent Majefty.

WE, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Sub-jects, the Centlemen, Clergy, Freemen, and Freeholders of the County of the City of Water-ford, in that Patt of the United Kingdom called Ireland, duly convened by the Sheriffs of faid City, feize this awful Perioc, when your Majefty's Dominions are threatened to be invaded by a fierce and haughty Foe, to express our unseigned and inviolable Atlachment to your Majesty's facred Person and Government, and to that Coustitution under which we have the Happineis to live, and for the Support and Protection of which we are ready to die.

Senfible of the many Bleffings we have long en-joyed under your Majefty's mild and paternal Reign, we feel it our bounden Duty to offer our personal Service and Property to defend and maintain that Conflitution we have fo just Reason to boast, and on which our Rights and Liberties so effentially depend.

Reigning, as you do, in the Hearts of your true and faithful Subjects, may your Majefty's Arms be crowned with Victory; and may the Enemy by Experience find that no Force or Numbers can conquer or difmay a free and loyal People.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subrone, affembled at Summer Affizes One thousand eight hundred and three, think ourfelves called upon at this alarming Period to express our fincere, firm, and unalterable Attachment to your Majelty's Perfon, Family, and Government.

Attached as we are to our most excellent and unparalleled Conflitution, we view with no lefs Won-der than Indignation the tumultuous and favage Infurrection which fo lately difgraced the Capital of this Kingdom, for the Purpole of its Subverfion, an Infurrection excited and fomented by an Enemy the molt defperate and determined that ever yet appeared for the Destruction of the Liberties and Happinels of Mankind.

We have now before our Eyes the abject and difgraceful Slavery to which the infidious Arts, as much as the Arms of the French Republic, have reduced many of the N tions of Europe; and we ftand determined, if needful, at the Expence of our Lives and Fortunes, to maintain our most glorious Conflitution, and fuch as we have received it; to preferve and transfact the fume to our Posterity under the Government, we truft for ever, of your Majefty's illustrious Houfe.
