Madrid, Octob. 31. From Cadix of the 20th Instant we have an account, That the Moors before Tangier had raised three Batteries against the Town, two of two Guns each, and a third of one Gun, and that they were undermining Pale-Fort, which the English had rebuilt; That the 200 Spanish Horse were at Tariffa ready to Embark for Tangier;

and that Sir Palmes Fairborne had presented the Commander of those Troops with a rich Sword and Belt, and had sent 500 Pieces of Eight to be distributed among the Soldiers. From Malaga of the 22 th. y tell us, That Sir John Berry in the Leopard, the Forefight, and four rich Merchant Ships, arrived there the 16th from Smirna; and that the Sunday before a French Vessel arrived there from without the Streights mouth, who reported, That passing on the 19th near Tangier, they heard very much shooting, which made them conclude that the English and the Moors were in action. From Alicant of the 14th they tell us, that Captain Story in the Antelope was arrived there with several ships under his Conyoy from Cadiz bound for Italy.

Lintz, Oct. 23. There are lately arrived Letters from the Emperors Resident at Constantinople which give an account, as we are informed, That the Grand Vizier had acquainted him that the Grand Signior was willing to renew the Peace between the two Empires for 12 years longer, but that the Grand Signior would reserve to himself a liberty to assist the Hungarian Malecontents, whenever he thought fit, which we may be confident the Emperor will accept; and to.

Elydelberg, Oct. 23. Several Complaints have been made to our Elector of the Proceedings of the French, viz. That on the 15th Instant several French Horsemen came to Kirchberg, and demanded to be received into the Town, and because they were not, for that they had no Letters of Health, committed several Insolencies in the Neighborhood. That the French have Summoned Spanheim, Naumburg, and Schwarzerden, to send Deputies to Metz to do Homage to the French King, on pretence that those places are Dependencies of the Country of Valdentz; That too of the French Kings Guards arrived some days since at Lauterbeck, having orders to Summon that place, Bingen, Frankenthal, Wormes and other places on this side the Rhine likewise to send Deputies to do Homage; That the Inhabitants of Hokenjulzen have been required to appear by some persons appointed on their behalf, on the 25th Instant, before the French Commissioners at Winweiler, in order, as is imagined to swear Fealty to the French King; That the Governor of Weissenburg has sent an Order of the Royal Chamber at Brisac, to the Electors Officers in the Baillage of Germersheim, by which they are required to do Homage as aforesaid in a Monthstime; That the Tenth of Wine in the said Baillage, belonging to his Electoral Highness, is Seized by the French, which they pretend they will only detain till the differences between their King and his Electoral Highness be adjusted, but we have reason to believe that so soon as the Wine is ready they will carry it away, as they have done in the Baillage of Landecker by order of the Governor of Weissenburg. And it is said that the French have Orders to take the Castle of Couzensberg, near Creutzenach, and if any resistance be made, to burn the Town.
