THEREAS, by an Act, passed in the last Seilion of Parliament, intituled " An Act " to continue, until the First Day of January One " thousand eight hundred and four, several Laws 46 relating to the prohibiting the Exportation and " permitting the Importation of Corn, and for " allowing the Importation of other Articles of " Provision without Payment of Duty; to the " Relief of Captors of Prizes, with respect to the " bringing and landing certain Prize Goods in this "Kingdom; and to the regulating the Trade and " Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta;" It is, among other Things, enacted, That certain Acts therein mentioned, relating to the Exportation and Importation of Corn, and other Articles of Provision should be, and the same were thereby continued until the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and four; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, and in purfuance of the Powers given by the faid Acts, is hereby pleased to order, That, from the Thirtieth Day of this instant September, until the Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive, no Person or Perfons whatfoever shall export, or shall load or lay on board any Ship or Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place of Great Britain any of the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oken, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, or Lamb, whether falted or otherwife, or any Bacon, or Better, unless Proof shall first be given to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs that the Articles so to be exported as aforefaid are not of British Growth, Pro-

duce, or Manufacture; But it is His Majesty's

A T the Court at St. James's, the 28th of to extend, to prevent the Exportation or carrying out of fuch and so much of any of the fact A ticles as shall be necessary to be carried in any Ship or Vessel, on its Voyage out and Home, for the Sustenance, Diet, and Support of the Commander, Malter, Mariners, Pallengers, and others on board fuch Ship or Vessel, or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or other Ships and Vessels in His Majesty's Service; or for the necessary victualling or providing any of His Majesty's Forces, Forts. or Garrisons; nor to prohibit, at any Time, the Exportation of fuch and fo much of any of the faid Articles as may be necessary for the Supply of the British Forts, Castles, or Factories in Africa, or of British Ships trading upon that Coast, which have usually been supplied with the same from Great Britain; nor to prohibit the Exportation by the East India Company, or any Agent employed by them, of any of the faid Articles for the necessary Supply of their Garrisons at St. Helcna, Bombay, and Bencoolen, or for the necessary Use of the Ships belonging to the faid Company; nor to prohibit the Exportation of any of the faid Articles to the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man; or to any of His Mejesty's Colonies, Islands, or Plantations in America or the West Indies; or to the Town or Port of Gibraltar, for the necessary Use of the Inhabitants of the same respectively: Provided that the Merchant Exporter, in each Case, shall first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they were entered Outwards before the Entry of the same shall be made, and shall give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, in treble the Value of the faid Articles, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they were fo entered out, and for the Purpoles specified, and none other; Reasure nevertheless, that nothing contained in this fuch Bond not to be cancelled or delivered up His Majesty's Order shall extend, or be construed until Proof shall be made to time Satisfaction

of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were so entered Outwards:

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, with the Advice aforefaid, That it shall be lawful for and during the faid Term beforementioned, to import lato any Port or Place of Great Britain any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulle; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether falted or otherwife; Bacon, Hame, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all fuch Articles as aforefaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officer of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the faid Acts mentioned.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commisfioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

NCLOSED I have the Honor to transmit a Duplicate of Intelligence received from Captain Jackson, of the Autumn, the Original being transmitted to the Commander in Chief.

His Majesty's Sloop Autumn, off Calais,

28th September 1803.

HE Wind springing up Yesterday Morning
from the Eastward, I thought it a proper Opportunity to attack the Enemy's Vessels in Calais, in order that they should not get them up the Har-bour out of the Reach of our Fire; I waited till it was half Ebb in the Harbour, at which Time they i

take the Ground; we then bore up, and, after trying and finding out the Distance, we anchored—the Bombs to the N. E. of the Town, the other Part of the Squadron a-breast of the Town and Pier Heads, to draw the Enemy's Fire as much as we could from the Bombs, so as not to prevent their acting. After we anchored a-breast of the Town and Pier Head Battery, the Enemy opened their Fire on us from all Directions, amongst which, I found they had Mortars, the first Shell fell within a Ship's Length of us and burst under Water, our Vessels at that Time were so close, that I thought there was a great Probability some of their Shelis might fall on board, whilft I found our Shot (though they all reached the Pier Heads,) would not go so far up as their Ships, I therefore made the Signal to weigh and open to a greater Distance, remaining at Anchor myfelf. The Squadron has been very fortunate in receiving no Damage from the Enemy's The Bombs were now keeping up a welldirected Fire, many of the Shells evidently falling in the midft of their Gun Boats; the Shells that fell over the Boats went into the Town, and must have done great Damage; the East End of the Town appeared to be on fire for some Time. From the Enemy's Boats and Veffels being covered under the Land, it was impossible to judge what Damage they fullained, but it must have been confiderable; it now came on to blow so fresh from the N. E. that the Springs would not hold the Ship against the Wind and Tide; the Tartarus' Anchor having given way, I was obliged to make the Signal to discontinue their Fire.

N Answer to your's of this Date, I have the Honor to acquaint you, that the Enemy's Gur-Veffels, being Twenty-fix in Number, were Yesterday discovered coming out of Calais foon after I had dispatched Lieutenant Cameron to you; I immediately gave Chase with the Squadron under my Command, but although every Exertion was used on our Part they anchored close in with the Pier at Boulogne, after a levere Cannonade of Three Hours, which was returned from them as well as their numerous Batteries on Shore: It was my Intention to have bombarded them in that Situation, and had made the Signal for that Purpole, but the Ward blowing

flrong off Shore, and a Lee Tide, prevented the Bombs from taking their Stations accordingly. At Daylight this Morning another Squadron of the Enemy's Gun-Boats (Twenty-five in Number) were discovered coming from the Eastward; immediately proceeded to attack them, and, after a fevere Cannonade for nearly Three Hours, they anchored in the Situation with the Vessels last Night, with the Loss of Two of them, they having been driven on Shore, and bilged upon the Rocks. There are at present Fifty-sive Gun-Vessels at an Anchor outside the Pier of Boulogne. I am happy to add that I have not received Reports of any material Injury being done to any of the Squadron under my Com-mand:—a Shell fell on board the Leda, which burft in her Hold, doing little Injury to the Ship, and without hurting a Man.

She appears to be one of the finest Vessels of her Class I have feen; is built upon a new Construction, sails prodigiously fast, is well equipped, and only One Year old.
