of the faid Committioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commiffioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were fo entered Outwards:

And His Majefty is hereby further pleafed to order, with the Advice aforefaid, That it shall be lawful for and during the faid Term beforementioned, to import iato any Port or Place of Great Britain any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, I ares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulle; and alfo Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether falted or otherwife; Bacon, Hame, Tongues, Butter, Cheefe, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Veffel, or in any other Ship or Veffel belonging to Perfons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majefty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatfoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all fuch Articles as aforefaid, that shall be fo imported, with the proper Officer of the Cuftoms at the Port where the fame shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures in the faid Acts mentioned.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majelty's Treafury are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly.

THE following Addreffes having been prefented to the King; which Addreffes His Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioufly:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majefty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Weffmeath, beg Leave to approach your Throne with renewed Ailurances of the Fidelity and Attachment which we have always borne towards your Royal Perfon and our happy Conflictution; and more particularly at this Time, when an infatiate Enemy hath threatened an immediate Attack upon our Country with a View to general Plunder, and to reduce to flavery a free and independent Nation.

With united Hearts and Voices we humbly tender to your Majefty the zcolous and conftant Exertion of our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of that admirable Conflictution, those revered Laws, and that benignant System of Government which has given to us the Enjoyment of great, and the Promife of still greater national Prosperity.

By the wild and infatiable Ambition of the prefent Ruler of France, deaf to the Calls of Humanity, and neglectful of the Duty he owes to the People over whom he prefides, your Majelty has been forced again to have Recourfe to Arms, and Two Nations, difpofed to live in Peace and Amity, are once more plunged into a State of Warfare from which they had been refeued by the Wifdom and Moderation of your Majefty's Councils.

We view with peculiar Indignation the baneful Defigns of the Enemy on this Part of your Majetty's Dominions, his hafe and malignant Con-lpiracy with those Traitors who fo recently experieuced your Majefty's Clemency, who are now become the Instruments of a foreign Delpot, and are again employed in Endeavours to feduce from their just and honorable Allegiance, those deluded Men whom they had formerly milled, and afterwards betrayed to the Punishment, from which, by the Royal Mercy, they were faved. To fruftrate this and every other Defign hostile to your Majefty and to the Welfare of our Country. We pledge ourfelves, Sire, to fhun no Fatigue, to fhrink from no Danger, to repine at no Expence, and we firmly rely on the paternal Protection of your Majefty, on the Countenance, the Support, and Direction of your Government here, to give Effect to our humble but zealous Endeavours.

We call upon the Almighty Ruler of the Univerfe to fhield and protect your Royal Perfon and Throne from foreign and domeflic Foes, and fo to direct your Councils and invigorate your Arms as to fecure to your Majefly that Glory most dear to your Royal Breast—the Glory of terminating a just and unavoidable War by a fafe, honourable, and permanent Peace.

We are happy to declare that in this County every Rank and Defeription of Men, warmly concur in fupport of the public Tranquillity; we truth therefore, that at this Crifis, when every Thing dear to us is at flake, the fame Unanimity will cou-, tinue to prevail, and that every Irifhman will be emulous to manifelt, by his Exertions, his Zeal in Defence of his King and Country, and in the Support of that enviable Conftitution under which the Empire has fo long flourifhed.
