sings from us, and subject us under the Iron Yoke I

of an intolerable Usurpation.

We partake of the patriotic Animation that now pervades the whole Country. It is not for us in-deed, in Opposition to the studious and sequestered Habits of our Education and Profession, and to the acciared Sentiments of the Legislature, to oppose the ambitious Invaders of our Country in the Ranks of an Army, but we will endeavour to serve the great Cause, in which every patriot Heart must be engaged, with an Essicacy perhaps not inferior. We have peculiar and appropriate Duties to perform, on a due Attention to which the Existence of the State must principally depend, and without which the Resources of Wealth, however incalculable, and the Exertions of Number and Spirit beyond all Example, would prove of little Avail.

On the Discharge of these important Duties we pledge ourfelves to your Majetty to employ our best Faculties zealously and unremittingly. We will excite those committed to our spiritual Care to the most vigorous Exertious, by shewing the inestimable Value of the pure reformed Protestant Religion, as it is happily established in these Kingdoms. We will inculcate that admirable Code of Morals, which, while it characterizes the Christian Difpenfation, is bell calculated to afford Stability to the We will teach Prayer and Dependence on Almighty God, who is the God of Battles, and with whom alone are the Issues of War.

Devoting ourselves wholly to these Occupations, we trust we shall be found most actively and efsicaciously discharging our peculiar Duties, as they respect the Service of God, and the Prosperity of

our Country.

Such, Sire, are the zealous Professions, and such shall be found to be the faithful Conduct of this Portion of the Clergy of your Majefly's Dominious on the Occasion of the present Threat of Invasion of these Kingdoms. Should the ambitious and unprincipled Foe prefume to pollute thefe Shores, we look with Satisfaction to the Rightcoufness of our Cause, and to the impenetrable Phalanx of a whole Nation of Patriots: We call to Mind the facred and inflexible Courage which animated the Breatls of the holy Army of Martyrs, who flied their Blood in Attestation of the pure and reformed Faith; but, above all, we feel Confidence from a grateful Recollection of the past figual Mercies of Almighty God vouchfafed to this Nation at Seasons of Diffress; and we will never cease to implore the King of Kings to shield your Majelly from all Danger, and to continue the Existence and Prosperity of a State in which the Happiness and dearest Interells of its chief Governor are inseparably bound H. Cheiter.

Great Exertions have been necessary, but they have been made with Cheerfulness, and we hope in God will be accompanied with the wished-for Success.

That it may please Almighty God long to preferve your Majesty so endeared to your People by your auspicious Government, and by your personal Virtues; to shower down upon your Royal House the richest of his Gifts, and, after a successful War, to restore the inestimable Blessing of Peace, are the servent Prayers of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful and affectionate Subjects.
